



THE OPPORTUNITY TO GIVE BACK TO THOSE WHO GAVE ALL IS A DEEP AND SINCERE HONOR.

PURPLE HEARTS REUNITED is a non-profit organization whose mission is to return lost or stolen medals of valor to veterans or their family members. The organization, which was founded in 2012 by combat-wounded veteran and active duty Army National Guard officer Zachariah Fike, has located and returned medals to more than 150 veterans or their family members.

The Vikings are pleased to welcome Purple

Hearts Reunited today as the organization presents Purple Hearts to family members of Pfc Selvin Nygaard and 1st Lt. John Frederick Voge, who were injured while fighting in World War I.

These reunions are part of a project to return 100 World War I Purple Hearts before April 6, 2017, the 100th anniversary of the United States' entry into World War I. The medals presented today are the 16th and 17th returned during this initiative.

GAME BALL

Today's game ball was delivered by a skydiving team of former U.S. Navy SEALS, who landed in The Commons and delivered the ball to a joint services guard made up of active duty members from each branch of the military service.

NATIONAL ANTHEM

The National Anthem will be performed by "The United States Air Force Ceremonial Brass Quintet," representatives of a premier ensemble based in Washington, D.C. A moment of silence will be observed prior to the National Anthem to honor those who have fallen during service to our country.

TODAY'S COLORS

Prior to the National Anthem, a full-field American flag will be presented by active duty members of the United States military. Members of the Air Force, Army, Navy, Marines, and Coast Guard will comprise a 160-person guard representing all active military men and women.

HALFTIME SHOW

Rising country star and SONY recording artist Luke Combs will perform as members of each branch of service unfurl flags honoring each branch. Twin Cities-based a cappella group Home Free will conclude the performance by singing "God Bless the USA."

PLAYER TO WATCH: CB XAVIER RHODES

IN RECENT SEASONS against the Lions, Xavier Rhodes has played the part of Calvin Johnson's shadow, following the former Detroit receiver to all parts of the football field. The Lions replaced Johnson with Marvin Jones this offseason. Jones has stepped in seamlessly in his first season and has joined veterans Anguan Boldin and Golden Tate to already combine for 107 receptions, 1,366 yards and nine touchdowns this season. Rhodes is also part of a group that has been incredibly effective this season, teaming in rotation with Terence Newman and Trae Waynes and working with nickel corner Captain Munnerlyn and Vikings safeties to prevent deep passes. Opposing quarterbacks have only completed seven of 25 pass attempts of 21-plus yards for 201 yards with no touchdowns and four interceptions for a passer rating of 21.0.



PLAYER TO WATCH: WR MARVIN JONES

MARVIN JONES ISN'T CALVIN JOHNSON, but he's helped the Lions fill the void created by the retirement of the franchise's all-time leader in catches (731), receiving yards (11,619) and receiving touchdowns (83). Jones joined the Lions as a free agent this offseason and quickly has made a mark in the MoTown. Jones debuted with games of 85, 118, 205 and 74 yards in his first four games with the Lions on 23 combined catches. His most notable performance came at Green Bay in Week 3, when he posted six catches for 205 yards and two touchdowns against the Packers. The Los Angeles Rams limited Jones to season lows of two catches for 10 yards on Oct. 16, but he bounced back with four catches for 94 yards the following week in a win over Washington. He enters today's game with 36 catches, 656 yards and four touchdowns this season.

DID YOU KNOW? JONES WAS SELECTED IN THE FIFTH ROUND OF THE 2012 NFL DRAFT BY CINCINNATI WITH THE 166TH OVERALL PICK WHEN VIKINGS HEAD COACH MIKE ZIMMER WAS BENGALS DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR. JONES SET A BENGALS FRANCHISE RECORD WITH FOUR RECEIVING TOUCHDOWNS IN ONE GAME AGAINST THE NEW YORK JETS (OCT. 27, 2013).

The 18.2 yards-per-catch average by Jones this season is 5.3 above the 12.9 he averaged per catch in Cincinnati. Jones ranks fifth in the NFL in receiving yards this season.

You joined the Vikings as an undrafted free agent and are now the team's full-time fullback. What has that journey been like?

I guess it's the underdog story, but that's OK. It's the NFL; it doesn't come easy. That's why it's so few and far in between, guys that play at this level. They preach that to you in high school, but I never believed that, the stats. It's all about what you want to do, and I wanted to play. I wanted to contribute and not cost this team, so I've been working hard every day, and that carries over to game day.

