

Minnesota enters today's game with an 8-6-1 mark and an opportunity to earn a postseason berth for the third time in four seasons.

- **[]4** | Adam Thielen dazzled throughout the year. He set a record by starting a season with eight consecutive 100-yard games, a run that included this diving catch at Philadelphia.
- 05 | Danielle Hunter scooped, scooted and scored during a 32-yard fumble return touchdown against the Lions. He also had 3.5 sacks in the game en route to picking up NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors.


SEASON RECAP BIGGEST MOMENTS







- The offense executed the limbo against the team from Lambeau after Dalvin Cook turned a short pass into a 26-yard touchdown.
- **[]7** | Randy Moss received his Hall of Fame Ring of Excellence during halftime of the Vikings home game against the Packers. Moss became a first-ballot enshrinee in August.
- Kyle Rudolph high-pointed the football during a 44-yard touchdown catch on the final play of the first half at Detroit. Rudolph finished with a careerhigh 122 receiving yards and two scores on nine receptions.
- Dalvin Cook totaled 163 yards from scrimmage and rushed for touchdowns of 13 and 21 yards, helping Minnesota rush for 220 yards against his hometown Miami Dolphins team.



TODAY'S GAME between the Vikings (8-6-1) and 2018 NFC North Champion Bears (11-4) is the 116th all-time, including one postseason game that followed the 1994 season. It marks the fourth time in five seasons that Chicago has visited Minnesota to close a regular season, but this matchup has potential postseason implications for both teams.

The Vikings have a "win-and-definitelyin" scenario in which a victory secures a postseason berth as one of two Wild Card

teams. If Minnesota is unable to do so, it will need a loss or tie by Philadelphia (8-7) at Washington (7-8). The Bears can still garner the No. 2 seed in the NFC if they finish with the same record as the Rams (12-3). Chicago will be the No. 3 seed if it loses today.

The Bears claimed a 25-20 victory when the teams met on Nov. 18 at Soldier Field. Chicago leads the NFL with 36 takeaways.

The Vikings have won the past two games and are seeking their second three-game win streak of the season.

DID YOU KNOW?

Kirk Cousins enters today's game having already set the Vikings record for completions in a season. He has 405 and is the first Minnesota QB to throw for more than 4,000 yards in a season since Brett Favre in 2009.

Stefon Diggs needs 26 receiving yards to record the first 1,000vard season of his career. If he does so, he and Adam Thielen will be the first Vikings receiving duo to each post the milestone in a season since Hall of Famers Cris Carter and Randy Moss in 2000.

The Vikings have 50 sacks as a team, the most in any season under Head Coach Mike Zimmer. This is the first season in which Minnesota has recorded 50 sacks since finishing with 51 in 1992.

PLAYER TO WATCH: CB MACKENSIE ALEXANDER

FOR ALEXANDER, the first step to excelling in the nickel cornerback position was accepting the role. After playing a lockdown role on the outside during college at Clemson, the 2016 second-round selection was asked to move inside for the Vikings. When Terence Newman retired at the start of the season and transitioned to position coach, it enhanced the need for Alexander to step in and step up. Alexander has performed well in coverage, totaling 9 pass breakups. He also has set a career high with 43 tackles, including 7 for loss (team stats). One of the best attributes that Alexander has shown is an ability to blitz and reach quarterbacks before they can escape. That quickness has helped Alexander record 4.0 sacks, which is the most by a Vikings defensive back in a single season.

GRAPPLER: LISTED AT 5-FOOT-10 AND 192 POUNDS, ALEXANDER ISN'T AFRAID TO MIX IT UP AGAINST BIGGER RECEIVING OPTIONS OR IN RUN SUPPORT. IN ADDITION TO RUNNING TRACK AND PLAYING FOOTBALL, ALEXANDER WRESTLED IN HIGH SCHOOL AND WAS RATED IN THE TOP 15 IN HIS WEIGHT CLASS IN FLORIDA.



