

THE VIKINGS WILL HOST THE TEXANS FOR JUST THE SECOND TIME EVER. IT IS ONLY THE FOURTH MEETING BETWEEN THE FRANCHISES AND FIRST SINCE DEC. 23, 2012.

THE HOUSTON TEXANS FRANCHISE began as an expansion team in 2002. Houston's roster, has undergone considerable overhaul since the most-recent matchup with the Vikings.

Of the players who started that game, only tackles Duane Brown and Derek Newton, cornerbacks Kareem Jackson and Johnathan

Joseph and defensive lineman Antonio Smith are on the Texans active roster. All of Houston's receivers and tight ends were on their respective college campuses in 2012.

Houston Head Coach Bill O'Brien and Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer were both hired in 2014, and both led their teams to division titles and postseason appearances in their second seasons.

The Texans signed quarterback Brock
Osweiler during free agency this spring, and
the Vikings traded for Sam Bradford on Sept. 3.
Osweiler has never faced the Vikings; Bradford
has faced the Texans once in his career as a
member of the Rams in 2013.

PLAYER TO WATCH: CB TERENCE NEWMAN

TERENCE NEWMAN'S NFL CAREER is almost as long as that of the Houston Texans. Newman entered the league as a first-round draft pick of Dallas in 2003, the spring after the Texans began play. Receivers have gotten younger, but Newman has been able to keep up with athleticism and intelligence. Houston's oldest two receivers, Keith Mumphrey and DeAndre Hopkins, were 11 years old when Newman played his first game with the Cowboys, but he's been timeless, starting 192 of 194 regular-season games.

THE PARTNERSHIP: THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN NEWMAN AND VIKINGS HEAD COACH MIKE ZIMMER IS STRONG. ZIMMER WAS SEASONS, AND THE TWO WERE IN CINCINNATI FOR TWO SEASONS (2012-13). IT WAS AN EASY DECISION FOR NEWMAN WHEN THE OPPORTUNITY TO REIOIN A ZIMMER DEFENSE CAME ABOUT IN 2015. "HE'S AS GOOD AS THEY ARE. HE KNOWS EVERY FACET OF THE GAME: OFFENSE, DEFENSE, SPECIAL TEAMS, AND HE'S DONE A GREAT JOB FOR SURE. WHEN I SAW THE DEFENSE, IT WAS DEFINITELY A MIKE ZIMMER DEFENSE. WHEN HE ASKED ME TO COME PLAY, I WAS LIKE, 'SIGN ME UP, LET'S DO THIS.' "

41 IN 14

Newman has recorded 41 interceptions over the course of his 14 NFL seasons. Newman has recorded at least one pickoff every year he's played and is the league's active leader. Newman led the Vikings with three interceptions in 2015 and extended his career streak in Week 3 at Carolina, nabbing one of Minnesota's three pickoffs of reigning MVP Cam Newton.

PLAYER TO WATCH: WR DEANDRE HOPKINS

DEANDRE HOPKINS OPENED HIS CAREER with a blazing start. He became the third-youngest player (23 years, 169 days) in NFL history to reach 200 receptions and 3,000 yards, behind Larry Fitzgerald (23 years, 108 days) and David Boston (23 years, 126 days). He also became the third wide receiver in league history with 1,400 yards and 11 receiving touchdowns in a season by age 23 (Isaac Bruce and Randy Moss). Hopkins turned in a historic clip in the first three games of October 2015 when he became the first player in league history to post nine or more receptions and 145-plus receiving yards in three straight games, totaling 30 catches and 474 yards in that span.

THE CONSISTENCY AMIDST CHANGE: HOPKINS' PRODUCTION HAS REMAINED CONSISTENT DESPITE THE TEXANS HAVING NINE DIFFERENT PLAYERS AT QUARTERBACK SINCE HIS ROOKIE SEASON. RYAN FITZPATRICK STARTED THE MOST GAMES (12 IN 2014) FOR HOUSTON DURING THAT SPAN. BRIAN HOYER (NINE IN 2015) AND MATT SCHAUB (EIGHT IN 2013) STARTED THE NEXT-HIGHEST NUMBER OF GAMES. THE TEXANS SIGNED BROCK OSWEILER IN FREE AGENCY THIS SPRING.

Hopkins has caught at least one pass in each of the 52 games he's played. He barely continued the streak last week with one reception for four yards on six targets against Tennessee. It was the fifth time in his career that Hopkins has been limited to one catch and the fifth time that he posted single-digit yardage in a game.