You've earned a reputation for having great work ethic. Where does that blue-collar mentality come from?

My parents were really good at making you My parents were reany got. We were well taken earn everything you got. We were well taken care of, but as far as if you wanted something, you had to do chores, or you had to start your own little lawn-mowing business, which I did. Then I had a really blue-collar football coach, a lot like [Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer]. I don't think we took the pads off until the day after the game. We wore them Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and then played the game on Friday in pads. It's just something that's been ingrained in me from a young age.

As someone who scored 3 touchdowns on only 12 touches last season, what's it like to get into the end zone as a fullback?

You know, you take it for granted because it's in the playbook, and you think this is kind of how things go. But then you play behind guys like Jerome Felton, [whose only touchdown in his first eight seasons was a fumble recoveryl. You can't take those for granted. Those are precious moments, and it helps your team out a lot. When you get your number called, you have to make something happen and trust the guys in front of you to do their job.

After playing both offense and defense in high school, how did you end up solidified as an offensive player?

Linebacker was always my spot - I loved the defensive side of the ball. Ball hunting was fun for me. But the first day of spring ball, I was running out of the tunnel with SMU, and Coach [June] Jones grabbed me. He saw that I had running back tape, and he asked me if I wanted to play running back. I just wanted to see the field any way possible as a freshman, so I said, 'Sure.' I didn't really think it was going to last - I thought I'd just be helping out over there and then get back to linebacker. I even had people tell me, 'If you want to get to the NFL, you need to go back to linebacker,' [but] their stories changed by year two. I just kind of embrace change, embrace every situation that I'm in. That's kind of what I've done up until this point, and I don't plan on changing that.

Which NFL players did you watch and admire growing up?

A I didn't really watch the NFL, honestly. I watched the NHL. On the Red Wings, the "Grind Line" is what they called it. You had Darren McCarty, Kris Draper and guys like that out there who were just grinders. They were hard workers, blue-collar, didn't ask for praise, and by not doing

that, their teammates spoke about them highly. Steve Yzerman was one of those guys - I have his jersey. I kind of caught on to what makes you a good player, a good leader.

What's the best advice you've ever been given?

Great players never take a play off.' That was just something my high school coach always told me. He told me that one time when I was really tired, playing both sides of the ball. I was running back to the sideline for another play call, because I was playing quarterback that game, and he just mentioned that really quick, and I snapped into another gear. That kind of just stuck with me - I think it was the moment and the situation that he said it that kind of ingrained that in my mind.

After welcoming your daughter Blake in 2015 and with another daughter on the way, what's your favorite part about being a dad?

If you're mentally stressed here – this is the most fun game in the world, a team game, but you get stressed - it's just one of those things where you can go home and no matter what, it just clears your mind and puts a smile on your face. My wife, McKenzie, does a good job of sending me pictures and stuff when we're traveling, and it kind of just makes everything better. My daughter is definitely the highlight of my day.

LEARNER 10 LEADER

WHEN KYLE RUDOLPH CAME TO MINNESOTA AS A ROOKIE, HIS PRIMARY GOAL WAS LEARNING FROM HIS VETERAN TEAMMATES. IT WASN'T UNTIL LATER THAT HE REALIZED HE MAY JOIN THEM IN THE RECORD BOOKS.

Last week at Chicago, Rudolph hauled in five catches, totaling 213 career receptions and bypassing former tight end Visanthe Shiancoe, who tallied 208 catches during his time in Minnesota, for 16th all-time and second among tight ends. He needs four touchdown catches to pass six-time Pro Bowler Steve Jordan for the most by a Vikings tight end, something he's only recently considered.

"The stats aren't something that, when I came here I thought, 'Oh, I'd love to be an all-time record holder in these categories,' "Rudolph said. "A lot of these are getting brought up as I'm getting closer to them. But it's awesome to be right up there with those guys and to be noticed and named in the same sentence."

Rudolph is grateful to not only be included in conversations with Shiancoe but to have also shared a locker room with him. The two overlapped during Rudolph's debut season in 2011. Rudolph first met Shiancoe – along with Jim Kleinsasser (1999-2011) and Jeff Dugan, who was with the Vikings through the 2011 offseason – when he arrived in Minnesota after being drafted 43rd overall. Rudolph passed Kleinsasser's 192 career receptions in Week 3 at Carolina during a seven-catch, 70-yard game that included a touchdown.

