





PLAYER TO WATCH: CB MACKENSIE ALEXANDER

ALEXANDER IS HEADING INTO HIS SECOND PRO SEASON with a more defined role on the Vikings. The 2016 second-round pick out of Clemson has been running with the first team at nickel cornerback since Minnesota opened training camp on July 27. The nickel cornerback is used in the slot, a position that is becoming more and more necessary in the NFL as teams, including the Dolphins, incorporate three-receiver sets. After playing Alexander at outside cornerback and in the slot last preseason, Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer and defensive backs coach Jerry Gray have primarily worked with Alexander in the slot this offseason.

SPLASHY ENTRANCE: ALEXANDER PUT IN PLENTY OF WORK LAST PRESEASON, PLAYING 40 SNAPS AGAINST THE BENGALS, 58 AGAINST THE SEAHAWKS, 39 AGAINST THE CHARGERS AND ALL 71 AGAINST THE RAMS. HE WAS CREDITED WITH 17 TACKLES BY PRESS BOX STATISTICIANS, FOUR PASS BREAKUPS AND TWO INTERCEPTIONS.

Alexander recorded an interception in his first road game and his home debut during the 2016 preseason. Alexander intercepted Keith Wenning to open the fourth quarter in Minnesota's game at Cincinnati to start the 2016 preseason slate. He also picked off San Diego's Mike Bercovici when the Vikings hosted the Chargers to open U.S. Bank Stadium.

PLAYER TO WATCH: TE MARQUEIS GRAY

THE FORMER GOLDEN GOPHERS quarterback and receiver has returned to Minnesota, this time as the Dolphins tight end. In 2016 Gray caught a career-best 14 passes for 174 yards, played in all 16 games and made seven starts. He is part of a group that was enhanced on March 9 when Julius Thomas (acquired in a trade from Jacksonville) and Anthony Fasano (rejoined team that he played for from 2008-12) were added. Gray has totaled 26 career receptions for 318 yards (12.2 yards per reception) but is still searching for his first pro touchdown.

RECORD PLAYER: GRAY SET SCHOOL RECORDS FOR RUSHING YARDS BY A QUARTERBACK IN A GAME WITH 174 ON 27 CARRIES AGAINST. ILLINOIS AND RUSHING YARDS BY A QUARTERBACK IN A SEASON WITH 966 ON 199 ATTEMPTS AS A JUNIOR IN 2011. HE PARTICIPATED WITH QUARTERBACKS IN THE 2013 NFL SCOUTING COMBINE BEFORE TRANSITIONING TO TIGHT END. GRAY'S TIME OF 4.73 SECONDS IN THE 40-YARD DASH WAS THE FOURTH FASTEST BY A QB AND WOULD HAVE RANKED EIGHTH AMONG TIGHT ENDS.

In 2016, the Dolphins became the fifth NFL team for which Gray has played. He began his pro career with San Francisco as an undrafted free agent in 2013. After his release from the 49ers, Gray was claimed by the Browns. The Vikings claimed him via a similar situation the following year. He was released in November and joined the Bills. He was signed by Miami in 2016 and re-signed in December.

TIMEOUT WITH JOE BERGER

"VERSATILITY" IS JOE BERGER'S MIDDLE NAME. OK, NOT REALLY, BUT IT COULD BE.

FROM HIS COLLEGE DAYS to now entering his 13th NFL season. Berger has learned to roll with the punches and play at his best in whatever role is asked of him.

Berger garnered attention at Michigan Tech, where he started 28 games at right tackle. He auditioned for teams at the 2005 NFL Scouting Combine and was then a sixth-round draft pick by Carolina.

After training camp and preseason with the Panthers, however, Berger joined the Dolphins for the 2005 regular season. From 2005-10, Berger spent time with Miami, Dallas (2007-08) and then returned to Miami. He primarily held a special teams role before starting 20 games at center during 2009 and 2010.

Berger signed with the Vikings in 2011 and played in 13 games, making starts at center, right guard and left guard.

"Coming up here, the area just kind of felt like home," said Berger, a Michigan native. "It was nice to get back up in the Midwest.

