

THE VIKINGS FELL 21-7 TO THE SEAHAWKS IN SEATTLE ON ESPN'S MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL.

The game was much closer than the score indicated. Minnesota trailed 6-0 until a blocked field goal was followed by the only touchdown drive of the night by Seattle's offense. Chris Carson rushed for a 2-yard score with 2:53 to go, and the Seahawks quickly added a defensive touchdown just 18 seconds later. Minnesota avoided the shutout with a touchdown drive in 1:25, but it was too little, too late.





- Dalvin Cook caught a 6-yard touchdown pass from Kirk Cousins and totaled 83 yards from scrimmage.
- **§ 1** Stefon Diggs led the Vikings with 76 receiving yards on four catches, including a 48-yarder.

PLAYER TO WATCH: LB ANTHONY BARR

BARR IS A DYNAMIC FORCE that opposing teams often try to avoid. The 2014 firstround pick is a substantial part of the reason that Minnesota's defense was able to go from 32nd and 31st in the NFL, respectively, in points against and yards allowed in 2013 to lead the NFL in both categories in 2017. Minnesota enters today's game ranked fifth in yards allowed and 11th in points against, despite dealing with multiple injuries to Vikings defenders, including Barr. His streak of consecutive starts was snapped at 41 because of a hamstring injury he suffered in Week 7. The three-time Pro Bowler allows Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer to give teams a considerable amount to worry about, particularly on third downs, and the attention that other teams place on Barr can help free up Vikings teammates. Minnesota enters today's game ranked first in the NFL on third downs, allowing conversions just 29.7 percent of the time.


PLAYER TO WATCH: RB FRANK GORE

Frank Gore's nickname is "The Inconvenient Truth." He's also seemingly an "ageless wonder." The 35-year-old running back is leading the Dolphins with 708 rushing yards. What is perhaps even more impressive is his efficiency. He enters today's game averaging 4.7 yards per carry, his highest since 2012 when he earned his fourth of five career Pro Bowl selections while with San Francisco (2005-14). Gore set 49ers all-time rushing records in yards (11,073), attempts (2,442) and touchdowns (64) during his 10 seasons in San Francisco. He spent three seasons with Indianapolis, rushing for no fewer than 961 yards in any season with the Colts, and joined Miami this offseason. Gore hasn't missed a game since 2010 and has started all 16 every year since 2012. Gore has 14,734 career rushing yards (fourth in the NFL) and 77 rushing touchdowns, which is tied with Tony Dorsett for 22nd all-time. Gore's next rushing score will be his first of 2018 and tie him with Ricky Watters.

Gore has moved past Curtis Martin (14,101 career rushing yards) for fourth in NFL history. He enters today's game needing 536 to overtake Barry Sanders (15,269) for third all-time.

SOME ARE LISTED AS rivalry games or prime-time tilts, depending on the opponent of the week.

Today's game against the Dolphins?

The Vikings running back, who grew up in Miami, has this one down as a "Popcorn Ready Game."

"I was definitely a Dolphins fan ... my whole family was Dolphins fans," Cook said. "I'm actually going to have like 20 family members coming up for the game.

"This is definitely one of those games that you look forward to in a season," Cook added. "Especially with my family coming out and this being a team I grew up watching, so yeah ... a lot of preparation."

It comes as no surprise to hear that Cook's favorite Dolphins players were running backs.

"There were two ... I had Ricky [Williams] and Ronnie Brown," Cook said. "The whole concept they had running the Wildcat and just the ground game, period."

Williams and Brown combined for 1.575 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns in 2008 when Miami implemented the formation with a running back at quarterback under the direction of the late Tony Sparano.

But things weren't always easy for Cook and his family in Miami, as the 23-year-old said life in the city helped him grow up quickly.

"It helped me mature as fast as possible. It will make you mature more than you want to," Cook said. "It definitely molded me into the person that I am today. It helps me pursue everything with passion. That's how I grew up, and it carried over to the man I am now.

"My mom, she had us young, but she kept up her drive with going to school and pushing us," Cook added. "My oldest brother faced a lot of adversity, so it was just instilled in us to have that drive to not quit and not let things deteriorate."

Cook attended Miami Central High School, where he ran for 4,267 total yards and 64 touchdowns while leading the Rockets to a 52-5 record.

He then had a successful career at Florida State, where he set school records with 4,464 career rushing vards and 46 touchdowns.

The Vikings traded up to snag Cook in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick. He tore his ACL in Week 4 of the 2017 season and then missed multiple games this season with a hamstring injury.

Cook has 721 rushing yards and four total touchdowns in 12 career games with Minnesota.