"Between those three guys, you had nine years, nine years and 13 years of NFL experience," Rudolph said. "They were great to me – not only being hard on me as a rookie, making me do my 'rookie duties,' but then also teaching me the ropes.

"They really took me under their wings [...] in terms of getting established in this league and learning how things go," Rudolph added. "That made everything in my second year seem so much easier because I'd been through it all."

The torch was passed to Rudolph in 2012, when he assumed the starting tight end position he continues to occupy.

In just his second season, Rudolph was viewed by teammates as a leader in the locker room. He's taken that responsibility seriously from day one.

"I've always been of the mindset of leading by example," Rudolph said. "And not only being professional at the building but professional off the field and in the community as well."

Whether it is through mentoring younger players, speaking up in the team meeting room or taking the lead for community events at the U of M Masonic Children's Hospital, Rudolph has noticed a development in his leadership style over the years.

"As we're here in my sixth year, which I can't believe, you kind of develop the more vocal aspect of things," Rudolph said. "It's always been easy for me to lead by example and do the right thing, but being a vocal leader and being a guy that can go to guys and try to elevate their game is something I've had to learn over my career."

At 26, Rudolph is no longer considered a spring chicken by NFL standards.

"As we get younger and younger as a team, when you're a guy that's been around six years and you're looked at as one of the older guys on the team, I just try to make sure that I'm there for the young guys," Rudolph said.
"It wasn't long ago that I was in their shoes, and I remember what it was like."

BRINGING UP BRADFORD

Most recently, Rudolph took a new teammate – albeit an older one – under his wing.

The few days following Teddy
Bridgewater's season-ending injury were
a blur. When the Vikings traded picks on
Sept. 3 to bring in Sam Bradford, Rudolph's
elder by two years and a day, Rudolph said
he made an effort to be there for the new
quarterback in whatever way possible.

"Being in this system for three years, I feel like I have a pretty good handle around it," said Rudolph, who offered support across the board, from the playbook to the layout of the facility itself. "Just anything I could to help him and make his transition from Philly to here that much easier, so he could just worry about going out and playing football."

As it turns out, Rudolph and Bradford play football pretty well together.

Bradford's first start in purple came Week 2, Minnesota's home opener that saw the Vikings defeat the division-rival Packers.

On third-and-4 in the second quarter, Bradford stepped back in the pocket, looked pressure in the face, and fired with precision. He connected with Rudolph, who snagged the perfectly placed 8-yard pass in the end zone over Packers safety Morgan Burnett.

Rudolph, who also grabbed the first preseason touchdown at U.S. Bank Stadium, said it was special to have the first end zone moment "that counted" in their new home.

"It was fun, because it was actually a play that we had watched that Sam liked and wanted to get called," Rudolph said. "You'll always be in Vikings history in that stadium, and kind of being around and seeing it go up, playing outside for two years, just everything that goes along with the stadium, and then having the first Vikings touchdown in it is pretty cool."

Immediately after scoring, the two made another exchange – this time Rudolph handed the touchdown ball to Bradford, his first as a Viking.

"He did all the work; I just caught the ball," Rudolph said. "So I thought that he deserved it."

In addition to that play, Bradford has connected with Rudolph 26 times and for another two scores.

Adapting to a brand-new passer in such a stunted period of time can be challenging, but Rudolph has taken the process in stride. After all, Bradford is the eighth quarterback from whom Rudolph has caught a pass in six regular seasons.

"As you transition from each quarterback, as a skill position player, it's really just about getting as many reps as possible," Rudolph said. "The only way to get on the same page with a quarterback is getting out there on the practice field and throwing it. So our offensive staff has been awesome in terms of making sure that we were able to get on the same page and play catchup with [Sam].

"He's a great guy, and he wants to be really, really good," Rudolph added. "He puts the time and the work in, and when you have guys like that, especially at that position, I think it kind of trickles down throughout our whole offense."

To Rudolph, Bradford's presence in the locker room means more than gaining a talented teammate to help guide the offense. It's a show of faith in the 2016 Vikings potential.

"We bring in a guy who's a former No. 1 overall pick and a Heisman Trophy winner –

he's über talented," Rudolph said. "It's creating excitement out there for us, knowing that the organization is willing to go out and give up a first-round pick for a guy because they think that we have a chance of being really good right now."