"It's just been a place where I was able to be the swing guy for a while, learn from some good players that were ahead of me and just settle in a little bit," Berger added.

He was called on in 2013 to fill in at right guard and left guard, and in 2014 he started the final nine games of the season at right guard. In 2015, he started all 16 games for the first time of his career, this time at center. Last season, he started at center and both guard positions.

• You've played with a lot of different offensive line • You've played with a local ... groups. What makes the 2017 unit special?

• I think the best thing we have in our current A. group is just that they come ready to work. So we know that we have things we have to improve, and I think the guys come in open to that, and we all just want to get better.

Besides not snapping the ball, what is the biggest **1.** adjustment between C and G?

 I think at center, you have a lot of pre-snap stuff \mathbf{h} . you're thinking about - getting everybody lined up, everybody's relying on your call, so there's a lot that you're doing before you snap the ball. And then I think after the ball is snapped, there's just space that you're dealing with at quard that you don't have at center. So it's just getting used to that space that you have.

• You earned a mechanical engineering degree from Michigan Tech; what is it about that field that you're passionate about?

A. I just love the idea of taking a raw material and making it into something, whatever that is. I have a woodshop at home that's kind of my hobby. Just being able to take some pile of something and turn it into something useful. The whole manufacturing end of it, I guess, is what really appealed to me. You know, that's what I was trying to get into until I got invited to the combine. So I would like to do that at some point. It's been a little while since I got the degree, but hopefully someone will have me.

1. Do any special projects of yours especially stand out?

• There's been things along the way, like furniture $oldsymbol{h}_{oldsymbol{\cdot}}$ here and there. I made a dresser for the house and some other little things like that. My dad and I finished the upstairs of the garage that [my wife and I] stayed in for six years, kind of as our 'crash pad' back in Michigan. So just little things around the property that you're able to do yourself and not have to rely on other people.

As a guy who enjoys the outdoors, have you found a favorite fishing spot in Minnesota?

↑ • I haven't had a chance to get out too much $oldsymbol{h}_{oldsymbol{\cdot}}$ here. We go out to Michigan a lot when we can, because the [in-season schedule] is busy. Newaygo is on the river, so when I get a chance to go out with someone there, it's fun. I'm not the greatest fisherman in the world, but if I'm in the right boat with the right person, I can catch fish. I'd probably be able to catch fish with B-Rob (Brian Robison).

LOVE AT FIRST SIGHT

KENNEDY POLAMALU'S FIRST INTRODUCTION TO

THE VIKINGS RUNNING BACKS COACH popped in the tape and leaned back in his chair: Cook versus Miami.

"Probably the first film that I put in was him against Miami, because that's his hometown – to see how he plays and how he reacts," Polamalu recalled. "And then him against Clemson, another big opponent. And the bowl game against Michigan ... you want to see how he reacts."

National stage games and hometown crowds could easily offer distractions, but Cook showed nothing but focus.

"The kid loves football," Polamalu said. "He is very competitive, and his enthusiasm is contagious."

First impressions are important, and Cook made a positive one on Polamalu before ever meeting him.

As a junior at Florida State, Cook recorded 150 rushing yards on 27 carries and added a 59-yard reception for a touchdown against Miami. And it wasn't the first time he ran all over his hometown school. Over three seasons and three matchups, Cook quieted the Hurricanes with 464 rushing yards and six touchdowns (four rushing, two receiving).

Cook racked up 169 yards and four touchdowns on the ground against Clemson in 2016.

The Seminoles' pro-style offense gave Polamalu snapshots of Cook in situation after situation that was comparable to the NFL.

"You see him run behind the quarterback, and then in the shotgun, you see him catch the football. You see him check protection," Polamalu said. "And those are things that are usually very difficult to watch because a lot of colleges are in the tempo, shotgun offense."

Cook finished his college career as Florida State's all-time leader in rushing yards (4,464) and rushing touchdowns (46) in just three seasons. In December, he played in the Orange Bowl, once again on a Miami stage. Cook led the Seminoles to a one-point victory over Michigan and was named the game's MVP after racking up 207 yards of offense (145 rushing, 62 receiving).

