Q. TELL US A LITTLE ABOUT YOUR ANKLE INJURY.

VIKINGS

VS. JAGUARS

THE VIKINGS HOSTED THE JAGUARS LAST SATURDAY IN THE SECOND PRESEASON GAME FOR BOTH TEAMS.

Not surprisingly, the matchup featuring the top two defenses from 2017 was quite the struggle. The Jaguars recorded four sacks, and the Vikings totaled six.

All three touchdowns scored were on 1-yard rushes (two by Jacksonville and one by Minnesota). The Jaguars benefited from a 56-yard punt return to set up the go-ahead score with 1:55 remaining.

Minnesota's third string tried to mount a comeback, driving 50 yards to the Jacksonville 16, but the drive stalled.

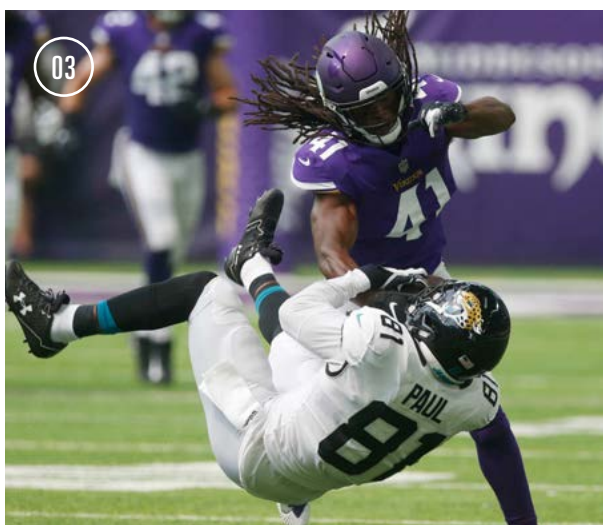

TONIGHT'S GAME FEATURES the Seattle Seahawks and the defending NFC North Champion Vikings in the third exhibition contest of 2018 for both teams. This will be the 17th time that Seattle and Minnesota have met in a preseason game. The teams are 8-8 in previous preseason games and are meeting for a third consecutive year.

Seattle has hosted 10 exhibition contests, and Minnesota has hosted five, including the first indoor Vikings home game (Aug. 19, 1982) at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome. The Vikings won 7-3.

The Seahawks also have the distinction of playing what is expected to be the final outdoor home playoff game in Vikings history (Jan. 10, 2016).

Multiple players have suited up for each team over the years, from Hall of Famers John Randle and Warren Moon to Benchwarmer Bob Lurtsema. The pattern continued with Minnesota signing DT Sheldon Richardson and Seattle signing former Vikings DTs Tom Johnson and Shamar Stephen during free agency this offseason.

PLAYER TO WATCH: C CORNELIUS EDISON

EDISON HAS ANSWERED THE CALL to fill in for Nick Easton, who was placed on Injured Reserve in August, and Pat Elflein at center. Easton had stepped in for Elflein this offseason while the 2017 third-round pick recovers from an injury suffered in the NFC Championship Game. Edison has shown smarts and strength, earning respect from Vikings coaches and teammates. A native of University Place, Washington, Edison majored in graphic design at Portland State and started every game for the Vikings in his final three collegiate seasons. He went undrafted in 2015, eventually joining the Bears practice squad before being promoted to Chicago's active roster. After a stint in Atlanta, Minnesota signed Edison to its practice squad in September 2017. Edison was activated but did not play for Minnesota. He did, however, practice against current Seahawks defensive linemen Tom Johnson and Shamar Stephen last season.

PLAYER TO WATCH: LB BOBBY WAGNER

WAGNER, WHO IS ENTERING HIS SEVENTH PRO SEASON, is a three-time All-Pro (2014, 2016, 2017) and has made the past four Pro Bowls. The 2012 second-round selection out of Utah State has started 87 of 88 games played and has recorded 778 tackles (NFL statistics). Wagner has recorded more than 100 tackles in each of his six pro seasons, and he has totaled 15.5 sacks, 30 passes defended, eight interceptions, two forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries. He also has returned three fumbles for touchdowns, including an NFL-high two in 2015. Wagner has the physicality to succeed against run plays, impressive range to cover passes and stymie screens and keen instincts. Pro Football Focus awarded Wagner the top tackling grade among linebackers (91.5) in 2017. Wagner was ranked No. 21 in the "NFL Top 100 Players of 2018."

SPLASHY ENTRANCE: WAGNER BECAME THE FIRST PLAYER IN WESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE HISTORY TO LEAD THE CONFERENCE IN TACKLES IN THREE CONSECUTIVE SEASONS. HE CAPPED HIS COLLEGE CAREER BY TYING FOR A UTAH STATE RECORD WITH 446 TACKLES AND EDGING OUT THE CAREER CONFERENCE RECORD OF VIKINGS DEFENSIVE LINE ASSISTANT COACH ROBERT RODRIGUEZ (443 AT TEXAS-EL PASO FROM 2001-04).