Cook recently sat down for a Timeout with vikings.com to discuss how he stayed positive despite injuries, his adventures in the kitchen and the joy he gets from playing football.

 □ Did you use that mentality you gained in Miami f U over the past two seasons when you dealt with your torn ACL as a rookie and then your hamstring injury this season?

A. I definitely did. I looked at it as ... if I could get through a lot of things I got through, this ain't nothing but time, and I just have to wait it out. I just put it in that perspective and kept the long-term goal that I was going to be back out there and I would be ready.

• You have flashed big-time potential when healthy. Is there something inside you that is waiting for a consistent stretch where you can show the league your talents?

A. I definitely have that feeling. I've been itching for it, and it's definitely going to come. I just keep stacking my days up and keep coming here with my hard hat on and just keep learning. I know my talent ... once I really step out and do what I do, it's going to be something special.

 Cameras always catch you dancing in warmups and smiling on the sideline. Where does that joy for the game come from?

A. The only way I know how to play the game is loose. That's not doing anything out of my character, it's just having fun and doing it with a smile on my face. If you go out there and are tight, then you're not going to be able to express yourself. I just go out there and show my character.

One of your nicknames is "The Chef," so how are your cooking chille?

A. I'm in the process of learning. I do a lot of YouTubing stuff and going to places and learning how to do stuff. I'm not trying to burn down the house or anything.

Where's your favorite place in eat in Minnesota?

 It's a spot by my crib, it's called Jake's [City Grille]. **h.** I go there probably two times a week. I go there and get my shrimp and sausage soup, that's what I start it off with. And then I get my chicken alfredo pasta. That's my go-to.

What's the vibe like in the running back room?

A. It's tight. We're as tight as you get. We stress that so much because guys see things that other people don't see. If you're not a close-knit group, then you're not going to be able to communicate that to each other. We're real tight, and we do a lot of things together.

How much do you value Vikings running backs coach Kennedy Polamalu's leadership and wisdom from his extensive coaching experience?

N • We love him to death, man. He can relate to us $oldsymbol{h_{ullet}}$ on so many levels – as a brother, too. He knows when to do things and when to say things. He can relate to us on so many levels, and his track record speaks for itself. We love Coach KP.

LETTERS EXPLAIN TIGHT END'S

IMPACT ON LIVES



You meant a lot to Anton, which means a lot to me. ... One of the few things that would make his day was you, and mashed potatoes. ... I don't know how to thank you but I will keep trying until I get it right. I can never thank you enough! But I can thank you for being there as a friend to Anton. He really loved you. ... Every day at the hospital was pain for Anton, but he always seemed happy, especially when you walked through the door.

The above excerpts are from a letter of thanks written by Kenya Delgado, 12, of Texas, to Kyle Rudolph, who has been selected as the 2018 Vikings Community Man of the Year and the team's nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year.

She first met Kyle during a visit by the Vikings tight end to the University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital while her brother was undergoing treatment in 2015.

Kyle didn't know those words - and other heartfelt notes of thanks – were waiting on him when he walked into TCO Studios one morning before the day's meetings started.

The reliably composed tight end sat down and was presented a folder. Nondescript on the outside, the folder's contents were anything but.

Words from Kenya, her 8-year-old brother, Judah, and their mother, Vanessa, reminded Kyle of his small friend who faced such tough challenges and never backed down but passed away at age 5.

There were notes from other patients and their family members, reconnections with people from his hometown of Cincinnati and Elder High School, former Notre Dame Head Coach Charlie Weis, and Kyle's wife, Jordan.

The Rudolphs have twin daughters, 2, and a son on the way, but helping the patients and their families remains a priority. Kyle Rudolph's End Zone, which opened in March 2018 after more than a year of fundraising (\$1.6 million), has provided a place of respite, and the entire Rudolph family brightens spirits during multiple visits throughout the year.

The ink - handwritten or typed - made the

tattooed tough guy tap his feet, shift positions multiple times and tear up.

As the gratitude gushed from page to page, so did he.

"My wife doesn't even see me cry much," Kyle explained, still full of emotion just moments after reading the final note. "She could probably tell you she could count on one hand - we've known each other for almost 10 years. She got mad at me because I didn't cry at our wedding. It's just not something I do, but when you hear from so many people that you love, you hear their appreciation, it means a lot."

Time was short, and the outlook was bleak.

It didn't matter that Anton and the Delgado family had been able to attend Minnesota's Nov. 8, 2015, victory against the St. Louis Rams.

A month later, as Kyle and teammates were en

route for a Dec. 10 game at Arizona, Jordan let him know that there was nothing doctors could do to save Anton's life.