PLAYER TO WATCH: OB MITCHELL TRUBISKY

Trubisky, the second overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft, has taken major strides in his second pro season. He has increased his completions by 75, completion percentage by 7.0 points, yards by 867 and passer rating by 18.5 points.. He also has thrown 24 touchdowns this season after totaling seven in his debut campaign. The Vikings also are aware of the threat that Trubisky poses with his legs. He ran a career-high 10 times for 43 yards when the teams met in Chicago on Nov. 18. It was the fifth time this season that he had at least 40 rushing yards. Trubisky's mobility also helped against a vaunted pass rush. He took just one sack but was intercepted twice by Anthony Harris at Soldier Field.

MR. FOOTBALL: TRUBISKY WAS NAMED MR. FOOTBALL IN THE STATE OF OHIO BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS IN 2012 AFTER PASSING FOR 4,063 YARDS AS A SENIOR, WHICH GAVE HIM 9,126 YARDS. HE WAS THE FIRST PLAYER FROM THE GREATER CLEVELAND AREA TO PASS FOR MORE THAN 4,000 YARDS IN A SEASON AND 9,000 IN A CAREER.

Out of Trubisky's 24 passing touchdowns this season, 19 occurred in eight home games, compared to the five he's thrown in five road games. Trubisky's passer rating was 97.2 at home and 94.0 on the road. He also rushed for 309 yards at Soldier Field and only 96 in road games.

THE SAFETY PICKED OFF TWO PASSES at Chicago in Week 11. He also adopted two kittens after participating in a November adoption awareness event at the Animal Humane Society.


Harris enters today's game with career highs of three interceptions and six passes defended. He has played in 14 games this season and has started eight in place of Andrew Sendejo, who suffered a seasonending groin injury.

After leading the Vikings with two interceptions in the preseason, the 2015 undrafted rookie free agent recorded his first in a regular-season game against Arizona in Week 6. He nabbed two throws by Mitchell Trubisky at Soldier Field - one in the first half and one in the second - and brought his personal collector's items stamped with Chicago's wishbone C to Minnesota.

"It was a nice, cool night, felt like a football atmosphere, so I was ready to go. I was just trying to fly around and be in position to make plays," Harris said. "The first interception, I just felt like I got a good feel for what they were trying to do, got a good break on the ball, and I remember attacking it aggressively, trying to go make a statement. They had made some plays in the game, so in that moment, I was just thinking, 'Make this play, respond and show that we're here to play."

The Vikings fell behind by 14 and rallied late before dropping a 25-20 decision.

1. You had come close to interceptions before and even had a couple in the preseason. Were you confident that a pick eventually would happen in the regular season?


feel for the routes, got good breaks, and even fumbles, if I didn't cause it, being there to scoop it up was kind of my thing. Once I got here, the more I learned, the closer I started to get. I got a few in practice and into the preseason, I thought if I had the opportunity to play defensively I would get some pretty good chances to come up with some interceptions, so from there, it was "Keep studying, don't force it, learn more about the defense and the offenses and be in the right position."

1. You tied Ronde Barber's mark of eight interceptions in a season at Virginia, but your draft stock was hurt because of a shoulder injury. Has every day been about validating that you belong in the NFL?

A. I kind of thought that I had the ability to be a pretty good player at this level. It was one of those things where I believed in myself and just wanted the opportunity to show everybody that I can be the player that I once was at the college level and was projected to be a pretty decent player before the injury. I felt like I kind of had to battle my way back. I felt like I had to get my body back in the position of functioning and executing.

A. It's been a part of my recovery for about a year now. I started to venture off business-wise after experiencing it as a customer, coming in and trying to figure out how I can better utilize my time and recovery after workouts. I tried a number of different things, massages, acupuncture, and cryo was the new one for me. Originally I tried it post-workouts and then as I went along, if there was soreness, I would utilize it as an off-day thing. I would hop in there to try to get some of the soreness out, and it helped with circulation, so it kind of got me going right away. If I was a little bit stiff or sore, it got me moving pretty good. The more I used it, the more I started to believe in it, and then did more research on it. I feel like it's something that a lot of people can benefit from, not just athletes, whether it's somebody who deals with everyday pain from an old injury or age or maybe even diabetes, I know there's someone who uses it for that, [cryotherapy] is something I'd like to provide for them.