And when he traded in FSU's Garnet and Gold for Vikings Purple, Cook hit the ground running.

On the first play of his first NFL game, Cook felt the weight of the ball in his hands. He took the handoff from Sam Bradford out of the shotgun formation and surged ahead, barreling through a knot of bodies for a gain of 5 before being taken to the ground.

Second play, another handoff, this time from the pistol for a 4-vard gain.

Third play, third-and-1. Bradford took the snap out of shotgun, this time passing it to Cook in the flat for a first down.

Cook played the first three series of Minnesota's 17-10 defeat of Buffalo. The rookie running back's numbers were modest but memorable on the night of his 22nd birthday: five carries for 13 rushing yards and four catches for 30 yards through the air.

"It was definitely fun, getting that first carry," Cook said after the game. "Once you get that out of the way, you can really get going and play football."

He prides himself on versatility.

"Going out there and catching balls," Cook said. "If they split me out wide, if they freerelease me out of the backfield, whatever it is, I just have to help my team win games. That's what they brought me in for."

Just a handful of months ago, the Vikings couldn't envision a scenario in which Cook landed in their laps.

Leading up to the NFL Draft, Polamalu studied film on each and every drafteligible back. He scouted, he evaluated, he had a wish list.

"I didn't think we even had a chance at drafting him," said Polamalu, who had tracked Cook's success since his time at Miami Central High School.

Polamalu said he was asked about Cook by Vikings General Manager Rick Spielman.

"I really had him ranked going, you know," Polamalu said, using his hand to demonstrate an imaginary measurement above his head. "I didn't think he was even going to be close to where we were going to be drafting."

The Vikings, who had traded their 2017 first-round pick in exchange for Bradford the previous September when Teddy Bridgewater went down with a seasonending knee injury, weren't slated to pick until the second round at No. 48.

But Cook kept slipping through the cracks, staying on the board through the first night of the draft. On the second night, Spielman and the Vikings traded up to the 41st overall pick to snag Cook.

"You're just hoping," Polamalu said. "And then when it came true, now it was trying to build an environment and teach him some of the skills needed not only on the field but off the field as well."

The rookie has been more than receptive to that environment. Through rookie minicamp, OTAs, training camp and now three preseason games, Cook has taken each new step in stride. Bradford has played with a number of rookie backs over his first seven seasons in the league and said Cook's ease of transition has been impressive.

"He's just really sharp," Bradford said. "Mentally, for him to be able to come in and grasp everything that we've asked him to do and asked him to learn, I think that's been one of the more impressive things about him."

Added Bradford: "We put a play in, we put a protection in, we put a scheme in, and it's like he's got it."

The quarterback stressed that the offense hasn't catered to Cook in any way by creating special plays for him, and the team hasn't been limited in what it asks him to do.

"I mean, we've pretty much thrown everything at him, and he's shown that he's able to handle that," Bradford said.

One aspect of the game Cook continually works to further develop is his vision, a quality he believes sets him apart from other running backs in the league.

While he relies on physical ability and quick feet to surge him through holes, it's Cook's vision that "puts my body in place to make the plays." He explained that hitting the gym and training his eyes are equally important - especially when practicing against Minnesota's defense.

"In the NFL, the holes close real guick," Cook said. "[You're] coming to a hole, it may look wide open, but you've got d-linemen like Linval [Joseph], and he's just so smart where he'll just wait on you to come back. And I think my eyes put me in a place to do that - take the next hole, which might be the better hole, stuff like that."

Polamalu said that since arriving in Minnesota, Cook has welcomed any instruction that can help him improve his vision and every other facet of his game.

"He's always trying to improve, and that's what's fun," Polamalu said. "He's a coachable young man - very coachable. He listens and takes it, and then he uses and applies it. I couldn't ask for more as a position coach."

Cook is now grateful for the opportunity to apply the things he learns from coaches and his veteran teammates on game day.

In Cook's second preseason game - and second start - against the Seahawks on Aug. 18, he played two offensive series and recorded 40 rushing yards on seven carries, including a 15-yard burst. He added a 10-yard reception.