The Vikings defensive tackle spent the 2007 season playing for the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe and moved on to Colorado and Philadelphia in 2008 while in the Arena Football League. Johnson went north of the border in 2009 and 2010, playing for Calgary in the Canadian Football League.

And while he then spent three seasons in New Orleans, nowhere has Johnson been a better fit than in the Twin Cities. Now in his third season with the Vikings, the 32-year-old had 12 combined sacks in his first two seasons in Purple.

Minnesota, he said, is now considered his football home

"I've had the most success here out of my career. It's a good situation," Johnson said. "Coaches and the organization have showed me so much support and been behind me since I've been here.

"And I feel real productive, so I consider this my home." he added.

Besides the 5.5 sacks he recorded in 2015, Johnson also tallied 50 quarterback hurries, good for second on the team behind defensive end Everson Griffen. Johnson is on pace to break that mark through three games, as he's recorded a team-high 21 quarterback hurries.

In your third season in Minnesota, what has clicked for you here in terms of your production?

Dealing with the guys, and the coaches • believe in me and gave me the opportunity to display my talent. Once I got into that role, they started grooming me and putting more details on what I needed to work on. [Vikings defensive line coach Andre Patterson] is one of the top defensive line coaches in the league, and he's one of the guys that really takes each individual and is able to mold you and make you the best player you can be. It's been a combination of things.

Are you surprised with how well the defense is playing, or is it what you expected?

I'm not surprised at all. We came in this I'm not surprised at all. ... sees.
season as if this was going to be our year, because we had two years to get that camaraderie with guys feeding off each other. We saw it during the offseason and OTAs - we started seeing things clicking. Guys know where they're supposed to be, they're more familiar with the scheme and [Vikinas Head Coach Mike Zimmer] has a lot of trust in us, also. We know that our four-man rush can get to the quarterback and make a difference.

How would you describe this defense in one word?

Explosiveness. We're an aggressive group. If you look at us pound-forpound, we're one of the smallest D-lines in the league. But we play big ... guys are strong, guys know leverage, guys know discipline and technique. You can see that on Sundays.

What about the unit's unselfishness? It seems the sacks are spread out between the entire line.

Every guy has the ability to win [their matchup] at any time. If a team tries to isolate one guy, that just means someone else is going to rise to the occasion and make plays.

You lead the team with 21 QB hurries and have one sack. Is that an example of

These guys on the line are very greedy.
You have to scratch and claw to try and get to the quarterback. Opponents have been doing a good job of getting the ball out, because they know we're so aggressive. A lot of play-action or things to keep you on your toes, but the [sacks] will come. [Patterson] tells me all the time, 'Just continue to do what you do.' If I keep on getting back there and keep on hitting quarterbacks, then the numbers are going to come.

What's your favorite memory from playing in Germany?

A lt was great to be able to have that experience and live in a whole new country and see a whole different culture the way they do things, the food they eat, the iconic areas. I was able to travel to Hamburg, Berlin, Amsterdam ... I lived in Cologne. Being able to go to Berlin and see the Berlin Wall, it was a great experience.

After spending time with the Saints, how does U.S. Bank Stadium compare to the Superdome in terms of crowd noise?

It's getting up there, I can't lie. New Orleans does get crazy, and they have a lot of noise and fans and different audio things. But our fans are real loud, also. We actually had a situation [against Green Bay] where guys had to yell and use extra communication skills to be able to get our calls. It was extra loud in there, and those guys are so great. We're going to continue to have to do better with our communication when we play in there.

You donated jerseys to your high school in Moss Point, Mississippi, this offseason. What inspired you to do that and how did that area impact you?

When you come from a small area like I'm from, there aren't too many people that have the opportunity or the resources to be able to do something like that. It's a poverty-driven area, a lot of blue-collar guys down there. I'm one of the few guys who is actually able to do something. When you compare Moss Point to somewhere like Pascagoula, those guys are way more fortunate, schools are better, they have more resources. Going down there and seeing they still have old equipment, old jerseys and stuff, as a player you know that if you look good, you play good. You have that confidence and that swagger. I wanted to give back to those guys. We have a few more things in motion to try to help those guys out.

He stepped back in the pocket on third-and-4, looked pressure in the face, and fired with precision.

Bradford connected with Kyle Rudolph, who snagged the perfectly placed 8-yard pass in the end zone over Packers safety Morgan Burnett.

The roar of 66,813 Vikings fans filled grandiose U.S. Bank Stadium from the field level to its signature roof.

