



THE VIKINGS AND BEARS are closing out their regular seasons in Minnesota for the third time in four seasons. Today's NFC North rivalry game is the 114th time the teams have met (includes one postseason game). The Vikings have a 59-52-2 edge in the series that began with Fran Tarkenton coming off the bench to throw four touchdowns in Minnesota's inaugural regular-season game (Sept. 17, 1961) for a Vikings upset victory.

Minnesota clinched the NFC North two weeks ago with a 34-7 win against Cincinnati

and followed with a 16-0 shutout at Green Bay. The Vikings can secure a first-round bye and the No. 2 seed in the NFC Playoffs with a victory. Minnesota is aiming for its 13th victory, which would be the second-highest total in a regular season in franchise history.

The Bears gave the Vikings quite the challenge in Week 5, tying the game at 17 early in the fourth quarter. An interception by Harrison Smith, however, enabled Kai Forbath to kick a game-winning field goal with 12 seconds remaining.

PLAYER TO WATCH: DE DANIELLE HUNTER

DANIELLE HUNTER, A THIRD-ROUND PICK IN 2015, is wrapping up his third pro season and first as a starter. Hunter ranks second on the team with 7.0 sacks and 11 tackles for loss this season, making an impact on opponents' efforts to run and throw the football. Hunter has a blend of speed and power when he's going forward and the agility to drop into covering a tight end. The Vikings defense enters today's game ranking first in the NFL in yards allowed (280.9) and points allowed (16.1) per game. He also been part of a Vikings defensive effort that has allowed just 19 runs of 10plus yards this season, which is the fewest in the NFL and is on pace to be one of the best seasons by any team since 1991. The 1995 San Francisco 49ers allowed 20, and the 2008 Pittsburgh Steelers allowed 22.

DYNAMIC DUO: SINCE 2015, HUNTER AND EVERSON GRIFFEN HAVE COMBINED FOR 57 SACKS. WHICH IS TIED WITH CINCINNATI'S GENO ATKINS AND CARLOS DUNLAP FOR THE MOST BY ANY PAIR OF TEAMMATES IN THE NFL. HUNTER (7.0), GRIFFEN (13), BRIAN ROBISON (3.0) AND TASHAWN BOWER (1.0) HAVE COMBINED FOR 24 SACKS THIS SEASON. WHICH IS THE FOURTH-MOST BY A TEAM'S GROUP OF DEFENSIVE ENDS.

PLAYER TO WATCH: S EDDIE JACKSON

EDDIE JACKSON HAS HAD AN IMPRESSIVE AND IMPACTFUL DEBUT season for Chicago. Selected in the fourth round with the 112th overall pick of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Alabama, Jackson has started each game this season. Jackson has totaled 61 tackles (league stats), including 50 solo, and ranks fourth and fifth in the two categories, respectively. He also has six passes defended with two interceptions. Jackson has forced one fumble and recovered three. Jackson garnered NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for Week 7 when he returned an interception for a touchdown and a fumble for a touchdown in a 17-3 win over Carolina. Big plays were common in college for Jackson, who was one of the Crimson Tide's permanent captains in 2016 and was named Second-Team All-SEC by the conference's coaches despite a leg injury that ended his final season at eight games.

FIRST TIME FOR EVERYTHING: JACKSON BECAME THE FIRST PLAYER IN NEL HISTORY WITH TWO DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS OF 75 OR MORE YARDS IN THE SAME GAME. HE RETURNED AN INTERCEPTION 76 YARDS AND A FUMBLE 75 YARDS FOR BOTH BEARS TOUCHDOWNS IN A 17-3 WIN AGAINST THE PANTHERS IN WEEK 7.

Jackson totaled 303 yards (a school record) and three scores on nine career interception returns at Alabama. He ranked seventh in FBS in 2015 with six interceptions and scored twice.

"We always played with a football, but we didn't know it was a team sport, an organized sport," Treadwell recalled.

Treadwell and his brothers checked in with their mother, jumped on their bikes and followed their new friend.

As Treadwell pedaled his bike up a hill and reached the crest, he saw it.

"There were cheerleaders, there were players on the field, everywhere," Treadwell said. "I can still picture it to this day, when I went over that hill and just saw all the activity.

"It was something we'd never seen because of where we were from, there was [a lot of] violence, and there weren't any organized sports [outside] of school," Treadwell said. "And when we got there, it was like. 'Wow. This is a whole new world.' "

Treadwell jumped in with both feet. While he hoped to be a running back, he was edged out by a boy named Lonnie - the two are still friends years later - and ended up playing fullback instead.