SPINNING THE WHEEL

One individual with weight in the Bradford decision was Vikings tight ends coach Pat Shurmur, who was promoted to interim offensive coordinator this week.

Rudolph said he was excited to learn that Shurmur would be the new position coach for 2016. Shurmur's NFL experience is extensive, including time as both an offensive coordinator and a head coach.

According to Rudolph, Shurmur is a coach who not only understands offense but also understands the dynamics of working with a group of men.

"He knows how to visualize and see things globally from an offensive standpoint," Rudolph said. "[He's added] some new things that we hadn't done in the past, but as he said when he got here, 'The wheel spins great. I just want to make it spin a little bit better."

Rudolph said whether it's his first year in the league or his sixth, he's always learning, and Shurmur has been instrumental in improving Rudolph as an athlete.

In turn, Shurmur has nothing but praise for Rudolph, whom he followed during his college days and first five seasons in Minnesota before having the opportunity to coach him.

Shurmur said his role with the Vikings has granted him an "even greater appreciation" of Rudolph.

"I knew when we evaluated him coming out of Notre Dame that he was going to be an outstanding player, but he's a better receiver than I could have imagined," Shurmur said. "He catches the ball extremely well when he's in traffic and is a much better blocker than I thought he would be."

Rudolph's team-first mentality impresses Shurmur on a daily basis.

"All skill players want to catch every pass that's thrown. That's just the nature of being a skill player," Shurmur said. "But he understands that there's many other things that are part of his job description that he has to do, and he handles those extremely well."

When PFT Commenter continued interacting with Rudolph via Twitter using "Big Country," it was clear the nickname was here to stay.

Vikings Entertainment Network and GHMW designed a corresponding T-shirt, and the moniker not only stuck but went viral across social media platforms.

Rudolph then developed the idea to use the concept as a way to raise money for the "Kyle Rudolph's End Zone," campaign, an effort to build a state-of-the-art patient family-centered space at Masonic Children's Hospital. Shirts will soon be available for purchase, with all proceeds benefiting the new hospital space.

Volunteers worked together to move and load pallets of personal care products and Matter boxes into vehicles of 10 partnering organizations - including Minnesota Coalition for Battered Women, Mary's Place and Catholic Charities - that delivered the products to women's shelters.

Vikings fans will have another opportunity to team up with Matter and pack boxes outside U.S. Bank Stadium prior to the Cardinals game on Nov. 20.

Last month, Rudolph added one more job description to his resume: father.

Rudolph and his wife, Jordan, welcomed twin daughters, Andersyn and Finley, to their family on Oct. 4. The new dad couldn't have been happier with the timing of the bye week, which allowed him to be home with the girls for their full second week.

"It's been awesome. They're the most perfect babies," Rudolph said. "They've really spoiled Jordan and I [...] I wouldn't have guessed that three weeks into it I'd be getting this much sleep."

Added Rudolph with a laugh: "Which is good, because I love sleep."

Rudolph said his pursuit to be the best player he can be hasn't changed, but his motivation behind that goal has shifted some with the girls' arrival.

"There are two sets of eyes that will always be on me," Rudolph said. "I can only imagine that as these girls get older and they continue to watch, there will just be a little added pressure, but also a little extra support and love that you get when you go home whether it's after a tough loss or a big win."

Rudolph hopes there's a lot more of the latter in store for this season. While recognizing the obstacles the Vikings have faced through injuries to key players this season, Rudolph's faith in the team is unwavering.

He said he's never been around a team that was so driven and so resilient.

"There's a goal in mind: winning a championship," Rudolph said. "No matter what adversity we face, we don't feel that we can be derailed from that goal."

Diggs had been drafted in the fifth round the previous week to enter pro football. The 20th receiver off the board that year immediately showed that he planned to be professional in his approach.

"You only get one time to make a first impression, and I know from day one, I wanted them to know I was serious," Diggs said. "That was the first time that I got my playbook and in the swing of things. I wanted to approach it the right way."

No quarterback, no football, no teammates were there. It was just Diggs, blades of grass and a full-day's-worth of notes.

"I had my notepad with me, all the notes I wrote down, all of the plays, saying the plays out loud so I could hear them."

Diggs likened the session to a reader taking another trip through a passage to boost comprehension, but he's only just begun writing his story with the Vikings.

Receivers coach George Stewart said Diggs has shown "great passion for the game" since arriving in Minnesota.