We offer a few services. We have a cryo machine that you stand in from your neck down; the height is adjustable. We also have two NormaTec stations to kind of get circulation in your legs. Most recently, we added arms, as well, and then we also purchased an isolation machine that has a hose. If you don't want to get in the full-body machine, if you have a knee or shoulder, we can isolate that area. We also use that machine for facials as well to help with those muscles in the face to help recover and decrease wrinkles over time.

N ■ How did you wind up with not one but two kittens after the pet adoption event?

↑ • It's kind of one of those things that's always been $oldsymbol{h}_{oldsymbol{\cdot}}$ on my mind. I kind of wanted a dog, but honestly I didn't have the time for it, with the requirements of taking care of them and being on my own and having to take them out and different things, so I put it off. After we did the event, I checked out the dogs and took a look at the cats. ... The following Monday I went and was thinking, "I want to get a cat." It's a lot less maintenance, but there's still somebody there to hang with. I tried to get it Monday, and they said they'd

have to spay it, so I'd have to come back Thursday. Unfortunately, when I went to pick it up, they said it had gotten sick and gotten a disease that would affect its immune system. ... I [then] saw a Siamese with a light brown coat, so I decided [Cookie] was going home with me. A few weeks later, after I had a great experience with that one, I got a call that the original kitten I wanted was fine and healthy. They asked if I was still interested in adopting, and I felt bad because I still really liked that cat. Another friend told me I should get two because they liked being in pairs.

Are you having a lot of fun posing them for pictures on Instagram?

A: Yeah, some of the stuff is ideas that people give me, and some of the stuff is me walking around the house and trying to capture a moment. When I posted on social media that I was getting them, a lot of people were excited, and a friend said I should make them an Instagram. I had a few people come on my page and specifically say they were following me to check out more cat pictures, so I made them an Instagram and try to keep up with it. It's a lot of fun, a lot of little cute, interesting stuff going on, so I try to share it with the people who like to see it.

. What's been the biggest surprise? Are they pretty **U.** social with you?



IN THE SIX-WEEK BREAK that he had after mini-camp ended in June and training camp started in July, Harrison Smith went to Iceland for just three days.

The Vikings safety hired a tour guide for the quick trip and had a full schedule each day he was in the country of fewer than 350,000 people, which is a smaller population than the city of Minneapolis.

"In and out ... I saw everything I wanted to see in three days. It was cool," Smith said. "I just felt like going, honestly. I thought it'd be a peaceful vacation."

Smith's favorite spot was the Gljúfrabúi waterfall. The name aptly translates to Canyon Dweller because it is obscured by walls of a huge cliff and oft unknown by thousands of visitors who arrive by the busload to walk around Seljalandsfoss less than one-half mile away.

But you're not alone if you didn't know Smith went abroad, as the 29-year-old posted just one simple photo of himself on social media next to the aforementioned waterfall.

It was the perfect getaway for the low-key All-Pro.

"I like to enjoy things in the moment and be present," Smith said. "I like to show people where I went and stuff like that and tell them it's a great spot to go, but I feel like sometimes when you're trying to capture things to show other people, you're kind of cheapening the moment for yourself.

"It's nice to look back and remember some pictures, but I like to enjoy where I'm at," Smith added.

Smith's attitude toward keeping a low profile on vacation also applies to his mindset on the football field.

He is simply more content with putting in a solid day's work on Sunday and then slipping out of the locker room unnoticed while his teammates get the praise for another stout defensive performance.





On the field, it seems No. 22 simply makes the play, looks to the sideline for the next call and gets ready to line up and do it again.