"Without any hesitation in his voice, he was like, 'I'll be there.' I don't even know what time they got home [from Arizona]; it was probably 3 or 4 in the morning, and he told me he couldn't sleep. He went and got bagels and donuts and was at that hospital by 7."

In addition to breakfast just hours after returning from a 23-20 loss, Kyle brought the jersey from the 2013 Pro Bowl when he won MVP honors.

Before presenting it to Anton, Kyle wrote: To Anton:

From a Pro Bowl MVP to a real life MVP. Anton passed away on Dec. 15, 2015. He was buried in a Vikings Kyle Rudolph jersey.

The Delgado family, who is here at today's game, can't stop appreciating Kyle's willingness to be there, with them when death was certain but the timing wasn't known

"He could have said, 'Hey we're thinking of you, we're praying for you,' but instead he offered to step into this really hard place that I don't think would have been easy for a lot of people to do," Vanessa said.

"Anton, at this point, was sleeping most of the time, and he opened his eyes and looked at Kyle and looked at the Pro Bowl jersey that Kyle gave him," Vanessa added. "It was probably one of the last three smiles, I think, of his life."

The friendship between Kyle and Anton was so natural that Kyle became part of the Delgado family, understanding their grief and sharing their sorrow.

"Kyle offered to be there with us and sit there with us during hard things," Vanessa said. "I think that's one of my memories with Kyle that I'll treasure forever, that he didn't do the easy thing ... he stepped into Anton's room, a place death was coming."

Kyle was grateful that he made it back to visit Anton one final time. "He couldn't say much, but his smile pretty much said it all," Kyle said.

> It's been three years since Anton passed away, but his spirit and courage live on. In 2016, Kyle used his "My Cause, My Cleats"

platform to display "Anton Tough," a catchphrase that sprouted when it was written by a nurse during the child's final week.

"That was huge for us because he definitely is one of the bravest, toughest people in the world," Vanessa said of the son she and her husband, Jason, adopted from Russia. "His skin condition left him with open wounds all over his body, comparable to third-degree burns, so from the time he was born to the time he was 5 years old, it's a life of pain and narcotics to cope and really hard things, but you never would have known, meeting him.

"He was the happiest, most joyful person in the world and never was down," she added "So Anton Tough became his catchphrase and slogan, and that has just translated into all of our lives. We can do hard things. We can go through things that we don't want to go through and walk them out with grace because Anton showed us all of that because he was the toughest person we all had met."

Kyle has an innate ability to connect with patients and families. His brother, Casey, survived pediatric cancer. Kyle, who was young at the time, has since learned what it was like for his brother and their parents.

The sincere bonds developed help inspire patients like Nathan Njoroge, who was diagnosed with neuroblastoma in March 2017.

"He's gone through multiple chemotherapy sessions, he's gone through surgery, two transplants, radiation, and now is working to better his immune system," said Nathan's father, Edwin. "He's pushing and charging and doing what it takes to get better and staying positive."

Nathan created a handmade newsletter, complete with photos, to express his appreciation to Kyle.

In planning Kyle Rudolph's End Zone, the Rudolphs met with the hospital's Kids' Council, which is made up of patients, past patients and siblings.

The space includes a basketball hoop, sports simulator, bubble hockey table, sensory space for patients on the autism spectrum, a lounge, video game consoles, space for arts and crafts and a family kitchen.

Those are the visible amenities. The impact of Kyle Rudolph's End Zone, however, runs much deeper.

Ashley Baltzell wrote that the End Zone has made her son, Cooper, "so much happier during hospitalizations."

"It's a place that he can decompress after going through medical procedures, and most importantly, a place he can go to where he actually forgets that he is in the hospital," Baltzell wrote. "Cooper becomes a different kid when he visits: he doesn't have anxiety about which doctor will come in the door next, or which procedure will come next. Cooper is able to just be a kid and PLAY without any fears."

Jade, a 17-year-old, provided ideas for the End Zone and has been inspired by Kyle's commitment to community service to pay it forward with a special project of her own.

Her mother, Shonna Gacke, wrote a note about how the involvement in the End Zone so positively impacted lade:

For kids with critical, life-threatening illnesses, they may not feel like they have a voice or say in what is happening; you gave that to her, and I can't thank you enough for that.

Kyle demonstrated care and concern for others much earlier in life. When he was about Jade's age, he was a multisport standout at Elder High

School in Cincinnati. He remains a supporter of the program, providing a major financial donation for the school's athletic facilities, but the connection is even more personal. Greg Wolber, whose son Jeffrey, now 23, was born with Spina Bifida, is confined to a wheelchair and is developmentally delayed.