"That's one of the best atmospheres I've probably ever played in," Bradford said. "The building was rocking. Our fans were tremendous."

The scene mirrored one that children envision in their backyards. The path that brought Bradford to Minnesota, however, would have been far more difficult to dream up.

The second-quarter touchdown was Minnesota's first in its regular-season home opener and Bradford's first scoring play in purple.

Rudolph gave Bradford the touchdown ball.

"On two weeks' preparation, to go out there and play the way he did --

"The list goes on and on of the people that have spent extra time to help me get comfortable in this system," Bradford said. "I think it's the guys inside of the locker room. They've had my back since day one. They've been adamant, they've been vocal about it, they've made me comfortable in the locker room, and they've made me comfortable in the huddle."

Early mornings and late nights defined a short 15 days. The ultimate quarterback hurry.

Shurmur had served as Bradford's offensive coordinator in both St. Louis (2010) and Philadelphia (2015), and he worked to translate Vikings terminology into relatable verbiage for Bradford.

"I certainly have a good understanding of what we're doing offensively, and I'm able to connect the dots as to what it used to be like somewhere else," Shurmur said. "Offenses tend to overlap, and you use concepts for different things."

At practice, Bradford not only learned to execute the plays but also observed. When Zimmer named Hill as the Week 1 starter at Tennessee, Bradford took the opportunity on the sideline to hear the play calls and mentally walk through the game.

The crash course was less than ideal. The Vikings, however, believed that Bradford would be up for the challenge.

"Sam has the three primary elements that a quarterback needs," Shurmur said. "He's an outstanding decision-maker, he's extremely accurate and he understands timing."



taking hit after hit, he just stayed there and kept throwing the ball downfield. Unbelievable. He just made great decisions all night long."

Bradford had spent those two weeks buried in the playbook. He came in early. He stayed late. Bradford's father didn't hear from his son in over a week, because time spent on the phone could instead be used in the film room. Bradford likely spent more time with Vikings quarterbacks coach Scott Turner than he did sleeping.

"We'd meet as coaches and then go home, and I would send Sam stuff on his iPad, made a lot of additional cut-ups so he could see film of different plays," Turner said. "We had to get him ready to play."

Bradford looked nothing but ready when he found Rudolph in the end zone, or when he connected with Stefon Diggs for another score a quarter later. He finished 22-of-31 for 286 yards and a passer rating of 121.2, winning the Border Battle as a newcomer in the NFC North division.

Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer liked what he saw in Bradford's first performance, from composure and decision-making to execution.

"I was impressed with pretty much everything he did tonight," Zimmer said.

The Vikings needed a quarterback.

Hours before Pederson called Bradford, Vikings General Manager Rick Spielman spent extensive time on the phone with Eagles Executive Vice President of Football Operations Howie Roseman.

"This is not a normal transaction period," said Spielman, who would typically enjoy the convenience of an entire offseason or free agency period to assess and decide on a player move. "I made a lot of phone calls through Thursday, and as we sat there and weighed out all of our options and looked at everything, then I understood where Philadelphia may be a slim possibility of getting this done."

As Bradford hurried to process and pack, he picked up his phone for the second time Saturday morning - this time to call Shaun Hill.

The two were teammates in 2014. Hill served as the Rams backup quarterback but ended up playing nine games - starting eight of them - when Bradford suffered a torn ACL. Hill was prepared to step into the same role for Minnesota when he heard that the Vikings were bringing in Bradford.

"Shaun was disappointed at first, but he's a great person," Zimmer said. "He's a pro's pro, and that's the way he took it."

Hill said Bradford called "to pick his brain" shortly after the trade happened, and Hill offered insight on Zimmer's coaching style, Turner's offense and the Vikings locker room. He didn't harbor any ill feelings toward the younger quarterback flying in to take over his position.

Hill worked to expedite the process for Bradford in more ways than one, even driving him to U.S. Bank Stadium for the Packers game.

"You come together for a common goal, and that's to help the team win," Hill said. "To help whoever's playing to perform at his best."

Hill knew Bradford would arrive in Minnesota ready to do just that because of their prior relationship.

"Sam was already there working out," Hill recalled of his first interactions with Bradford.

The early-morning workouts offered extra opportunity for the new teammates to get to know each other. Hill immediately noticed Bradford's physical strength, work ethic and dedication to reaching greatness.

"Once we got [on the football field], I was just very impressed with how well he threw the ball. I mean, he can sling it." Hill said. "And how good of a player he was. How smart he was, how well he saw the field. I was just very impressed."