140 - IN - '12

Wagner set the Seahawks record for tackles by a rookie with 140 in 2012, breaking a mark of 136 by Terry Beason in 1977. Wagner also showed a propensity for big plays, recording 2.0 sacks and three interceptions in starting 15 of 16 games played.

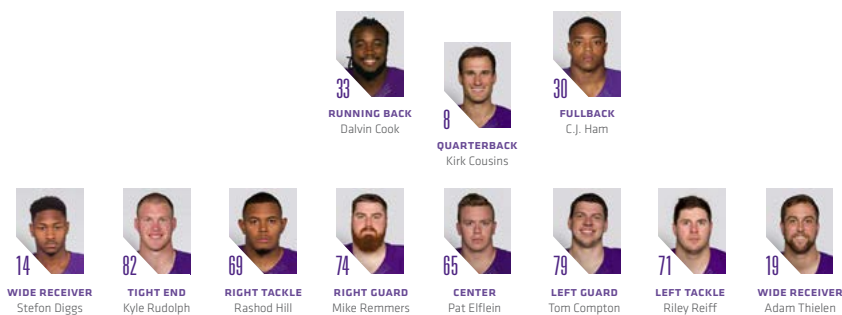

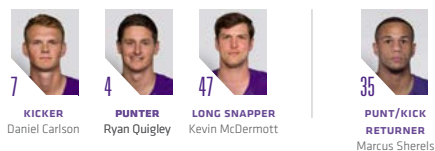

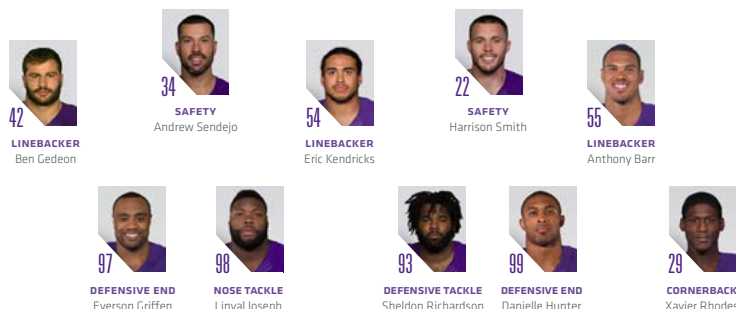

DOWNS WAS SELECTED BY THE VIKINGS in the seventh round of the 2018 NFL Draft and made his Vikings debut against Jacksonville.

The native of Mountlake Terrace, Washington, has worked his way back from a knee injury he suffered as a senior. Downs claimed Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Week honors twice in the first three weeks of the 2017 season and was named the team's Defensive MVP, despite missing the second half of the season.

An All-State Honorable Mention as a running back in high school, Downs excelled on the other side of the football for the Golden Bears. He totaled 212 tackles, 8.0 sacks, 14.5 tackles

for loss, eight passes defended, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

Downs said the speed of the game has been faster at the NFL level. He credited linebackers coach Adam Zimmer and teammates for helping him learn the Vikings system. He's always placed emphasis on learning what everyone on defense is supposed to do.

"Being able to know what other people are doing helps you with your own position because you know where everyone is and how all of the pieces fit," Downs said. "That's something I learned in college. My college coaches taught all the players that. I think everything has translated well. ... Little things, where to keep your eyes, tendencies of the other team, what to look for."

Q. You were off to such a great start to 2017 at Cal before your injury. Did you believe you had done enough to get drafted?

A. I thought that the season I was having was really good. I just came into the draft ready for whatever opportunity I got. I knew I was going to make the best of it.

Q. What are your impressions of the Vikings defense so far?

A. Obviously has a lot of talent, a lot of good players. I think we're really well-coached. The coaches bring a really great scheme. I'm just soaking it all in and learning. It's really cool.

Q. How did Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center impact your rehab efforts?

A. It's a really nice facility here. They have everything you could think of, and I think it helped me a lot. Just the different technology is really beneficial.

Q. Do you utilize the cryogenic chamber?

A. Yeah, oh actually, no. I tried it one time and could not breathe in there. It was too cold.

Q. What was growing up in Washington like?

A. It was really cool. People think it rains a lot. It doesn't really rain that much; maybe a little bit of drizzle for a couple of months, but in the summer time, there's a lot to do, a lot of activities outside and cool people.

Q. Are you a go-to-the-mountains guy?

A. No, I only went on one hike. I [preferred] Puget Sound and all of the beaches. [The one hike was] Rattlesnake Ledge. It's kind of dangerous. Someone fell off one time, but it's really beautiful. It's pretty high. I don't know what area it's overlooking, but it's a really beautiful view.

Q. Were you a Seahawks fan growing up?

A. Kind of, because they were the home team. I'm a Vikings fan right now. ... [Seattle's] had good linebackers. So do we, though.

Q. Was there anyone you tried to shape your game after?

A. I used to like running backs because I used to play running back in high school. Adrian Peterson, for sure, and then when I was at linebacker, Luke Kuechly was really good, Sean Lee was really good. I like some Ray Lewis highlights.