"I thought he displayed good vision," Offensive

Coordinator Pat Shurmur said of Cook's Seattle performance. "He's trying to do what we're coaching him to do, yet he's very natural in his ability to run the football. There were a couple seams he hit there that were pretty tight that became almost explosive runs.

"You see a guy that's disappointed when he doesn't make the safety miss," Shurmur continued. "That's a good thing because one of those times when the safety does miss, that could be a touchdown."

Minnesota's playbook is a little larger than Florida State's, but Cook has embraced the challenge. With three preseason contests now under his belt and just over a week separating the rookie from his first regular-season game in the pros, Cook is chomping at the bit.

"I love the game," Cook said. "I love everything that comes with it. The winning. The losing. The brotherhoods. The fans. The relationships that you make, the people that you meet. I love this game. It's all I know."

Cook will have the opportunity tonight to once again face a Miami squad, this time at the highest level. Against his hometown team, he'll take the field of his adopted home, ready to make plays and win over the hearts of Minnesota.

And on Sept. 11, Cook hopes to lead the Vikings to a season-opener win over Adrian Peterson and the Saints. Just like he can envision where holes will appear in the defense, Cook has been picturing that day for as long as he can remember.

"I always dreamed about playing Monday Night Football in my first game," Cook said. "So it's going to be unreal. There couldn't have been a better way to start my career."



"Kids in Miami play football at the age of 4 or 5, and it's real contact. They take it seriously," Xavier Rhodes said. "Me, I think I played at the age of 10 or 11, so I was more of a guy that was into wrestling, but once I got into football and I realized I could do well in it, that's when I took it seriously."

Rhodes, 27, starred as a running back and receiver at Norland High School before becoming a cornerback at Florida State. The position switch worked well for the 2013 first-round pick who recently signed a contract extension with the Vikings.

Before Teddy Bridgewater, 24, helped Louisville trounce Florida in the Sugar Bowl and became an eventual first-round pick, he quarterbacked a powerhouse at Northwestern.

Just three years after helping Miami Central win a 6A state title with a 223-yard, fourtouchdown game, Dalvin Cook gained 207 total offensive yards on Michigan in the Orange Bowl on his path to the 2017 NFL Draft, where Minnesota selected him in the second round.

Rhodes, who learned about others ahead of him and continued to progress, heard about younger players' reputations growing with each play on the gridiron. He made a vow to help other Floridians as they reached for their goals, not knowing he was destined to become teammates with Bridgewater, Cook and others in Minnesota.

"Yeah, I knew about them," Rhodes said of Bridgewater and Cook. "Once you know about them, once you figure them out and hear about them, and I've been hearing about those guys because Dalvin went to Central. When I was in high school, I played Central a lot. Northwestern was the big school in Miami, so I knew about Teddy, too.

"Those were the guys when they were coming out that I knew about and felt I always had to look out for, and we all looked out for," Rhodes said. "It was a great feeling, to know that your friends and people around you grew up in the same neighborhood as you."

In addition to Rhodes, Bridgewater and Cook, the Vikings 90-man roster includes 10 other players who prepped in Florida. Rookies Stacy Coley (Northeast in Oakland Park) and Danny Isidora (Cypress Bay in Weston), Emmanuel Lamur (King's Academy in West Palm Beach) and Jabari Price (Ely in Pompano Beach) all have ties to the Miami area.

Coley and Isidora were even able to stay close to home for college and suit up for the Miami Hurricanes.

Coley said he was inspired to play football by a cousin who coached him in youth football.

"He inspired me to live out my dream, and my high school coach was Coach [Donnell] Bennett from Northeast High School who played at the University of Miami," Coley said. "He was a mentor and a father figure to me and just kept me going every day.

"Going to the University of Miami changed my life and my family's life," Coley added. "It was a great experience. My family could go to all of the games and have that journey with me, so they could experience my journey."

Isidora also appreciated playing for Miami and values the opportunity to represent his home and school well as a pro.

"[Attending Miami] was really important to me because I love where I'm from, and I went there to do the best I could to make it better," Isidora said. "Another thing was I wanted my family to come out there and be able to support me. It's a great school, a great location, the best decision I've ever made. I'm glad I made that decision, and it wasn't anywhere else."