"I've always kind of been that way, just because, realistically, I'll get too tired if I'm celebrating all the time," Smith said with a laugh. "And I know there's more games to be played. It's fun to celebrate when teammates make plays and get people going and some of that stuff, but if that's what you're spending the majority of the time on, it's going to be hard to give everything you have in between the whistle.

"If I make a big play, then I'm like, 'Cool, we've got the next play.' If it's a third down and we get off the field, then you can maybe have a little more fun," Smith added. "But first down and second down, it's like, 'Whatever, let's focus on the next play.'

Added Vikings defensive backs coach Jerry Gray: "I think he internalizes a bunch of stuff. He understands it, and he absorbs it. He doesn't talk a lot, but he talks when he needs to. He's a guy where it's like, 'I'm a good football player, and I don't have to tell you I'm good.' He just goes out there and does his job."

The 2012 first-round pick has made plenty of those big plays in his career in Purple.

Smith ranks 10th in franchise history with 20 career interceptions. But he has returned four of them for touchdowns, which puts him atop the list for Vikings defensive players.

Smith has been at it again in 2018, as he ranks second on the Vikings with 89 total tackles (team stats) and has eight pass breakups, nine tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble.

Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer has been with Smith since the start of the 2014 season.

Zimmer recently explained why he's able to use Smith all over the field rather than having him just patrol the secondary as a regular safety would do.

"He's a very instinctive player. I'm able to put him in positions where I can talk to him during the week," Zimmer said. "A couple weeks ago, I said, 'I want you to do this.' And he said, 'Well, that's usually where [fellow safety] Anthony [Harris] lines up.' I said, 'Not anymore, you're going to line up there.'

"He went in there and did it a couple times and made some good plays," Zimmer added. "The guy is just really smart and disguises extremely well. He makes it tough for the quarterback."

Gray noted how there are safeties who excel in pass defense, while some are in a different class when stopping the run and others get home to the quarterback on a regular basis.

Smith may not be the best player in the league at a specific category, but add up his complete body of work, and there might not be a better player at his position across the league.

"I think there's a lot of guys that do different things, but he's just a really good football player all-around," Gray said. "He can get the ball out of the air, he can make tackles, be close to the line of scrimmage and he can be in the middle of the field.

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"He's the standard that way of being an allaround player. A lot of guys can't do that because they don't have the range or the ball skills or the smarts," Gray said. "They are good football players, but he's a guy that can separate himself. He's set a standard ... young guys are looking up at the level he plays."

That consistent, yet unflashy, level of play recently earned Smith his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl honor. He is the only safety in the NFL to be named to four straight Pro Bowls in recent years.

Smith said he's honored to represent the team each year and that the annual all-star game is a byproduct of his hard work and performance.

But he also added that his relationship with being recognized in the spotlight is a Catch-22 of sorts.

"I always liked to make plays and I always liked being a playmaker. The spotlight comes from making plays," Smith said. "I don't, like, hate the spotlight.

"I don't mind it, I just don't need to overly celebrate it, I guess. I want to be in the spotlight, if I'm not; it means I'm not making plays," Smith added. "I'm not necessarily going to be [self-promotional]. But I do like to make big plays. Naturally, that attention happens or comes with being in the NFL. I'm fine with that."

Now in his seventh season with the Vikings, Smith has racked up a handful of Pro Bowl appearances to go along with a 2017 First-Team All-Pro honor in which he was a near-unanimous selection.

If the safety can keep up his trademark consistency and high level of play, Smith might just find himself in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, in a dozen years or so.

Gray said he believes it could happen if Smith racks up a few more yearly awards that would help elevate his national profile.

Smith naturally wanted no part of that topic, saying he doesn't look at the big picture of his career and that he instead is focused on helping the Vikings win today and earn their third trip to the playoffs in four seasons.

"That's not really for me to determine," Smith said. "I can control what I can control, and that's like so next-level that I don't even think about that.

"I feel like, as a current player, it's probably disrespectful to compare myself to guys that are in there and they've done it. They helped build the game to what it is now," Smith added. "That's not even on my radar."