Q. How does your background as a running back help you at linebacker?

A. Being able to change directions quickly and seeing the gap that the running back would want to take and being able to shoot [the gap] and, at the same time, be faster.

Q. After you were drafted, you explained that academics played a role in your decision to attend Cal. Why was that so important to you?

A. My parents, they kind of give you possible scenarios of the future. Football can always get taken away from you, bad things happen, injuries, stuff like that, but you get to go to college for free, so why not make the most out of it and get the best degree possible, have really good opportunities in the future?

IT WAS A RECRUITING PITCH UNLIKE ANYTHING SHELDON RICHARDSON HAD SEEN OR HEARD BEFORE.

When free agents visit a prospective team, the organization usually rolls out the red carpet while wining, dining and hyping the player up.

That wasn't the case when the defensive tackle arrived in Minnesota in mid-March and met with Vikings defensive line coach Andre Patterson and assistant defensive line coach Rob Rodriguez. The two sat down with Richardson, flipped on the film and got to the point.

So, what was conveyed in that initial film session before Richardson signed a 1-year deal with the Vikings?

"When you're a professional, you feel like you can learn a little bit more here and there," Richardson said. "But me having early success, winning the [Associated Press] Rookie of the Year [in 2013] and [making it to the] Pro Bowl [in 2014] and stuff like that, you think there isn't too much more you can learn.

"Coming in and meeting with Coach Dre, it was a complete 180," Richardson added. "He broke me down to the point where, even with my first initial step off the line, it was, 'Why is it this way and what am I doing and what's my thought process?' It was like he wanted to be in the helmet with me. It's really special what Coach Dre does."

Richardson was drafted 13th overall by the New York Jets in the 2013 NFL Draft and made an immediate impact, racking up 16.5 sacks in

three seasons and some individual accolades along the way.

But he has just 2.5 sacks in 30 games over the past two seasons in New York and Seattle, where Richardson was traded to a little over a week before the 2017 season.

Richardson saw an opportunity to work with Patterson, who has coached star linemen such as John Randle and Everson Griffen, and jumped at it.

Now, as the 2018 NFL season draws near, the former first-round pick feels refreshed and revitalized.

"It's been a whirlwind, but the knowledge I've gained of myself is amazing," Richardson said.

More than five months after signing with the Vikings, things are starting to come together for the 27-year-old.

"He's done a great job. He's fit into the room very well, he does everything I ask him to do, he's eager to learn," Patterson said. "It's funny, sometimes I can see the little kid come out in him when I give him some pointers on pass rush. You can see the light come on in his head, and he's excited about it.

"I know he's had questions to some things over his career, why certain things didn't work, and I've been able to give him the answer," Patterson added. "He can speak more to it than I can, but I can see that kind of excitement in his face, that he's learning some things that are helping him understand the game better."

Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer said Richardson has been hard at work to implement changes in practices.

"It's flashes right now, so to be consistent with it all the time will be the telltale sign," Zimmer said.

Richardson's new focal points involve his hands and his hips; Patterson said Richardson is now focused on simply positioning himself at the quarterback and getting there quicker.

"He's getting better at [hand placement], but I think the biggest thing for him as a pass rusher is what he does with his hips, his shoulders," Patterson said. "He's quick, and he's explosive. But he has to keep his hips in a position to always be in an attack mode on the offensive lineman to the quarterback.

"So one of the things that he's done before in his career, is that he's got his hips out of whack," Patterson added.

Put another way, Patterson said Richardson had "no avenue to get to the quarterback," even if he had beaten the lineman across from him.

"[My hips] weren't planted toward the quarterback in most of my rush moves," Richardson said. "That's where my biggest problem came from.

"Just making sure they stay downhill and pointed at the quarterback at all times,"

Richardson added. “Every step is at the quarterback and not just straight up the field like I had been taught.”

Richardson has started 70 of 73 career games played in five seasons, including 15 with Seattle in 2017 when he had 44 tackles (27 solo), a sack, one pass defended, two fumble recoveries and his first career interception.

As he chatted and refueled after a steamy August practice, Richardson perked up when talking about how much he has enjoyed the process of redefining his game alongside Griffen, Linval Joseph, Danielle Hunter and Brian Robison.

“I’ve got great guys next to me, so I’ve come in and joined their mode,” Richardson said. “I have my days of struggling with it, and some days I’m flourishing at it. I just have to make it more consistent.”

Richardson admitted that the technique he’s learned in recent months is different than anything he’s ever tried before.

“It definitely is. How can I put it? Some guys will teach you little tricks of the trade, but then the game will catch up with you,” Richardson said. “This type of technique they’re teaching me, no matter what the offensive linemen do to me, it’s going to be real hard to stop me.”

Joseph, a mammoth defensive tackle who has made back-to-back Pro Bowls, said his new teammate’s hard work is starting to pay off.