Kyle made sure that Jeffrey was included and treated well, from giving Jeffrey a pair of football gloves to simple high-fives and fist bumps.

Kyle has since been able to send the family tickets to attend a Notre Dame game and to see the Vikings. He also still exchanges text messages with Jeffrey.

Wolber's letter included:

A lot of kids in high school would ignore, snub or walk away from kids like Jeffrey. But not Kyle, he always made it a point to come over and say something to Jeffrey and shake his hand.

Weis vividly recalled recruiting Kyle to Notre Dame, together taking the first steps of an everlasting bond between the coach and player that went well beyond the gridiron.

Weis considers Kyle an honorary son, and Kyle believes there's been no better second father figure in his life.

Weis wrote with parent-like pride:

You had already begun a life of community service without even knowing it.

As I taught our team's players about community service and the impact they could have off the field, I often used you as an example.

Of all the players that I have been involved with in 37 years of coaching, no one has done more for others than you.

As a guy who coached in the NFL for 16 years ... I believe you would be the perfect choice to receive the Walter Payton Man of the Year Award.

Kyle said Weis has been "one of the big role models in my life and someone who taught me a lot about service."

"The way that he lives his life and how he serves others ... his heart never stops. I try to make him proud and do what I can to help others."

NFL MAN OF THE YEAR NOMINEE

Vikings Executive Director of Social Impact Brett Taber announced Kyle Rudolph's selection to Twin Cities media members, and Owner/ President Mark Wilf presented Kyle with the award for Vikings Community Man of the Year earlier this month.

"I've been with the Vikings for 12 years," Taber said. "In that time, I've seen no player that has embraced this community more, given more of their time, their money, their celebrity to making this community and world a better place, so thank you, Kyle, for that."

As the Vikings Community Man of the Year, Rudolph received \$50,000 to donate to charity. An additional \$50,000 will be donated on his behalf to the United Way's Character Playbook, a digital educational program.

As a nominee, Rudolph will wear a Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year helmet decal through the end of the season in recognition of his accomplishments on and off the field. New this year, all 32 team winners will be highlighted as finalists and recognized for their important work during the weekend leading up to Super Bowl LIII.

The 2018 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year will be announced during NFL Honors, a twohour prime-time awards special to air nationally on Feb. 2, the eve of Super Bowl LIII, on CBS. NFL Honors will be at Fox Theatre in Atlanta.

Kyle thanked the Wilf family for setting an example that encourages Vikings players to positively impact the community.

"What you guys have built here from a facilities standpoint, obviously, but from a personnel standpoint is second to none," Rudolph said. "Without your guys' leadership,

we wouldn't have the drive and the opportunity to do the things that we do in the community, so thank you for that."

He also thanked previous teammates who took a fresh-faced 21-year-old under their wing immediately in 2011, noting the influence of previous Vikings Community Man of the Year winners Steve Hutchinson, John Sullivan and Chad Greenway.

"Jordan and I are extremely passionate about kids, and we do what we can do to help them be just that. They're not in the circumstances they're in for a reason. These diseases and cancers that they're fighting don't discriminate."



"It's very important that we support those who are serving our country and help them out in any way, especially with the moving around that they do. I think it's very beneficial that we help these kids, and United Heroes League does a really good job of that."

MAYBE THE EMOTIONAL MOMENT

will come when Rashod Hill slips on his cleats in the locker room, or perhaps it will happen sometime during a break in the action.

But at some point during today's game against Miami, the Vikings offensive tackle will surely look down at his feet and take a moment to reflect about the people closest to him and how important they are.

Hill will honor his 3-year-old daughter, Codie, who has partial hearing loss, by sporting purple and black cleats that recognize The Starkey Hearing Foundation. Hill's footwear, which has "The Gift of Hearing" inscribed in silver letters, are a part of the NFL's "My Cause, My Cleats" initiative.

"It's emotional a little bit, but at the same time [I also feel] pride and strong that I can wear them to bring awareness to hearing loss," Hill said. "To bring attention to that, it's going to be a blessing to have them on my feet.

"It's amazing the NFL does that because it's gives guys a chance to bring awareness to stuff they believe and they care about. You know more about a guy when he brings stuff like that out," Hill added about the "My Cause, My Cleats" campaign. "It gives me an opportunity to bring awareness to this. People are dealing with different things ... whatever I can do to help bring awareness to this, I'm all in for it."

Codie was born to Rashod and Tara in May of 2015, but was roughly a month premature. It didn't take doctors long to suspect something was amiss regarding Codie's hearing, as test results showed she had profound hearing loss in both of her ears.