"But it was all good; we ended up going undefeated and winning the championship," Treadwell said. "I loved that moment, and I've loved football ever since then."

We caught up with Laquon for a recent Timeout:

• A lot of players are active in the community this time of year, but why did you decide on a recent visit with elementary students?

• Well, it is the holiday season, and I just thought A. it was necessary. I was less fortunate as a kid. I didn't get too many presents at Christmas, and my mom worked really hard. She was a single mom of six kids, so you know how tough that could have been. But she did what she could, and I've just seen myself as someone who can get out and impact some kids.

We went up [to the school], and I passed out some footballs and some presents, some player cards, and we had a pizza party. The kids were very excited from the time I walked in.

Then we went to the gym, and we did some exercises and threw some footballs around. They just enjoyed it, and it made an impact on them. It was good for me to see, it was a humbling experience, and I'll just continue to focus on working hard and giving back.

You talk a lot about wanting to be a positive influence; **U.** who made a positive impact on your life?

A: My mentors, Jerry Butler and Torian Moore. There were several men in my life that I leaned on and took knowledge and wisdom from, but those two were probably the most impactful. [My first youth coach] impacted my life tremendously ... He was our

head coach, and he just always taught us discipline and other things that help me even today.

I speak a lot about the story of Dwyane Wade coming to my elementary school because that made such an impact. And I still remember it, so I know it made a positive impact on my life and where I wanted to be. Every time I go to these schools, I just remember myself in those shoes.

1. Growing up in Chicago, did you watch the Chicago Bears **a** lot?

A: As a kid, I used to watch Devin Hester and Bernard Berrian, but I wasn't a Bears fan. I would also watch Marvin Harrison and Reggie Wayne [on the Colts]. I used to always hear Peyton [Manning] say "Omaha" - that's all we knew growing up and would joke about it as kids.

Growing up, all we used to see were cold games, snowy games, games playing in the snow - Brian Urlacher, Charles Tillman punching balls out - and just physical games ... the NFC North, all we knew was just hard-nosed, running the ball, Adrian Peterson. We just knew it was going to be a snowy, [gritty] type of game - that's all we knew, and that's how we played when we grew up.

How have you grown the most since being drafted in 2016?

A: I just have a better understanding of not just the game, but overall, just professionalism. It's one thing to be a great athlete, but it's another thing to be a professional – and I think every guy here does a great job of that. When I came here, I tried to figure out where I would fit in on the team, where my character on the team would fit in.

I'm a humble quy, but I'm a competitor. I didn't want to rub anybody the wrong way. I wanted to compete, I wanted to make plays, but it's also a business [and I wanted to] learn the business.

When I got here, I had to learn everything, and it was just being in the building every day and taking it a day at a time - going through the fire, learning, messing up, and I just think I've learned the professionalism of it and knowing how to be not only a great athlete but a great teammate and being coachable. I was always coachable, but the NFL is a different level. It's a different type of communication.

What do you think makes this 2017 Vikings team special?

A. I think the team this year is special because there's no selfishness.

If you look around the locker room, I mean, everybody wants to be "the guy" and everybody wants to contribute, but I think that's what fuels the team - everybody wants to be a part of helping the team win. And when it comes to Sunday, it all comes out on the field against the other team. There's no selfishness; everybody works hard. I consider myself a hard worker, but Adam [Thielen] and [Stefon] Diggs, they're working just as hard and probably harder. That's the biggest thing.

Everybody takes it a day at a time ... we're just going to work. And then we get to Sunday, and it's more fun when you know you've put in all the work throughout the week and you didn't leave any plays or give a coach a reason to say, "You didn't do this right," or "You didn't put enough effort in." If you watch our film, everybody's scratching and searching for a block or running routes, even if they're not getting the ball. If you look at other teams, guys are taking plays off, guys not blocking for the running back, so that's what makes the difference on our team. Everybody's unselfish and willing to do the extra to help our team win.



Second-year pro Stephen Weatherly remembers Robison saying, "We have a very talented room. Everybody has been working hard and producing. I understand what my role is, and I'm going to compete and push you the same way you've been pushing me."

Weatherly, who said Robison, Teddy Bridgewater and Adrian Peterson were three of the first Vikings to introduce themselves to the 2016 seventh-round pick, was impressed, even though the significance didn't fully set in until eighth-year veteran Linval Joseph elaborated.