“He’s starting to tune in, and he’s starting to understand that this is a scheme defense,” Joseph said. “It’s not, ‘You go out there and make plays.’ Once he understood that, he’s starting to see how everything develops and let plays come to him.”

Richardson said he fits seamlessly within the Vikings locker room, a hard-working, relentless group of first-round selections, late-round picks and undrafted free agents.

“It’s a brotherhood,” Richardson said before recalling a story about how the team recently bonded during training camp. “Coach [Zimmer] kind of got mad at us because we left [inflatable] mattresses in [the locker room] for nap time, which is basically what we call it after walk-through.

“He ended up realizing it was team building, guys wanted to do that, and he looked at it in a different way,” Richardson added. “It’s little things that this team does that you don’t see too often in the league.”

The Vikings defense was the league’s best in 2017, and the defensive line had a sizable hand in that success.

Griffen set a career high with 13 sacks and ranks in the top 10 all-time in franchise history. Joseph helped stuff opponents in the run game to a tune of just 83.6 yards per game, which ranked second in the league.

Hunter’s 25.5 career sacks are the most by any player from the 2015 draft class, and Robison provides a veteran presence and versatility to play at defensive end or inside in special packages.

How will one of the league’s best defensive lines fare now that Richardson is added into the mix?

“Pick your poison on that one,” Richardson said. “The other guys can hold the basket while the one guy picks the fruit. We have no problem with it.”

Richardson even went as far to say that he’s fine with not recording a single sack in 2018 if it means the Vikings make a deep postseason run.

“I need to win. Sacks are just a bonus,” Richardson said. “If my team wins, I don’t care if I have zero sacks. Just as long as we’re winning as I do my job.”

Richardson’s hope is that individual success and team success go hand-in-hand and make all of the work and effort he’s put in over the past five months well worth it.

Richardson acknowledged he could have signed elsewhere in free agency, probably for more money. But after five years in the NFL, he wasn’t afraid to take on a new challenge under Patterson’s guidance.

“It was a lot of small things, but you’ll be surprised how big they will be in a game,” Richardson said, reflecting on his change in approach.

“It was just a good opportunity. I had a few other offers that were more lucrative,” Richardson added. “This was the best fit for me.”

MENTORSHIP IN THE MIDDLE

Ten minutes before the start of practice, David Parry and Linval Joseph stood together on the field in full pads.

Joseph gave instruction from beneath his helmet and tinted eye shield. He demonstrated hand placements to the younger defensive tackle, who in turn mirrored the movements.

A few hours later, Parry walked off after a hot and muggy afternoon practice and spoke about the mentorship he's been grateful to receive from Joseph since signing with the Vikings as a free agent this spring.

"Linval's one of the best nose tackles in the league, so anything that he says, I take that in, I try to take from it what I can," Parry said.

"He has some physical gifts that I'm not necessarily blessed with," Parry quipped of his 6-foot-4, 329-pound teammate. "But at the same time, he teaches me a lot of concepts that apply to my game. So I've been really appreciative of that opportunity."

A two-time Pro Bowler, Joseph is entering his eighth season in the NFL. He certainly has no obligation to spend time with the younger players, but he's more than happy to take them under his wing.

Especially, Joseph emphasized, with a "good listener" like Parry.

"He wants to make this team, of course, so he's always picking my [brain]. I sit next to him in meetings, and he's always asking questions," Joseph said. "I'm always talking to him about every single play that's on the film because he actually wants to learn. When

somebody wants to learn, I give him my time. He's been listening, he's been doing what I've been telling him to do, and it's started showing up in practice, it's started showing up in games."

Parry played 29 snaps against the Broncos, which was 48 percent of Minnesota's defensive snaps in its first preseason game, in addition to five on special teams.

After missing most of the 2017 season due to injury, Parry didn't take the game for granted.

"It was awesome," Parry said. "I hadn't played in about a year ... so just to be back out there playing was emotional. I was very happy to be out there."

His biggest play of the evening came late in the second quarter. The Broncos lined up at their own 34 on third-and-1, De'Angelo Henderson took the handoff, and Parry immediately stopped the running back at the line of scrimmage.

Defensive line coach Andre Patterson called Parry's first outing in Purple "outstanding" and emphasized that he applied the new technique and instruction he's learned from the

coaching staff, Joseph and other veteran teammates. Patterson explained that rookies tend to revert back to old habits when in their first game, but Parry, a fifth-round draft pick in 2015, didn't become overwhelmed by the game-day atmosphere.

Patterson had his eye on Parry in Indianapolis, where he played his first two NFL seasons with the Colts.

"He was very physical at the point of the attack, he was hard to move off the ball, and he played with physicality," Patterson said. "Those were the things that stuck out to me."

When Patterson had the chance to have Parry under his guidance, the well-respected coach jumped at the chance to help him improve. Patterson immediately got to work with Parry on his hand placement at the line.

At 6-foot-2 and 313 pounds, Parry stands stockier than the Vikings other defensive tackles but can use his build to his advantage.