"He loves to play the game; he loves to practice," Stewart said. "Going back to his first night here as a professional, he was on the field way after dark, running routes on his own.

"His passion is there," Stewart added. "It wasn't false. It wasn't fake. It was just him."

Diggs' behind-the-scenes work as a rookie understudy prepared him for the part in Week 4 at Denver. He had six catches (tying a Vikings record for receptions in a debut) and 87 yards (third-most in a debut with Minnesota) against the Broncos.

Diggs followed with 129 yards against Kansas City in his first game ever in front of the Vikings faithful. His next encore was a 108-yard showing that included a 36-yard flying touchdown catch at Detroit and made him the first Vikings rookie since Randy Moss to post consecutive games with at least 100 receiving yards.

The following week, Diggs turned a short pass into a gametying, 40-yard touchdown that helped Minnesota claim its first win at Soldier Field since 2007.

"That's God-given skills. It's nothing that you teach," Stewart said. "You'd like to think you teach them, but those are God-given, and he is blessed with a skillset that most of the better receivers in this league are blessed with, and that's a reason he's playing on Sundays. He's a very talented young man."

Diggs ranked second in the NFL among rookies with 52 receptions and 720 yards in his first campaign, but he wasn't satisfied. He's remained committed to "sharpening my blade" and continuing to improve.

"If they tell you that you need to do a lot of things better, you need to do a lot of things better," Diggs said. "Self-criticism is the best way to approach it. Each day you've got to get better at something you did wrong and just over-study and watch your opponent."

The Vikings and the NFL were shocked when Teddy Bridgewater suffered a dislocated knee on Aug. 30, just days before the regular season, elevating Shaun Hill and creating a situation where the Vikings executed a trade to acquire Sam Bradford on Sept. 3.

Diggs helped quarterback Hill in the Sept. 11 season opener, and the former Maryland Terrapins players connected seven times for 103 yards at Tennessee.

"Shaun is still a great player. He's a smart player, been around the game a long time," Diggs said.

The two had built rapport and confidence a year ago at training camp when Diggs was working with the second team. That wasn't the case at all for Diggs and Bradford, but the quarterback found Diggs nine times for 182 yards in their first game action to help Minnesota defeat Green Bay in the first regular-season game at U.S. Bank Stadium.

Bradford said that Diggs "just kind of popped" out on the first few film clips of the Vikings he watched and "was pretty much unstoppable" against the Packers.

"You just kind of notice him," Bradford said after the Week 2 win. "He's always getting separation, he seems to always be finding a way to get open."

Diggs hauled in receptions of 46 and 44 yards, as well as a beautiful 25-yarder for a touchdown.

"Sam has an amazing arm. Some people know it, and some people don't. I've seen him make throws like that all day," Diggs said. "For those things to happen in a game and for them to click the way they did, it's amazing. I like to keep things as simple as possible.

"I'm out there trying to get open and make a play for my guy," Diggs added. "He got hit on the play, too, trying to do everything he can to give me a chance.



You've got two guys trying to do everything in their power to make a play."

Diggs became the third Vikings receiver to post 100-plus yards in Weeks 1 and 2 of a season, joining Gene Washington and Hall of Famer Cris Carter, and he did so by playing much more in the slot than in his rookie year.


The Vikings have started Diggs at an outside receiver position but also moved him inside, Stewart said, to allow him to take advantage of the whole field and open spaces.

Diggs calmly downplayed the added responsibility, as well as the hard hits that can confront receivers in the middle of the field.

"It's not like - I mean, I've never been scared of contact, so it's not too much of an adjustment, just doing what you can for your team.

"It's more so spacing and understanding where you're at and timing and being where you're supposed to be when you're supposed to be there," Diggs added. "On the outside, it's one-onone more often."

Diggs posted eight catches for 76 yards and a touchdown on Monday at Chicago. He leads the Vikings with 35 catches and 466 yards this season.

"It means a lot. I think about it a lot, the people that go out and do that, not only Eric and not just the Army, there are people in all branches of the military that have gone over, served and done things that I can't even imagine," Cole said. "I have the utmost respect for them and the things they do. They go over, do what they've got to do, take care of business and do it for us."

Pfc Hario was 19 when he died in combat in Afghanistan on Aug. 29, 2009. He had fulfilled his lifelong dream of serving in the Army and enlisted in June 2008, shortly

after graduating from Monroe High School. A member of the 1st Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment, Pfc Hario was awarded the National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Army Service Ribbon and the Parachutist Badge.