"[Joseph] said, 'That's really big because you get a lot of guys who, once they lose that starting spot, will go into hole, become a recluse, shun themselves, won't help the younger guys," Weatherly explained.

Vikings defensive line coach Andre Patterson has shown film to younger players to illustrate the way Robison utilizes proper technique to defend the run. Patterson credited Robison for the way he handled the change with "professionalism and pride" and for his role in helping one of Minnesota's deepest position groups.

"It takes a huge man to do that, but most importantly, I think it's respect he has for Danielle and knowing that he played a part in the development of Danielle, too," Patterson said.

MULTITASKING

While it appeared on the surface that Robison's role would be reduced, he remains in a frequent rotation with Griffen and Hunter. Robison also continues to kick inside to defensive tackle in the Vikings nickel defense package, which he first did under Patterson and Head Coach Mike Zimmer in Hunter's rookie 2015 season.

Fans might remember Robison, a 2007 fourth-round pick, working in a similar capacity before becoming a starter in 2011.

"The first three or four years of my career, that's pretty much what I did," Robison recalled. "I was a nickel pass rusher at end or inside. I learned a lot from Kevin Williams, man.

"Kevin taught me a lot of the ropes on how to rush inside, what to look for in protections and things like that," Robison said. "I owe a lot of what I do now to what he taught me. He was a big role model for me when I came into the league."

Robison tied Williams and Hall of Famer Paul Krause for the sixth-most regularseason games by a Vikings defender (171) against Cincinnati when he notched 2.0 sacks, tormented the Bengals from multiple places on the field and helped the Vikings clinch the NFC North.

He joined linebacker Eric Kendricks in mugging the center before dropping into coverage and lined up behind Griffen before blitzing on another play. In addition to pressuring passes, he also made an impressive tackle on a short pass to force a punt in the fourth quarter.

"It's definitely evolved over the last few years," Robison said. "It's almost like I'm an end/3-technique/linebacker. Because of what we can do out of it and the different packages we can put together, offenses can't necessarily game-plan like they want to against what we're going to do.


"I like it because it's challenging," Robison added. "You really have to be on your Ps and Qs, but it's very fun because when you get out there, it becomes such a chess match against the opposing offense. They're trying to make their checks and calls, and you're trying to make your checks and calls, as well. It's fun to see it evolve."

Patterson said the more that the coaching staff worked with Robison, the more clear it became that he had the intelligence to handle coverage concepts that can change based on an offense's formation or routes.

"He's got to know all of the different coverage variables," Patterson said. "That's hard to do, so there's a great deal of respect for him and his knowledge of the game and of our system."

Robison has started one game this season - at Washington - and was instrumental in helping quell a late rally. With Griffen out because of a foot injury, Hunter slid to right defensive end and Robison played

primarily at left defensive end.

He was there on a key play in the third quarter when Washington tried a pass on a fourth-and-6 and knocked down the football as it left Kirk Cousins' hand.

"When the pressure is on the line. I have a comfort with him," Patterson said. "When it's late in ball games, and we've got to have it, 96 is going to be on the field some place because he has the ability to make a play when you need a play to be made, and he's going to play the running game exactly the way that you coach it to be done."

Robison was out with a back injury the following week against the Rams, but Griffen returned. The Vikings turned to Weatherly to play Robison's hybrid role.

"That was tough, just being in his shoes for that game and understanding the load he has to carry," Weatherly said. "Preparing for it is a little bit different than just playing standard defensive end. It's intense, so it made me appreciate what he does for us that much more."

'DRIVING FORCE'

Robison and his wife, Jayme, will celebrate their 10th anniversary in February. Jayme is an accomplished barrel racer who also operates a horse-breeding business.

They have two children: daughter Madelyn is 5, and son Parker is 3. The young Robisons already have become

transformative figures for their father.

"Before I had kids, it was about me." Robison said. "It was about what makes me happy, what motivates me, things like that. Once I had kids, they [became] my everything.

"They're my driving force, they're the reason I do what I do," said Robison, who raises money for K9s4COPs through his Reel 'Em In Foundation.

"I want them to look at me now, and 15-20 years from now, I want them to see the type of person that I was as a man, not necessarily as a football player," he added. "Everything I do is with them in mind. It was about what I wanted to do and how I wanted to be portrayed to people. Now, it's about how I want my kids to see me. I think that's probably been the biggest change."

my mentality, the way I am. I'm a loose guy. I'm care-free, and guys know that I love them.