"Because he's got a lower center of gravity, it makes it easier for him to get underneath [the offensive lineman] and be able to move [the opponent] quicker," Patterson said.

"I've been on him constantly, and so has L.J., about being fast with his hands more than worrying about his feet – making sure that his hands are precise in where he puts them on the offensive player."

Ask Parry, and he'll tell you he wants to be the best player he possibly can be.

Parry fell in love with football at an early age, in part after watching his brother, George, play the game. Ten years older than David, George played fullback at Harvard University with a tenacity and toughness

that David admired.

Parry also recalled watching Stephen Paea play for the Bears and wanting to model his game after the New Zealand native. His favorite player of all time, however, wasn't on the line or even on defense.

"My favorite player was Randy Moss as a kid," Parry said of the wide receiver recently enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. "I was actually a Vikings fan for a bit, but then they broke my heart a few too many times, and I joined the rest of my family in being a Niners fan. But Randy Moss was my guy when I was a kid."

Consider Parry a Vikings fan again, however. He's thrilled to be part of the NFC North division and is grateful for a shot at making Minnesota's roster.

According to Patterson, the next step for Parry is learning the new technique backwards and forwards so that it "becomes a part of David." Patterson likened it to someone memorizing his or her cell phone number and sharing it with a friend – "this technique has to become like that, that they just do it without even thinking about it."

"The biggest thing is just to continue to improve and get better, week after week after week," Patterson said. "If he does that, his style of play will prove to everybody that he belongs here."

"That's what it comes down to – every week he continues to get better, every week the things that he learns start to become a part of him," Patterson continued. "And then once that happens, you just go out and play. You don't think about it anymore."

Over the past five months, Vikings General Manager Rick Spielman has re-signed three key players – Eric Kendricks, Danielle Hunter and Stefon Diggs – a year before their rookie contracts were set to expire, continuing to secure pieces of the puzzle and maintain consistency on Minnesota's roster. Diggs put pen to paper in July, extending his time in Purple and delivering on a promise he made 10 years ago to his father before he passed away.



"It means a lot to me because my dad sat me down a couple months before he passed away," Diggs told media members, his voice cracking. "And he just told me, 'Look after your brothers, look after your mom.' Basically, 'Look after your family.'"

"And it meant a lot to me. So with this day, it just came full circle," Diggs added. "I have a lot of emotions."

From being given a chance by Minnesota at the 146th pick, to starring in the Minneapolis Miracle in last season's Divisional Round playoff game against the Saints, Diggs has made the most of his time with the Vikings.

Head Coach Mike Zimmer emphasized that Diggs has blended talent with a dedicated work ethic since day one.

"He's come in and proved, as a fifth-round draft pick, the things he can do, the catches he can make, the routes he runs and the way he works," Zimmer said. "He's been a good person off the field, he's been a good person on the field."

Added Zimmer: "One time I had him in my office and I asked him, I don't know what it was, but I asked him a question and he said, 'Now Coach, you know you knew the answer when you asked the question.' He's a smart guy who's done a great job."

Diggs has demonstrated the qualities that Spielman and Zimmer emphasize. The leadership team does not take it lightly when looking to bring in a certain "type of player."

Athletic and talented on the field, of course. But "character" has also been reiterated time and time again in reference to the Vikings locker room – and when the Vikings find players who not only make plays on the gridiron but are teammates of high character off of it, they strive to keep those names in-house.

Diggs was the most recent of three players signed between April and August.

Kendricks signed an extension almost exactly three years after being snagged by the Vikings in the second round of the 2015 NFL Draft. Since then, he has racked up 367 tackles (coaches' tally) and nabbed two interceptions, both of which he returned to the end zone for touchdowns.

The linebacker said several considerations influenced his desire to stay in Minnesota.

"I like the defense we're on now. I like the

group of guys we have in the locker room," Kendricks said. "I'm just excited to get another opportunity to play with them. A crazy front in front of me – that's another factor that came into it. At the end of the day, I just want to be out there playing football and winning championships."

On June 27, Spielman locked in yet another significant piece of a stout Vikings defense in Hunter.

It didn't take long after selecting Hunter in the third round of the 2015 NFL Draft for the Vikings to prove to the outside world that they had dug up a diamond in the rough.

Spielman pointed to Hunter – who over the past two seasons has 19.5 sacks – as a young, talented football player who "works extremely hard, shows the passion for the game, comes to work every day to improve and get better" and has an even higher ceiling for which to strive.

On the Vikings current roster, 17 players have been with the team since at least 2015 – 10 of them for longer.

It's all a part of the plan for Spielman and Vikings Executive VP of Football Operations Rob Brzezinski.

"Besides Coach Zim's office, I'm probably sitting in Rob's office more, especially this time of year," Spielman said after re-signing Diggs. "We do our three-year cap planning, so we're very excited, and we've worked through this to be able to get this done."

The trio of re-signings that occurred this spring and summer inside the Vikings shiny new headquarters, Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, don't stand alone.