Isidora also was familiar with Cook and Joe Yearby when the running backs teamed together in high school. Cook opted for Florida State, and Yearby wound up joining the Hurricanes and running behind blocks by Isidora.

Isidora and Coley were thrilled to continue as teammates via their selection by Minnesota in April. They also said it has been helpful to have so many Miami Vikes in the locker room who can relate to their experiences growing up and help them adjust to a new environment.

"We have a lot of pride," Isidora said. "We don't want to let ourselves down, our family down, our school down, me and Stacy, so we're just out here trying to get better every day."

One thing is for certain, as they progress as professionals, the influence of Miami will stay with them if they are like Rhodes and Bridgewater, who did considerable

charity work and continued to rehab his knee at home before reporting to training camp. Bridgewater has remained strong in his recovery efforts.

Cook, who was raised by his grandmother, partially credited Miami's football culture for his successes.

"I feel like I have a good football IQ, coming from where I come from." Cook said during training camp. "We take football very seriously at a young age. This is what I love to do, so why not put all the hard work into it?"

Reaching the next level isn't just a point of pride: it's a necessity. Football in Florida isn't just a way of life. For many neighborhoods, it's the way to a better life.

"Basically, growing up there helps you realize you have to grow up fast. Everything in Miami is fast living," Rhodes said. "You grow up in a neighborhood that's a poor neighborhood, you have to live fast, you have to go out there on your own and find your own way, so growing up there, I was probably 12 and had the mind of a 20, 21-year-old guy."

Inland from the sandy beaches lined with high-rise condos and the manicured mansions on the Intracoastal Waterway sit more modest houses. Instead of an adornment of gently swaying palms, pitfalls await.

"People want to do better for themselves and family, and they choose football as a way out," Coley said. "Everybody puts all of their focus on football and one day lives out their dreams to have success with football.

"It's real competitive. You have young people out there going at it," Coley added. "You have different rivalries, people going to school and talking about the game that's coming up, Friday, Saturday, it's just real competitive down there. We like to compete and have fun"

Rhodes said football is the most visible positive path for many Miamians, and he's tried to emphasize to young players to take advantage of athletic scholarships to further their educations

"When you're from Miami, you feel like you have two options, and that's to play football or be in the streets, and the thing is, the fact that we're able to take the positive route and make that change shows a lot," Rhodes said. "We try to take everyone in, try to change everyone's life in Miami, but we try to bring everyone that is playing football in and have them spread the word and knowledge and go the same route because we know how big football has been for us."

Rhodes, who was able to enter the NFL Draft early, plans to finish his college degree. He said he's also tried to encourage the next wave of young players to have a backup plan in case football doesn't work out.

"We get a full scholarship because of something we're blessed with, and that's talent. God has blessed us with talent, so why not take advantage of that free scholarship and try to get our degrees, and if we don't make it to the NFL, that will be our backup plan," Rhodes said. "Now we have to take another step and encourage kids not only to worry about football and making it to the NFL but worrying about getting a degree and figuring out something outside of football."

Rhodes tells young people that less than 1 percent of players make it from high school to the NFL and adds, "'I'm not trying to kill y'all's dreams, but that's the God's honest truth, so you guys have to have a backup plan in case you don't make it.' "

Coming off his first Pro Bowl and signing a contract extension, Rhodes is definitely living his dream, but he can relate personally to friends who haven't been able to do so.

"I know a lot of kids, a few of my friends that didn't make it to the league and felt like they were failures," Rhodes said. "They wanted to take it to the utmost and commit suicide. I feel like if we tell those guys to take advantage of education and not worry too much about sports, which we all know we want to be NFL players in Florida, but if we take our education seriously, we'll be all right."



YOUNG DEFENDERS

THE VIKINGS HAVE SENT WAVES OF ROOKIE DEFENDERS CRASHING INTO OPPONENTS THIS PRESEASON.

Defensive ends Tashawn Bower and Ifeadi Odenigbo and defensive tackle Jaleel Johnson have each made plays behind the line of scrimmage.