That season, Hill watched Bradford rehab his second knee injury and remain confident and driven in the face of adversity. The veteran added mental fortitude to Bradford's attributes.

"This is a very tough game, and it's for the tough-minded people," Hill said. "He's proven that he's tough-minded, to have gone through all the things that he's gone through."

Bradford's win over the Packers was just the start of what he hopes to accomplish in Minnesota.

Karen first met Marcus Sherels when she attended the annual "A Crucial Catch" luncheon hosted by the Vikings and the American Cancer Society two years ago. She and her sister, Lyn, were seated at a table with Sherels and Brandon Fusco, and the players listened to her story.

"We just had a special bond with Marcus," said Karen, who sat with Sherels again at this year's luncheon. "He's just a really genuine, nice guy that I enjoyed hanging out with."

The sisters drove down to Rochester this past summer to support Sherels' fundraiser, and there they received pink "MS35" shirts to support their favorite Viking.

Sherels, who has attended the luncheon every year he's been with the Vikings, said he was surprised and appreciative when Karen and Lyn came to Rochester.

"Just to hear their stories and hear how strong Karen has been, it's amazing," Sherels said. "Karen and Lyn are lifelong friends now."

They reunited Tuesday when the Vikings hosted the luncheon for survivors and caregivers - and in memoriam of loved ones. Karen was diagnosed with breast cancer

in December 2012. After undergoing chemotherapy, radiation and surgery, she's now a proud survivor that continues to support the ACS in any way possible. Karen said the ACS directly helped fund at least two medications she required.

"They're definitely our heroes," Sherels said of Karen and other survivors. "Just the strength they have and the influence they have on everyone - to survive something like this is incredible."

But Karen doesn't view herself as a hero.

"When you get diagnosed with cancer, you don't have option. You either fight the cancer, or it gets to you. And sometimes it gets to you anyway," Karen said. "So it's not that we're braver or stronger; it's just that we're lucky enough to have successful treatment."

After defeating cancer, Karen said that Sherels inspired her to become more active and an overall healthier person. To hear that Sherels and his teammates at the luncheon admire her is humbling.

"The Vikings have been part of my life since I was little," Karen said with a smile. "So I love hearing that they're inspired by me."

defeat of the Giants. The previous week, Bradford overcame a rocky first-half start on the road. He rebounded with a 14-of-17 second half to help the Vikings snap Carolina's 14-game home win streak.

"I'm sure there weren't a lot of people who expected us to come in here and [win]," Bradford said following the Panthers game. "This is probably as tight a locker room as I've been a part of."

Bradford's new teammates agree. Chad Greenway has played with 13 starting quarterbacks over his 11 years with Minnesota. When it comes to Bradford, Greenway appreciates his humble personality and blue-collar mentality that fits so well into 7immer's team

Greenway said he and his teammates quietly observed Bradford when he first arrived, and they were impressed by his work ethic.

"Sam has the personality to fit in pretty much anywhere," Greenway said. "It doesn't take long for a guy to get our respect when he's doing things the right way."

In addition to Rudolph, Diggs has built a fast chemistry with Bradford. The locker neighbors have connected 18 times in Bradford's three starts. Diggs said he appreciated Bradford's balance between respecting Bridgewater's role with the team and simultaneously becoming a leader.

"He knows that it's his team right now," Diggs said. "He's not really too pushy, [but] he brings that fire and charismatic attitude. He wants to play, and he wants to do everything so that we can get a win.

"The combination of humility and bringing that energy is enough to fill the void or take the bull by the horns," Diggs added.

Bradford can relate to Bridgewater's challenge.

"I know what it's like going through that rehab," Bradford said. "I wanted to make it known that I was available and willing to talk to [Teddy] about it. And then I asked him if he could please be here as much as possible to help me out, I would really appreciate that, too."

Hill said Bradford fits right in.

"There's a saying - if you're not a humble person, this game will humble you," Hill said, "Sam kind of endeared himself to the Minnesota fans very quickly and this locker room very, very quickly."






he power and speed combo of Danielle Hunter stunned Panthers left tackle Michael Oher and quarterback Cam Newton.

Newton, the reigning NFL MVP, has often dazzled his way past defenders and mimicked the motion of Superman revealing the S on his chest.

The Vikings, however, had a pocketful of Kryptonite, containing Newton between the tackles, recording eight sacks, totaling a dozen hits and forcing three interceptions.