Everson Griffen, Linval Joseph, Xavier Rhodes and Adam Thielen all have signed extensions with Minnesota in the past year. The summer before, Spielman secured All-Pro safety Harrison Smith for the long haul.

The Vikings don't shy away from making splashes in free agency when necessary – as illustrated by the additions of Kirk Cousins and Sheldon Richardson in March – but will abide by the philosophy of building through the draft and keeping the family together.

"It's great to not only sign Cousins and Richardson but to keep our own," Spielman said. "And that's going to always be the priority for us if we can."

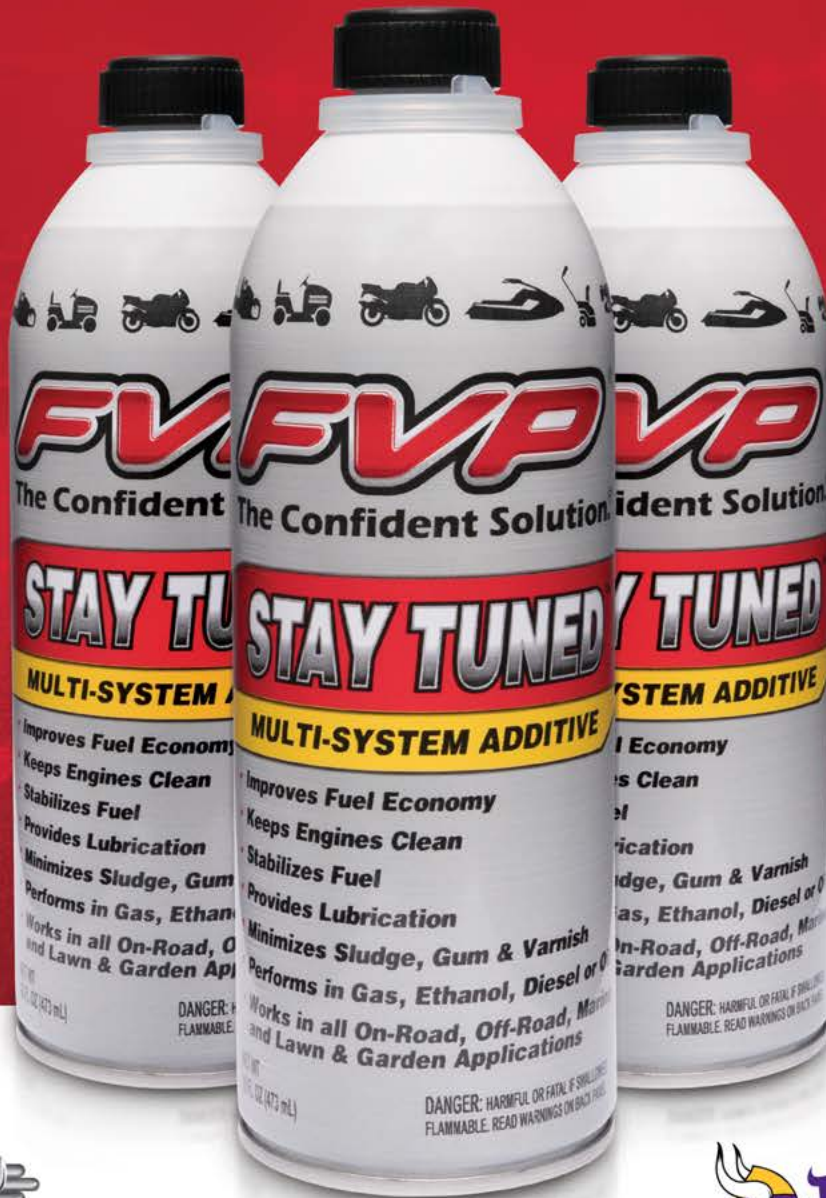

NIGHT AT THE VIKINGS MUSEUM



Vikings Legends who have left a lasting legacy on the franchise, Minnesota and beyond participated in the July unveiling of the Vikings Museum.

The 14,000-square-foot facility features hundreds of artifacts and enables timelessness to intersect with technology in interactive displays.

Vikings members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, including 2018 enshrinee Randy Moss, are featured via vertical kiosks that tell the stories of 14 players in words, pictures and video clips. There are founding documents, as well as audio clips from the first Vikings training camp in Bemidji in 1961 and video highlights of the greatest plays in franchise history, including the Minneapolis Miracle.

Vikings Chief Operating Officer Kevin Warren said the Vikings Museum is a reinforcement of the commitment that the Wilf family has made to embrace the history of the franchise since acquiring the club in 2005. The Wilf, Mandelbaum and Landis families, Warren said, noted that “very few owners really took the time to focus on the history” of their respective franchises.

“What a museum says is that it’s a space that

holds special things, so this is our Smithsonian,” Warren said. “People are going to come from around the world, but today we wanted [to host] you all as another way to say thank you.

“So many times, people are so eager to look forward in life, which we are so eager to do, but fortunately I had two great parents and some great grandparents who taught me to always look back,” Warren added.