It's not unusual for Harrison Smith to sit quietly at his locker on Fridays before games and take a black marker to his cleats to have an all-black look.

But the All-Pro safety sported cleats that featured a purple Big Brothers Big Sisters logo for the My Cause, My Cleats game in Week 15.

The annual initiative, which was in its third year, helps players raise awareness for charitable organizations of their choice.

Smith has been a longstanding partner of Big Brothers Big Sisters, holding numerous events throughout the year, including dodgeball games for Bigs and Littles at Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center earlier this month.

In addition to the dodgeball games – where Smith was joined by teammates
Anthony Harris, Jayron Kearse and Storm
Norton – the visitors participated in a
Qo-A and were able to get autographs.

Smith said the Littles always try to get the players out.

"There's always some guys with some big arms. ... They were going at us pretty hard, but it was fun," Smith said. "I think sometimes they think I'm going to take it easy on them, and then I'll try to throw some heat."

After the last out in dodgeball, Smith hosted people who have pledged money toward his Big Tackles fundraising campaign for a special tour of the

Vikings headquarters, a group discussion and personalized photo sessions. The Big Tackles campaign has a goal of \$60,000 for this year and is a little shy based on Smith's tackles and pledges so far. Fans can join the support by visiting pledgeit.org/harrisonsmith2018.

Brandon Wagner, who drove in from Bismarck, North Dakota, brought Smith's previous cleats honoring Big Brothers Big Sisters that Wagner won in a fundraising auction.

Kearse benefited from a mentorship program that helped him when he was growing up in Florida.

"It's big to give back to kids and give kids somebody to talk to," Kearse said, "be around them and try to help them achieve their goal."

Kearse said Smith is "a great guy, a great role model, not just for them, but for me also, somebody to look up to."

"It brings me along," Kearse said. "He gave me the opportunity to go do that, and I found something that I would like to do, as far as being a Big to those kids and being able to talk to them and guide them through certain situations."

Big Brothers Big Sisters Twin Cities served more than 3,800 young people this year through traditional 1-on-1 pairings and newer group mentorship initiatives. There are more than 500 Littles, however, on a waiting list.

IN PROGRESSION

PIANO PLAYING HELPS STEPHEN WEATHERLY'S FOOTBALL DEVELOPMENT

It's not uncommon for Stephen Weatherly to bring baked goods in for teammates, coaches and even staff at Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center.

Recently, a from-scratch rum cake made an appearance. Weatherly's avocado brownies have also been a hit, perhaps jumping to the leader board.

The Vikings defensive end learned how to cook from his mother and grandmother, both of whom he's extremely close to. Weatherly called them "outstanding chefs" and from time to time will call his grandmother to ask how to make something.

"The best part is that she uses non-traditional measurements. It's not a cup or even 'a pinch,' "
Weatherly said. "She'll say, 'Well, throw in this much.
Add a fist of this, two shakes of that.'

"And I'm like, 'What are you saying? Is this metrics?' I mean, seriously," Weatherly laughed. "She'll just tell me, 'You'll figure it out.'"

He usually does figure it out. This fall, Weatherly baked several sweet potato pies and passed them out the following day.

"We told him, 'It's good, bro. Just a little bit more brown sugar,' " quipped teammate Sheldon Richardson. "He has some cupcakes that are pretty good, too. Yeah, he's been doing his thing."

For Weatherly, "doing his thing" has pretty much always been his mantra.

The Georgia native is an only child but avoided boredom growing up via an array of interests that ranged from music, to robotics, to athletics.

Weatherly's elementary school required all students to take an extracurricular course in music, either band or orchestra. He chose band, starting with the flute and excelling at an early age.

His passion for music actually came before his passion for the pigskin.

"I was good at it; I enjoyed it. I liked learning how all the instruments tied together to make one ensemble and things of that nature," Weatherly explained.

He didn't stop at the flute. In the years leading up to college, Weatherly also played clarinet, trumpet, trombone, baritone, tuba and tenor saxophone.