"At the end of the day, they know I love them, and if there's something serious that needs to be talked about, I'm there. It's not just joking around from me. I've had to have serious conversations with guys about life issues, about issues with playing, things they can't control. They know I have a serious side to me but I'm also a light, goofy guy."

Second-year pro Stephen Weatherly has a theory on why teammates don't mind the barbs from B-Rob, the longesttenured Viking.

"It's just 'cause he's spent time getting to know people," Weatherly said. "B-Rob was one of the first people to come and introduce himself to me, along with Teddy [Bridgewater] and Adrian [Peterson].

"He was someone in my position group, and if I have any problems or questions, he gave me his number, so he really reached out and made that connection," Weatherly added. "He has that rapport. He's reached out to everyone, gave them his number, 'I'm here on your side. If you have questions, just hit me up. It doesn't matter what time it is.' Because he's always there for people, it's a brotherly love-type of thing, which allows him to do those zingers."

SUPER ROWL SURPRISE FOR HOLDER WITH HEART OF A VIKING

THE SNAP WAS ON POINT, THE HOLD WAS PERFECT AND THE KICK WAS GOOD.

While the 33-yard field goal that played out at U.S. Bank Stadium earlier this month didn't actually send the Vikings to the Super Bowl, it was a special moment nonetheless.

That's because the holder on the play was Danny Lilya, a high school junior.

Lilya, who is paralyzed from the waist down, is the holder for the Moose Lake-Willow River football program. He filled in for Vikings punter/holder Ryan Quigley to team up with long snapper Kevin McDermott and kicker Kai Forbath for a few kicks.

And when the one that imaginarily sent the Vikings to Super Bowl LII sailed through the uprights, the trio of Vikings congratulated Lilya, who was unaware of a special message that had popped up on the video boards at the stadium

"At first I didn't notice it. He kicked the ball, and it went through, I was watching to see if it went through," Lilva said, "Then I kind of saw the screen switch in the background, but I didn't really pay attention to it because I thought the screen was kind of doing its own thing.

"But then they started clapping and told me, 'We're going to the Super Bowl' and to look up there. Then it was like, 'Wow,' " added Lilya, who arrived at the stadium thinking he was just going on a tour and would meet the players.

Lilya was presented with two tickets to Super Bowl LII through the team's Heart of a Viking campaign. Lilya and a guest will be in attendance at the sport's biggest spectacle on Feb. 4, 2018, in Minneapolis.

"Once he realized it was real, it was awesome," Quigley said. "We tried to build it up a little bit ... Kai hit the game winner to go to the Super Bowl. It was a special memory for him."

Sheryl Lilya, Danny's mother, added: "I know he's excited because he's almost speechless. And he's never speechless."

Lilya was born with a broken back, and his parents knew that he would never walk. Instead of being aligned, his T-12 and L-1 vertebrae were off kilter, and there was excess spinal cord fluid in the area.

Yet despite having surgery when he was just 6 months old and being in a full-body cast for the following six months, Lilya has thrived.

"Not everybody who is disabled gets the chance to play sports, much less able-bodied sports," Lilya said. "For me to be able to play high school football ... a huge thank-you to my coach, Dave Louzek. It's helped me gain independence because I'm not playing sports with other wheelchair users. It's me all on my own."

Lilya plays sled hockey, softball and track, but has a special passion for football.

Although Lilya saw the field a few times as a freshman, he approached Louzek, the Rebels Head Coach, at the end of his ninthgrade season with a special request.

"He got on the field as a defensive player, end-of-the-game and last-play-of-the-game type situations," Louzek said. "At the end of [his freshman] season, he came to me and said, 'Coach, I'd really like to play an important role on this team.' He had the idea of being a holder for us.

"Danny is such a great kid," Louzek added. "In school, he's a great student, and on the field he's such a great teammate. He's very deserving of this honor."

Lilya has been the Rebels holder the past two seasons, and McDermott said he was a "great holder."

"Good hands ... big hands. He was making me look good," McDermott added.

Lilya said he would have been perfectly happy with meeting players and watching the specialists practice at the stadium.

But the fact that he is going to Super Bowl LII was hard to put into words.

"Unforgettable," Lilya said. "This is a day I'll never forget for the rest of my life."