Warren said he hoped that the Vikings Legends would feel appreciated for their contributions to the history of the team.

Vikings Executive Director of Brand & Creative Erin Swartz, who oversaw the project, said opening the Vikings Museum fulfilled a long-term goal. She envisions the space at the team’s new headquarters, Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center, as one that will continue to evolve.

“It has long been a goal of the Minnesota Vikings to create a space that could really tell the comprehensive history of this franchise and especially a priority of the Wilf family, but we knew that we had to do it right,” Swartz said. “We had to find a space that was big enough to tell these amazing stories. We had to find a space that was public so our fans could come all year round and be engrossed in the stories with us.”

Some of the most personal artifacts are in

comprehensive displays that chronicle Hall of Fame Head Coach Bud Grant, who led the Vikings for 18 seasons, and running back Tommy Mason, the first player ever selected by the team in an NFL Draft and Minnesota’s first All-Pro.

Grant, who was among the distinguished guests, became emotional when he saw a picture of himself with Sid Hartman from Grant’s 1994 enshrinement ceremony. Grant loaned relics that never made it into any of his famed garage sales for display in the Vikings Museum and said he enjoyed viewing the other exhibits.

“Whoever the curators are have done a great job,” Grant said. “They’ve highlighted all the Vikings important moments and personnel and history – it’s all there. So if you’re a Vikings fan, you don’t want to miss it.”

Mason, who was selected No. 1 overall in the 1960 NFL Draft, passed away at age 75 on Jan. 22, 2015, but his vibrant story is able to be told through a collection on loan from his wife, Karen Mason.

The Mason artifacts range from Boy Scouts merit badges to a photo of Mason with his pet monkey, which he named “Dutch” in honor of first Vikings Head Coach Norm Van Brocklin (known as “The Dutchman”). They also include awards and all-star game appearance mementos, as well as his No. 20 jersey that is on loan from Tom and John Aldritt and their families.

"Tommy was so humble," Karen said. "I was a little nervous about doing this because he was always so soft-spoken about his accomplishments, but I did the right thing. I'm glad I did it. I think you all did a good job."

Ultimately, Karen decided that the display would provide an opportunity "for everybody to really see who he was, because he was such a darling man."

"As tough a competitor as he was, he was the nicest person I've ever met," she said. "He had such a fun side, and I think these artifacts really show that, and it does him such an honor."

Three members of the Purple People Eaters (Alan Page, Carl Eller and Jim Marshall) shared their initial impressions of the Vikings Museum.

Jim Marshall

Marshall, an original Viking who didn't miss a game from 1961-79, was unable to attend the alumni event but privately toured the space with his wife, Sue Landwehr; daughters, Angie Marshall Moore and Jimi Belanger; and granddaughter, Madison Belanger.

Much like the franchise, Marshall is intertwined throughout the museum.

He is in the "Frozen in Time" display for the six jerseys that have been retired in franchise history, along with Page, Fran Tarkenton, Mick Tingelhoff, Cris Carter and Corey Stringer.

Marshall's No. 70 is accompanied by his helmet, hand pads and a game ball from 1963 that was hand-painted by original equipment manager Jim "Stubby" Eason.

"I think it's a great portrayal of Minnesota football up to this point," Marshall said. "Just a fantastic display of all of the talent that's come through Minnesota, and I'm very proud to see this. It's just fantastic."

Alan Page

Page was joined by his wife, Diane; son, Justin; and two grandchildren who saw old photos and video highlights of their grandfather play in his Hall of Fame kiosk.

Page's No. 88 jersey from the 1969 season has been "Frozen in Time" in an "ice column" that also features his helmet with its distinctive face mask and a trading card that celebrated his post-football position on the Minnesota Supreme Court.

The Page family has loaned the museum his 1971 NFL MVP trophy, from when Page became the first defensive player to win the award.

"It's hard for me to describe because in my view, independent of me, it's a majestic piece," Page said of the hefty trophy. "It captures, I think, what is great about the game of football. It projects strength but also there's a warmth to it; [it's] not just a cold piece of metal. It is quite an honor for me to have been selected, not something that I ever anticipated or thought about, and to see it here in the museum, it's special."

"As you know, I'm generally not one to look in the rearview mirror, but as Kevin said, there are times when it's important to look back," Page added.

Carl Eller

Eller stood in front of his Hall of Fame kiosk and placed his right hand into a custom-formed handprint on a silver football – a perfect fit. He was greeted in response by a picture of himself from 1964, fresh off his time with the Golden Gophers and into the fledgling days of the franchise.

"That's my rookie year," he reflected.

Eller and his wife, Molly, turned the corner and saw the display dedicated to Metropolitan Stadium, where "Moose" roamed from 1964-78. He had a chuckle when he viewed the sword, shield, vest and horn that original Vikings mascot Hub Meeds made famous.

Eller walked past a display about the history of training camps and the Purple People Eaters before sitting to view the "Decade of Dominance" display, where his jersey joins those of the 10 other Vikings players who were on the roster for each of the team's four trips to Super Bowls.