TURNING ATTENTION TOWARD FOOTBALL

Weatherly graduated from Shiloh High School in Snellville, Georgia, and went on to attend Vanderbilt University, where football took over his focus. He played defensive end for two seasons before moving to outside linebacker when new Commodores Head Coach Derek Mason, a former Vikings assistant, switched to a 3-4 defense

He first made an impression on the Vikings at the 2016 NFL Scouting Combine in Indianapolis. But interestingly, he may never have ended up in Purple had it not been for the travel schedule of Vikings defensive line coach Andre Patterson.

Patterson hadn't watched a minute of tape on Weatherly. But after defensive linemen worked out, Patterson had time before an evening flight back to Minneapolis and opted to stay to see the linebackers.

There, Weatherly caught his attention.

"I saw this tall, long, athletic guy down there who didn't look right with the linebackers. He ran a fast 40 time, and then I saw him change direction, and I'm like, 'This guy ought to be on the list to be a defensive end,' "Patterson recalled.

Patterson waited until the athletes made their way back to the hotel and caught up with Weatherly in the lobby. Patterson told him that he would study his tape as soon as he got back to Minnesota – and he did, watching

cut-ups from Weatherly's first two seasons.

"I watched him play, and I was like, 'OK, this guy can do it," Patterson said. "I was standing on the table to draft him from the fifth round, and we finally got him in the seventh."

Did Patterson have any hesitations drafting a player who had so many other interests and hobbies outside of football?

While he believes that could be a concern for some coaches, Patterson appreciates having players from different backgrounds and experiences in his position room. What he did need to determine, though, was just how important football was to Weatherly.

"If you're only playing football because it happens to be something that you're good at, not something that you love, then that's not a guy you want," Patterson said.

"He hadn't played defensive end in so long. So he had to work on changing his body again," Patterson added. "He had to work on changing his mentality. Would he put in the time and effort to get those things done? And he did."

But even so, his first season didn't go quite the way he had hoped. The rookie spent most of the 2016 campaign on practice squad before being elevated to the 53-man roster in Week 11. He was inactive for all but two games, during which he contributed on special teams.

Weatherly headed into his second year frustrated that things didn't click as quickly as he anticipated. It was at that point, during the late spring and summer of 2017, that Weatherly went back to his

first love: music.

While he had focused mainly on football at Vanderbilt, Weatherly still managed to squeeze in time to learn two more instruments: the steel drums and piano. It was the last instrument he took on that turned into his go-to.

"After a long day, and if I felt like I wasn't being as effective in practice, I would just go and play something I had learned in college, or I'd try to find new things online or on YouTube tutorials and just bury myself in that - get my head off of football for a while," Weatherly said. "Instead of beating myself up, I would [play the piano]. That actually helped tremendously, honestly - being able to take a step back, think about something else for a while. Reset, refocus and then attack the next day on the field.

"That ability to de-stress helped me to become a better football player," Weatherly added.

Weatherly went on to play 15 games in the 2017 season, during which Patterson saw his young student take great strides.

"He learned to just let it go," Patterson said. "At some point, you just have to learn to let it go and just go out there and trust yourself, believe that you've mastered the things you've been taught."

During the 2018 training camp, Patterson had another conversation with Weatherly to remind him: "Just. Let. It. Go. Just go out there and play. Be fast. Be physical."

And it worked. So far this season, Weatherly has started six of 15 games played and has 39 tackles (coaches' tally), 3.0 sacks, a pass broken up, seven tackles for loss, 29 quarterback hurries (coaches' tally) and a forced fumble.

BEATING TO HIS OWN DRUM

He's improved as a football player, but what he hasn't changed is anything about himself.

Weatherly will have a 20-minute discussion with teammates about Bitcoin or debate with a Vikings.com writer the psychological effects of seeing a Halloween flick during the daytime. He's quick with a Rubik's cube. He still enjoys playing the piano and learning new music, and it's almost a guarantee that he'll bring in home-baked treats for his teammates to enjoy.