First-year linebackers Elijah Lee and Eric Wilson have recovered fumbles, and Ben Gedeon has recorded 11 tackles and seven solo stops (according to press box stats).

"So far so good," Bower said recently of the Vikings rookie class. "We're all coming along and take coaching and all are down with the plays. We all hustle to the ball and we have great effort."

The players will have one final game setting to campaign for a spot on the 53-man roster or consideration for the Vikings practice squad during tonight's game against Miami to conclude the 2017 preseason.

Their jobs will be to challenge the Dolphins but also to make decisions tough for Vikings talent evaluators and coaches who must reduce the roster from 90 to 53 players on Saturday.

"There's several spots where we're going to have some tough issues," Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer said. "That's why it's good to have the fourth preseason game to get another chance to see them. This week will be a big week for a lot of these guys. Some of these young defensive lineman have looked good. Jaleel Johnson has had a couple good ball games, Ifeadi [Odenigbo] has done a nice job in some areas, [Tashawn] Bower, [second-year pro Stephen] Weatherly. So they're showing some things that could be valuable for us down the road."

Bower recorded a sack in his first two games, and he did so against the Seahawks with the Vikings defense facing a difficult situation. The undrafted rookie out of LSU dropped Trevone Boykin for a loss of 10 after Seattle began its first possession of the second half at the Minnesota 18-yard line. Odenigbo followed with another sack two plays later, forcing the Seahawks to settle for a field goal.

After being required to pull up and avoid contact against Vikings quarterbacks during the offseason program and training camp, Bower said defenders have enjoyed the opportunity to finish plays.

"It's good," Bower said. "It's something you don't get to do often, but once you have the opportunity, you better make it."

Bower has eight tackles, 2.0 sacks, three tackles for loss and three quarterback hurries. Odenigbo has nine tackles, one sack, one tackle for loss and two quarterback hurries.

A switch by coaches of Johnson to the 3-technique defensive tackle spot allowed him to show a "bulldog mentality" against Seattle, totaling five tackles, including a pair for losses. He also had a sack at Buffalo.

"I thought Jaleel Johnson played well, Bower had another good day," Zimmer said. "Ifeadi, 'Big O' that's what we call him, I thought he did some good things too. So, those three guys, they've kind of stepped up."

Wilson has been credited with 11 tackles so far and defended two passes against the Bills, and Lee has six tackles.

Bower has been able to learn from third-year pro Danielle Hunter, a former Tigers teammate. Hunter hosted Bower on his official visit to LSU and helped Minnesota "recruit" Bower to sign with the Vikings after the draft.

Similar to Hunter's approach when he arrived in Minnesota as a third-round pick, Bower has paid attention to all of the little details and said he wants to continue to improve against the run.

As for the success on pass plays, Bower credited coaching and teamwork, along with a burst of power.

"I'm just using my combination of speed and power and all of the techniques that Coach teaches, it takes all four guys to get a sack, so it's not just me helping out."







HONORING A VIKINGS ORIGINAL & 1 OF THE '50 GREATEST'

ED SHAROCKMAN, #45

The Vikings would like to honor the memory and express condolences to the family and all friends of Ed Sharockman, who passed away on Aug. 19 at the age of 77.

Sharockman was a member of the original Vikings squad, joining the fledgling team as a fifth-round draft pick in the 1961 NFL Draft, and one of the 50 Greatest Vikings.

Born in St. Clair, Pennsylvania, Sharockman played collegiately at Pittsburgh before he was selected by the Vikings – and the Dallas Texans (22nd round of the 1961 AFL Draft). The Dallas Texans became the Kansas City Chiefs in 1963 and wound up playing the Vikings in Super Bowl IV.

Sharockman ranks third in Vikings history with 40 interceptions - trailing only Paul Krause and Bobby Bryant. He led Minnesota in the category four times (1962-63, '65, '70) and is one of four players, joining Bryant, Joey Browner and Antoine Winfield, to lead the Vikings in interceptions in four separate seasons.

He also ranks third among Vikings cornerbacks in games (141) and starts (126) and second behind Krause in yards after interceptions. Sharockman totaled 804 yards and three

touchdowns on interception returns.