Cole was a year older than Pfc Hario. who wore No. 62 and played offensive and defensive line and wrestled in high school.

"People back home, to this day, there's so much support for Eric and his family. They're just so proud of who he was and what he did," Cole said. "That's the kind of guy he

was. He was commitment, a team guy, always working hard. In the offseason, he was in the weight room with everyone, kind of running it, was real strong. He was a great guy, and that was kind of always his goal, to serve in the military.


"He wasn't just going to be in the Army, he wanted to become a Ranger," Cole added. "He was mentally tough."

Cole said Pfc Hario's legacy has been continued at the school.

"They always tell all the kids the story because we're proud of him," Cole said. "I think his jersey is the only number that's retired. They tell everyone every year that this is a guy to look up to who paid the ultimate sacrifice."

After finishing his collegiate career at N.C. State, Cole was selected in the seventh round of the 2012 NFL Draft. He has played 48 games, including each one this season. Cole served as special teams captain in Week 3 when Minnesota defeated Carolina and is a core special teams player under the direction of Mike Priefer, who flew helicopters during his service in the Navy. Cole said Priefer's service is highly

respected by teammates.

"I think the military instills so many characteristics and qualities of discipline in people," Cole said. "Coach Priefer, it's where he learned them, and he instills those kinds of things in us. It's always great when Prief' starts telling us a story. All eyes are locked in on him, and everyone is so interested. He takes pride in it. I think that's a good thing."

This seat stands out amidst a sea of purple. All black, it is decorated with the POW/MIA logo that was established during the Vietnam War. The POW/MIA logo and flag has been extended to military personnel in all conflicts and honors the 1,618 U.S. military personnel missing and unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War.

The seat is located in Section V8 and is part of the Medtronic Club level. It sits in front of a wall that displays the seals of the five branches of the United States Military: Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard and Air Force.

Current soldiers stand guard over the seat during Vikings games, and there is a changing of the guard ceremony between quarters. A plaque accompanies the seat and says:

"WITH REVERENCE WE HOLD THIS SEAT OF VALOR FOR THOSE BRAVE MEN AND WOMEN, LIVING AND DEAD, WHO SACRIFICED IN THE LIMELIGHT OF HONOR AND GLORY THAT WE MAY HAVE FREEDOM. THEY WILL NOT BE FORGOTTEN."

Since formation in 1970, the National League of POW/MIA Families has sought the return of all prisoners of war, the fullest possible accounting for those still missing, and repatriation of all recoverable remains.

Organizations like the National League of POW/MIA Families have worked to locate 965 U.S. personnel since the end of the Vietnam War in 1975. Another 63 personnel were recovered and identified before the end of the war, but the search continues.

This seat at U.S. Bank Stadium is a strong reminder of their courage, service and sacrifice.





"HONOR YOUR LEGACY. DEFEND THE NORTH"

Outside of U.S. Bank Stadium, fans are greeted by the Minnesota Vikings own versions of runestones. These structures help as wayfinding for fans searching for gates, stores and other locales around the stadium. Other stylized runestones line the team entryway and spit flames as players take the field. All of these structures are modern creations, but have their origins in Viking history. This week we explore the Truth Behind Viking Runestones.

The monumental runic markers are the most lasting of all Viking accomplishments. We know of more than 3,500 runestones from Scandinavia and in the Viking colonies on the British and Atlantic Isles. More than 80 percent of all runestones are found in Sweden.

Viking runic markers usually consist of undressed blocks of stone. They stand at roads and bridges or on grave fields. Almost all are

memorials to a deceased person. Many rune carvers sign their inscriptions. Some contain an obituary, 'He died in England', for example. Runestones were news outlets in Viking times, even a sort of Twitter.

Nearly all runic monuments are Christian, and only a few are pagan. Many runestones are ornamented, typically with a snake pattern or a dragon. The serpent body frames the runic inscription, curving along the face of the rock. Red paint made the carving stand out, and occasionally other colors were used, too.

The Danish king Harold Bluetooth triggered the real runestone fashion, starting in the 960s. On his stone he boasts of having converted all Danes. Soon, everyone rich enough joined the fad, combining the Norse hunger for an immortal reputation with the desire for eternal life offered by the new religion.