To borrow a music analogy, Weatherly beats to his own drum.

He might not fit the stereotypical mold, but one thing is for sure - Weatherly's teammates have embraced him wholeheartedly.

Patterson pointed out that when Everson Griffen was away from the team for five

weeks to focus on a personal matter and Weatherly stepped in to start for him, no one was a bigger supporter of the younger end than Griffen.

"That gives you an idea of how much they care about him," Patterson said. "I think those guys have become a close-knit group. They all come from different places, they all have different things that are important to them, they all have different things that motivate them. But the common goal they share is that football is important to them, and they're willing to put in the hard work to try to be the best player they can be."

Asked about Weatherly's personality and how he meshes with the group, Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer smiled.

"Yeah, he's quirky," Zimmer acknowledged. "He's a little bit out there, but he fits in good. He works real hard. I think the rest of the guys like him. He's just a different dude."

Richardson said that Weatherly puts his heart and soul into the defense.

"He puts the same type of energy and effort in as Danielle Hunter," Richardson said. "He watches film just like anybody else. Comes in, he knows his job; Coach trusts him to make the calls on the field for us in games."

When the Vikings signed Richardson as a free agent in March, he had never met Weatherly. Now, he's his biggest fan.

"OK, first impressions? ... He's weird," Richardson said, letting out a laugh. "But when you get to know him, you just understand him. You have to understand guys' backgrounds, you know?

"We jam pretty good," Richardson added. "That's my guy. He turned out to be my guy. I love my guy, you know? For real."

Lost voice at Vikings game




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
The Vikings have a couple of four-timers, a repeat customer and one player set to make his Pro Bowl debut, the NFL and team announced earlier this month.

The four-timers are safety Harrison Smith and linebacker Anthony Barr. Receiver Adam Thielen has garnered his second selection in a row, and Danielle Hunter has been

named to the NFC's all-star squad for the first time. Pro Bowl voting is determined by a combination of votes by NFL players, coaches and fans.





Despite missing three games with a hamstring injury, Barr has 68 tackles (team stats), eight tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, two pass breakups and one forced fumble. Barr said garnering votes from players and coaches of other teams "always makes it a little more special" because they know that the impact of a player goes beyond stats.

"Obviously you've got respect from people that you play with throughout the week and the year, so you're doing something right. If you look at stats, and the stats aren't jumping out at you, you assume he's not playing well, but I think our defense is different. I think we're a very unselfish group and we play together."

Smith is a versatile force, capable of covering passes, blitzing passers and stuffing running backs. He has three interceptions on the year and has tied his career high for sacks in a season with 3.0. Smith ranks second on the Vikings with 89 tackles (team stats), has eight pass breakups, nine tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble. Smith was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for Week 1 after recording seven solo tackles and a game-clinching interception against San Francisco.

"It's an honor to be voted in, but that's not what it's all about. Normally those things are because you have a lot

of good players around you, too, and you play good as a team."

Hunter also recorded 2.0 sacks against the Dolphins, bringing his season total to 14.5, which is a career-high for the fourth-year player. Hunter just pushed his career sacks total to 40, breaking Hall of Famer Alan Page's record for sacks in a Viking's first four pro seasons.

Hunter ranks fourth on the Vikings with 71 tackles and leads Minnesota with 26 tackles for loss (team stats). He returned a fumble 32 yards for a touchdown and had 3.5 sacks against the Lions on Nov. 4 to win NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors.

Thielen ranks fourth in the NFL with 110 receptions, eighth with 1,335 receiving yards and tied for seventh with nine touchdown catches. He has nine games with at least 100 receiving yards this season, breaking a Vikings record set by Hall of Famer Randy Moss (eight in 2000 and 2003).

Thielen became the first player in NFL history to record more than 100 receiving yards in each of the first eight games of a season. He and Calvin Johnson are the only two players in NFL history to have eight such games in a row.
















RUDOLPH, VIKINGS BRING

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