Sharockman also forced six fumbles and recovered nine, including one that he returned 88 yards for a touchdown in 1962.

Vikings Historian and former Head Athletic Trainer Fred Zamberletti recalled his days with Sharockman.

"Ed always would tell you how many times he's broken his nose," Zamberletti said.

"Ed was a great athlete, not only in football but in basketball," Zamberletti added. "It was back in the day when we were having to play some great quarterbacks like [Johnny] Unitas, people like that. Ed would get very uptight before a game. He'd get nervous as hell."

Sharockman, however, intercepted Unitas twice on Dec. 16, 1962, and intercepted Earl Morrall twice on Oct. 25, 1971. All told, he had seven games with multiple interceptions, including a career-best three against the Boston Patriots and former teammate Joe Kapp on Dec. 13, 1970.

"He was a great teammate," Zamberletti said. "You knew Ed was going to give everything he had and was always going to show up. He was not a complainer. He was the kind of guy that players liked."

A SEA OF 350 YOUNG PEOPLE, grades one through eight, filled Winter Park in May for the inaugural and free Mike Zimmer Foundation Football ProCamp that was sponsored by Medtronic.

The young people tossed and caught footballs, learned fundamentals about the game and listened alertly to messages about healthy and active living and the importance of approaching life with a positive attitude.

"It's good to be here. It's important for us to give back to the community and be able to invite these 350 kids here to this camp." Zimmer told members of the media. "Obviously, all free. We want to make sure that we're combining sports, athletics and education and healthy lifestyle with everything. ... My daughter, Corri, who runs the foundation, has done an unbelievable job, and I think the kids are having a lot of fun."

A much "more congenial" version of Zimmer, the Vikings head coach, strolled across the turf, gently offering tips to the excited yet attentive campers.

Zimmer was joined by his son, Vikings linebackers coach Adam Zimmer, and youngest daughter, Corri, who has led the Mike Zimmer Foundation since its launch in spring 2016.

As the Zimmers glanced across the gridiron, each camper's smile reminded them of Vikki Zimmer, a loving wife and mother who passed away in 2009. Vikki's giving spirit and

the way she put others first has guided the Mike Zimmer Foundation.

"I was talking to my dad earlier. I leaned over and just thought, 'My mom would love this,' " Corri said, "It's cool to see it come to life after all of the planning and process, just to see these kids have a great time. Promoting a healthy and active lifestyle is a really important message when they're at a young age."

Adam, who was reminded of attending Emmitt Smith's camp during his youth, said the scene was "exactly what [his mom] would have wanted."

"She was always wanting to give back to the community," Adam said. "She always put herself last, so we're trying to carry on her spirit in terms of what she taught us in terms of being generous. We're all blessed to be in a great situation where we can do this. Hopefully she's looking down on us and smiling right now."

A total of 200 spots were reserved for Boys & Girls Clubs, and the remaining 150 were available on a first-come, first-served basis, Zimmer and his former boss. Cincinnati Head Coach Marvin Lewis. are the only two NFL coaches who host camps. He was asked to compare his approach to instructing the youth to when he coaches the Vikings.

"Much different. I'm a lot more congenial, I guess, is a way to say it," Zimmer said. "I see a lot more positives than negatives. To me, it's these kids having fun and enjoying the sport

and enjoying getting out and doing things."

Vikings assistant coaches and players, including veterans Brian Robison, Harrison Smith, Kevin McDermott and Stephen Weatherly, helped with the camp. Rookies Jaleel Johnson, Jack Tocho, Elijah Lee, Dylan Bradley, Shaan Washington, Horace Richardson and Eric Wilson also participated, jumping in scrimmages with the campers and working together in a drill that stressed the importance of communication and teamwork.

The Mike Zimmer Foundation also distributed \$10,000 scholarships to Minnesota high school seniors Noah Sanders and Randy Cuate Galarza this summer and recently donated 80 backpacks filled with supplies to The Salvation Army. Visit mikezimmerfoundation.org to learn more.

to know our guests! It is fabulous learning about their backgrounds and forming relationships with them. Some of them come back after visiting me, just wanting a hug!"