The safety by Hunter provided the first two points of 22 in a row. It was the culmination of extensive hard work transforming a physique that began earnestly as a beanpole - albeit a fast one – to one that would impress any bodybuilder.

Hunter's path to the Vikings began about a decade ago with a youthful game of tag.

Born in Jamaica in 1994, he moved to the United States at age 8. After a relatively short stop in New York, the family settled on the western outskirts of Houston.

Jerry Holmes looked out of his apartment where his son, Jermel, was on roller skates and playing with neighbors.

"I saw something blow by, kind of running, and I got up to see," Holmes recalled this summer.

"I asked my son, 'Who is your friend?' "

The next questions for young Danielle, who was not on skates when he caught Jermel, were about his age (11) and if he wanted to join the youth football team that Holmes coached.

"I've never seen a kid that size move like that." Holmes said. "It was incredible. like a gazelle."

Varoy Davis, another youth coach, said Hunter's speed presented a unique challenge.

"He was blowing past all of the plays, so we devised that we'd give him a two count before he took off because he was just blowing past the runner," Davis said.

The most impressive aspect that Danielle showed wasn't on the field. It was between plays and after games. He would pick up the players he knocked down and make friends with foes.

"They knew he was something special because of his speed, but they just gravitated toward him because of his attitude." Holmes said. "He would crush his opponent, but his opponent wanted to be friends with him. He would give out candy to the opponents."

Hunter has carried the values instilled in him early and is committed to maintaining them long after football.

"The one most important thing they always stressed to us was being a better man to your family," Hunter said. "Football is not always going to be there, but your family is always going to be there, so the type of man you are is always going to be there, and that's what they remember you for."

Blazing speed is one thing, but strength is also important in football, particularly on the defensive line.

The weight room at Morton Ranch High School has a board displaying the top lifts in the history of the program. Hunter's name is second with a power clean of 305, and Head Coach Dave Meadows has a picture of Hunter in his LSU college uniform.

Looking at the chiseled Hunter, who will turn 22 this month, it's hard to imagine, but a few feet from where his name and picture are displayed sits a rack and the same bar that brought him to his knees during a squat attempt.

He was about 6-foot-2 and 180 pounds but made it to 210 by his junior year.

"The main thing that I had that most of us didn't have was speed, so I just had to live in [the weight room]," Hunter recalled. "I'd be happy for rainy days because I used to walk home, so it would make me stay after school and lift more."

Meadows, who had coached Super Bowl 50 MVP Von Miller at DeSoto High School, arrived at Morton Ranch during Hunter's sophomore season.

Meadows frequently tells players about Hunter's character and commitment.

"If there was ever a poster boy for what can happen to you in the weight room if you sell out to it, he was it," Meadows said, "You couldn't have a better role model."

When Hunter received a scholarship to LSU, he called his five youth league coaches.

"There were five grown men all choked up, just proud," Davis said.

They've remained connected through three years at LSU and into Hunter's second year in the pros. He finished second among rookies with 6.0 sacks in 2015 as the NFL's youngest player.

Hunter blossomed under Vikings defensive line coach Andre Patterson and assistant Robert Rodriguez. He's also gleaned tips from veterans like Brian Robison and Everson Griffen.

In addition to the tools and techniques that were added to Hunter's repertoire, he worked hard this offseason, training with Adrian Peterson under the guidance of James Cooper at O Athletik, a 33,000-square-foot gym that Peterson and Cooper opened in Houston this spring.

Hunter kept pace with receivers and safeties during laps at a nearby track, then continued to impress during grueling workouts.

Cooper had heard from Peterson that he was going to enjoy working with Hunter. Peterson was right.

"Danielle, I call him, 'Action Figure' because he has this body and looks like an action figure, someone out of Marvel Comics," Cooper said. "His body is ripped up, he's big. ... When Adrian tells me I'm going to like somebody. I get excited."

Peterson texted Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer and General Manager Rick Spielman this summer, 'Hey, when Hunter comes back, you're going to see a different beast.'

"He was already a beast." Peterson explained, "but I knew with how hard he was grinding to finish those workouts, that it was going to reflect on the field."

U.S. BANK STADIUM CONTINUES TO IMPRESS.

A pair of representatives from EA SPORTS spent two days in August digitally scanning and photographing the Vikings new venue, looking for even the smallest details to add to the popular "Madden" video game.

While the duo's focus was on enhancing the stadium in the game, they couldn't help but gawk at the impressive 1.75-million-square foot venue.