"I'm actually amazed. I want to come back and spend more time here," Eller said. "It's a fantastic gathering of memories for me and a significant contribution to the area."

The Vikings Museum is open seven days a week. Fans can view hours and purchase tickets at vikings.com/museum.

HARRISON SMITH IS KNOWN AS “HARRY THE HITMAN,” A MONIKER HE HAS EARNED FOR MAKING PLAYS ALL OVER THE FIELD DURING THE FIRST SIX YEARS OF HIS CAREER.

It turns out those tackles by the All-Pro safety do a lot more than help the Vikings win football games.

Smith’s annual BIG Tackles campaign raises money for Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Greater Twin Cities with each stop he makes on an opponent. Fans can pledge money per tackle that Smith racks up, with all of the funds going to BBBS.

“Harrison is so attentive to them, and there’s not a kid that attends any of our events with Harrison that doesn’t get an autograph and a personal conversation,” BBBS Director of Marketing and Brand Management Jennifer Severson said. “He is so genuine, and they appreciate it so much.”

Jayvionte Jackson, a 13-year-old Little, was in attendance with his Big, Matt Jennissen.

The two took on Smith on the field as Jennissen threw a touchdown to Jayvionte, who used a double move to get past Smith, a route that Jayvionte drew up.

“It was too easy,” he said with a smile.

Smith responded on the next attempt to bat the pass away.

“We split one to one. He got me on that little in-cut there, he had some good moves,” Smith said.

“He said he’s going to come take my spot one day, so I told him to keep working and go for it.”

Smith said he’s more than happy to continue supporting an organization he became involved with in college. He hosted kickball and dodgeball games in recent years at Winter Park and attends multiple events each year with the program.

And he’ll make even more of an impact this fall when he racks up the tackles – and the funds – for BBBS.

“I’m just proud to be a partner with Big Brothers Big Sisters Twin Cities because they do phenomenal things,” Smith said. “If you can get involved in any way, whether it’s mentoring or supporting [them] financially or with your time, it’s a great organization that really impacts lives.”



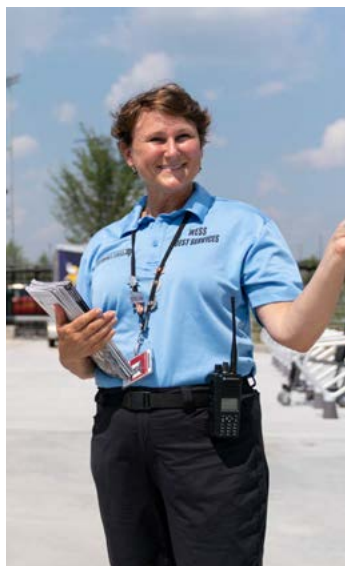

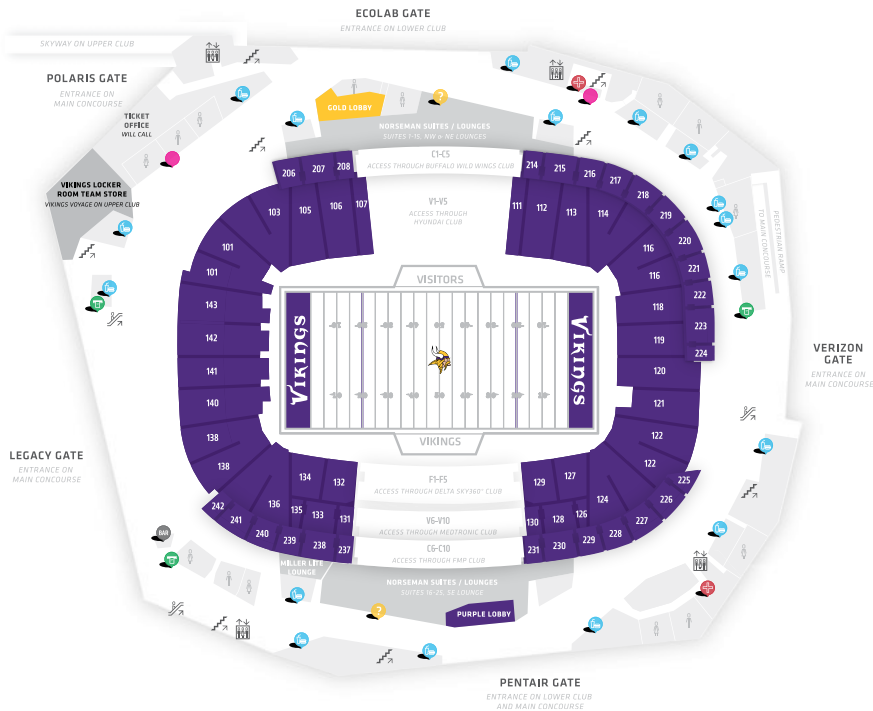
A teacher of communications classes at Faribault Middle School during the school year,