"It was really exciting because I don't get out much, and when I do I'm usually sick or I just lie in bed," Madelyn said. "It's really special that we could come here and do this because most of these kids ... they forget [what] their real life [was like] before they got diagnosed.

"After you get diagnosed, everything is about treatment and getting better, so you don't get to do much," Madelyn added. "It was a night I won't forget." Joining Madelyn and the other young shoppers were Vikings teammates Harrison Smith, Xavier Rhodes, Terence Newman, Brian Robison, Kevin McDermott, Eric Wilson and Ben Gedeon.

"We just want you to have fun tonight and enjoy yourselves," Zimmer told the group. "We want you to have a Merry Christmas and a very speedy recovery."

The event was organized by Zimmer's daughter, Corri Zimmer White, who leads the foundation.

"It made all the work and all the behind-the-scenes stuff really worth it," White said of the abundance of smiles. "They didn't know that the players were coming. When my dad told them they were getting \$200 gift cards and the players were coming to help them shop, their jaws dropped."

Players were partnered with patients who scoped out items on their holiday

"[Zimmer has] always had a great heart," Newman said. "I don't think there's any better way to spend an evening than to help support something that is impactful for other people."

Robison spent time with a family as they picked out winter gear, and he quickly and quietly covered the rest of the bill to provide for the family.

"We take it for granted how blessed we are to just buy the things we want," Robison later said. "You see a family like that where they're getting things they absolutely need, it's just a way for me to give back."



THE COLLEGE FOOTBALL SEASON IS COMING TO A CLOSE, AND IT'S ANOTHER ONE IN THE BOOKS FOR VIKINGS LEGEND ROBERT SMITH.



The Vikings second-leading rusher in team history with 6,818 yards, Smith continued his broadcasting career this season as a college football analyst with FOX and FS1. Smith was part of studio pregame, halftime and postgame shows with Matt Leinart, Dave Wannstedt and Rob Stone.

After 11 years at ESPN, Smith moved to FOX in 2016. The Ohio State alum was excited that the network carried Big Ten for the first time this season, including the Buckeyes-Wolverines game last month and the Big Ten Championship earlier this month.

"They're all great guys, but Matt and Coach Wannstedt are two of the nicest guys you'll ever be around from football," Smith said during an interview earlier this year with Vikings.com. "It really is amazing, I mean like, truly genuine people, so they're a lot of fun to work with."

In addition to that, Smith has been busy parenting his 7-year-old daughter and

5-year-old son. He also is the CEO/Founder of Fan Health Network (fanhealthnetwork. com). The free app enables people to draw fitness, nutrition and wellness advice from current and former athletes, track workouts and compare results with others.

Smith's teams went 10-3 against the Bears. He totaled 891 rushing yards and five touchdowns on 155 carries and added 111 receiving yards and a score on 12 catches against Chicago. Smith had at least 80 rushing yards in seven of the 13 games.

Smith's most staggering game against the Bears was his final one. He rushed 23 times for 170 yards and a score in a 28-16 win at Soldier Field on Oct. 15, 2000. The output was his second-highest rushing total in a single game and helped fuel his 1,521 total rushing yards (third in Vikings history) in what became his final season.

Smith described what former Head Coach Dennis Green, who passed away in 2016, and former Offensive Coordinator Brian Billick meant to him, as well as his appreciation for

"Denny was like a father to me," Smith said. "He really was, not just in the way I met him before I got here, but kind of in the way that we interacted."

The two enjoyed fishing trips, Green's drumming sessions at Winter Park and talking about jazz off the field, Smith said.

"When it came time to play, I always had the sense that Denny, more than anybody else, believed that I could be the player that he always said I could be," Smith said. "It's something special to have a guy like that in your corner that's the head guy, so it was always a pleasure and an honor to be able to perform for myself and my teammates, but more importantly, the guy that was heading

As for Vikings fans, Smith said, "They're incredible, they really are, and they deserve a winner."

"I just wish - you know, we lost two of three championship games in that '98-2000 run - and I wish that we had a chance to bring a championship up here. The thing that struck me immediately about Minnesota is how nice the people are.

"The winters up here can be brutal, but the fans are always warm," Smith said.

"I like People's Organic, Agra Culture, French Meadow Bakery, and then for breakfast food, I'll do Keys Café and Bakery for a breakfast sandwich," Sendejo said. "It's usually one of those four."

Sendejo said becoming a delivery man gave him a greater appreciation for the jobs executed by Bite Squad delivery persons.