"Different people like different things, but it's one of my favorites for sure," said Jared Morton, a senior environmental modelist who has worked on the "Madden" franchise for the past eight years. "(We) were commenting on this ... it looks good on the outside and the inside.

"There's a lot of stadiums that look good one or the other," he added. "With this one, they really took the care to give it a flair."

Environmental modelist Erwin Tibayan said U.S. Bank Stadium stood out like no other. "This is the prettiest football stadium I've ever been in," Tibayan said. "The design and architecture (of the stadium) just calls to me ... the truss work is really pleasing to the eye." Both Morton and Tibayan said the clear ETFE material that covers 60 percent of the stadium's roof is a feature unlike they've worked with before. The duo spent nearly 10

hours at the stadium one day trying to get a feel for how to replicate the shadows from the roof trusses on the field.

"This is really advanced and a really unique stadium, which is something I really appreciate," Morton said. "The most unique thing, and the biggest challenge for us, is the fact that it's essentially half covered and half uncovered.

"We have stadiums that are partially covered and hybrid stadiums where the roof opens and closes," he added, "This is the only one where you have the sun coming in through the (roof) where you can see the shadows on the ground."


Morton said players and the game play garner most of the attention during the game but that the stadiums are the "stars of the show" because they're so widely seen.

Although U.S. Bank Stadium is featured in the current version of the game, Morton said the company built the stadium based off architectural renderings.

Morton digitally scanned nearly the entire stadium. He said he was documenting interior details such as the video and ribbon boards, signage and concourses as well as signature elements like the Gjallarhorn and the ETFE material

EA SPORTS, which was in the stadium for the first time, also got images of the Delta Sky360 Club, an area players walk through as they take the field.

"There are always some changes between the architectural design and what was actually built," Morton said. "So we're picking up all

that and getting a much more accurate piece of reference."

Tibayan described their roles as putting together a jigsaw puzzle.

Morton estimated that he took about 80 digital scans of the interior of U.S. Bank Stadium. The 3D scanner sat on a tripod, which Morton carried every 60 feet or so to take a new scan. Each scan took two minutes and 45 seconds.


The scanner captured a 360-degree view as a laser hit a spinning mirror inside the device at a 45-degree angle. Scans captured details up to 300 meters away, meaning those taken inside the stadium on the west end could capture the surrounding cityscape outside U.S. Bank Stadium through the wall of glass.

Morton also took a more in-depth scan on the Norseman logo at midfield that took 30 minutes. Tibayan shot thousands of photos to add even more details of the stadium. EA SPORTS used to digitally create stadiums for game play by using only photographs but started digitally scanning them a few years ago.

The duo also spent a day documenting the exterior of the stadium, including the surrounding buildings. Morton said he took 40 scans outside of the stadium and captured the first wave of buildings of the downtown Minneapolis skyline.

He said U.S. Bank Stadium will give "Madden" fans an incredible experience. Some stadium enhancements are expected to be implemented this season while all will be in place for the 2018 "Madden" game.

"We want it to feel live and real," Morton said. "Maybe not like you're in the stadium, but you're watching on TV but controlling what's happening."






"It's always fun working with kids, because they have a ton of energy and excitement, and the simplest things - just seeing guys like us - make their day," Trattou said.





In 2015 Vikings Women was founded with the mission to increase, empower and further connect female fans and corporate women, and the impact they have through Minnesota Vikings Football. While football has traditionally been viewed as a male-dominated sport, the Vikings have been making efforts to engage their female fan base. This week, we explore the Truth Behind the women of the historical Viking Age.

We often think of Vikings as men only. This is wrong, at least if you refer to Scandinavians in general. Women could be as far-travelled and battle-minded as men were.

Women filled many other roles, too. Whether as queen of the land or ruler of a household, women wielded power, especially in the absence of their mate. Others toiled as slaves, sometimes kidnapped from foreign countries. Women could be heathen sorceresses and

priestesses, or in Christian times perform pious deeds and act as influential patrons of churches

One Swedish runestone tells of a woman setting off on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, a 5,000-mile journey! Most women stayed on the homesteads, performing tasks traditionally allocated to them. Some women were rich and could bequeath much property to their heirs. Viking society afforded women a relatively high status, although never full equality.

Women followed men on settlement journeys, to Russia, France, Britain, Iceland. Greenland and North America, Here, Gudrid had Snorri, the first European reported to be born in the New World. Gudrid married three times, was shipwrecked, made a pilgrimage to Rome and became a nun in Iceland after her return. A true example that women in this culture were every bit as 'Viking' as the men.