"It was cool to go do some deliveries," Sendejo said. "It was pretty cold that night, so it kind of gave you more appreciation for those people that are having to find houses in the cold or try and navigate through an apartment complex that they've never been to before."





ENERGY EFFICIENCY HELPS GARNER LEED GOLD CERTIFICATION

U.S. BANK STADIUM WAS DESIGNED TO BE BOLD — AND ENERGY EFFICIENT.

The U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) announced last month that U.S. Bank Stadium has received Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold certification. The Vikings home, designed by HKS and already considered one of the most challenging game environments for opposing teams, becomes only the second NFL stadium to achieve the Gold distinction.

"The design and construction team emphasized building a highly efficient facility and minimizing its environmental impact," said Vikings Owner/President Mark Wilf. "The certification of LEED Gold means we accomplished our goal, giving all parties and the state of Minnesota another reason to be proud of U.S. Bank Stadium."

U.S. Bank Stadium has 1.75 million square feet of heating and cooling area, but the venue's designers and builders were able to tap into NRG Energy Center Minneapolis, a centralized system designed to provide reliable heating and cooling throughout the downtown district.

The stadium is one of more than 100 buildings that utilizes the NRG underground distribution network for steam heat and chilled water for respective heating and cooling. This system prevented designers from having to build and operate an independent, expensive air conditioning and heating infrastructure.

As the most widely-used, third-party green building rating system in the world, LEED provides a framework to promote healthy, highly efficient and cost-saving green buildings. The Gold certification was the result of several design and operating features, including the following:

- U.S. Bank Stadium offsets 100 percent of its energy with renewable energy credits.
- An innovative design utilizing a single steel truss rather than two reduced the amount of steel needed for construction.
- U.S. Bank Stadium was the first NFL stadium to open with LED lighting. which consumes 75 percent less energy compared to a traditional metal halide.

- A sloped roof forms a lofted interior "heat reservoir," storing solar heat that acts as a natural snow melt system.
- The ETFE roof substantially reduces the need for daytime artificial lighting while offering benefits of natural daylight and passive solar heating.
- A sustainability program that is working toward the goal of becoming a zero waste facility and supporting green education with STEM tours for school groups.
- Harmful toxins were avoided with inclusion of healthy materials and healthy cleaning products that do not contaminate the indoor environment.

"The work of innovative building projects such as U.S. Bank Stadium is a fundamental driving force in transforming the way buildings are built, designed and operated," said U.S. Green Building Council President and CEO Mahesh Ramanujam. "Buildings that achieve LEED certification are lowering carbon emissions, creating a healthier environment and reducing operating costs while prioritizing sustainable practices. Because of U.S. Bank Stadium, we are increasing the number of green buildings and getting closer to USGBC's goal to outpace conventional buildings, while being environmentally and socially responsible and improving the quality of life for generations to come."

Michael Latawiec, Fan Ambassador for U.S. Bank Stadium, was born in the late 1980s and was one of the thousands of "Iron Crib" orphans born during the communist rule of Nicolae Ceausescu in Romania. Michael spent the first three years of his life in an overcrowded orphanage, never being held, played with or properly cared for. When news broke in the United States regarding the horrific conditions in Romanian orphanages, Michael's adopted aunt, Judy, knew she had to do something. Judy traveled to Romania with clothes, food and toys for the orphans.

"When Judy came back to Minnesota for Christmas, my adopted parents, Jennifer and Doug, told Judy they wanted to adopt a child from one of the orphanages," Michael said. "My parents chose to adopt me, then they flew over to Romania and then brought me back to Minnesota when I was 3 years old."

Michael spent the rest of his childhood growing up in a loving home with 13 other siblings, eight of whom were also adopted. Michael was diagnosed with a developmental learning disability due to the conditions in which he lived during the first three years of his life. He struggled with anxiety and depression as a young man, but in November of 2014, Michael attended his first jiu-jitsu lesson, and it changed his life. Since that first lesson, Michael's anxiety and depression have disappeared and in October of 2017, Michael won three gold medals at the World Special Jiu-Jitsu Championship in California!

On Vikings game days, Michael is at the Legacy Gate greeting fans and answering questions. When asked what he likes about his job, Michael said, "My favorite part is meeting people and making them happy because my mission in life is to bring hope and happiness to people. If I can make somebody forget about their problems for a couple minutes, bring that joy, smile and happiness to them, then they might gain a better perspective on life and go on with the strength to deal with anything!"