"She was diagnosed when she was a baby in the NICU (neonatal intensive care unit)," Tara

Hill said. "[Her hearing loss] went from mild to moderate to severe."

The Hills said their first reaction was one of denial.

"The first sign was that they did some tests and found she couldn't hear anything," Rashod said. "As a parent, the first thing you think is, 'No, my child can hear. She's just like everybody else.'

"But once we realized that was the problem, my first instinct was, 'Come on, let's jump on this now.' That way in the future she can be like everybody else," he added.

Codie wore hearing aids for six months as an infant, but they had little effect, so she was given a cochlear implant for her right side.

That's the setup Codie had lived with until a week in late November, when the Hills visited the campus of Starkey Hearing Technologies in



Eden Prairie and had a life-changing day. Codie received VIP treatment from Starkey Owner and CEO Bill Austin and his staff, as they cleaned out her ears, gave her a hearing test and took an impression of her left ear.

Starkey then made a custom left hearing aid for Codie in less than an hour, with the hope that device will combine with the right cochlear implant and boost her overall hearing.

"Codie, at her age, she's not familiar with sound and doesn't respond well to testing," Austin said. "We're trying to put some energy load into her inner ear and see what her reaction is to that input she's getting."

Rashod said he was awestruck by the kindness and humility of the Starkey staff.

"We didn't know we were going to meet the CEO of this place," he said with a laugh. "That was amazing, and it was a blessing. It was humbling."

Austin, who founded Starkey in 1970, said one of the greatest joys of his job is helping young people improve their ability to hear.

"Working with young children, they have a whole lifetime ahead of them." Austin said. "It's so important for them, but hearing is important for everyone. If you're not connected to your family, you're not connected to life. You need to be connected to your social environment and people ... nobody should be punished [for bad hearing]; they haven't done anything wrong."

"Just like if you don't see so good, you need some glasses. If you don't hear so good, and you

can fix it, it should be fixed." Austin added. "It makes more of a difference than almost anyone realizes. If you look at hearing loss, people adapt to it and put it off, and they start accepting it as normal. It shouldn't be that way."

The hearing aid in Codie's left ear appeared to work right away, as she looked around in wonder, knowing that she was hearing something on her left side.

A few days after the visit. Hill said that Codie was responding well to the device. Codie will also return to Starkey in a few weeks for a checkup.

"It's helped. I called her name ... I said, 'Codie,' ... and she looked at me," Rashod said. "It's making a real difference. She's making sure it stays in. She likes it in and is getting adjusted to it."

It hasn't always been easy for the Hill family to deal with Codie's hearing loss. Both Rashod and Tara mentioned how they have had to gain a sense of understanding about their daughter, such as tapping her to get her attention rather than simply saying her name.

"The thing it taught me is being patient. She can't [hear] like everybody else, but at the same time, I'm not going to let that hinder her." Hill said. "I still treat her like my 8-yearold. The main thing is just being patient."

Added Tara: "Patience is key."

Because of her hearing loss, Codie also has a limited vocabulary and works with a speech therapist because she hasn't been able to learn and decipher verbal language.

But the spunky 3-year-old with a quick smile is on the right path thanks to Austin and the Starkey staff, as well as a set of parents who now want to explore opportunities to give back to other families in similar situations.

"We want to get a chance to talk to different families who are just now getting to the process and getting into the situation," Tara said. "In the beginning, it was in denial for us.

"For some families, it's hard to accept something you cannot control," she added. "One of our biggest things is talking to the families who are dealing with the same issue."

Added Hill: "We definitely want to [give back] because this impacts our lives. We want to see how we can help more and learn more

The Vikings offensive tackle will start by wearing his custom cleats to support his little girl.

Hill saw the cleats for the first time at Starkey with his family sitting beside him, a wide smile crossing his face. After admiring them for a few seconds, Codie reached for them and looked on with curiosity.

"It's been a journey, and I'm pretty sure there's still going to be a lot more to go," Hill said. "But we love her and give her everything she needs.

"It gives us hope. We know she can overcome this," Hill added with Codie nearby. "We're just keeping a positive mind. But I wake up every day smiling to see her because she's my baby."

JUSTICE ALAN PAGE HAS QUITE THE LIST OF HONORS TO HIS NAME.

The former Vikings defensive tackle is in the Pro Football Hall of Fame as well as the College Football Hall of Fame. Page was the first African-American judge to serve on Minnesota's Supreme Court. In 2017, a Minneapolis school changed its name to Justice Page Middle School after a student-led campaign.

In November, Page was named one of seven Presidential Medal of Freedom recipients and presented the United States' top civilian honor by President Donald Trump at the White House.

Hall of Fame quarterback Roger Staubach, Sen. Orrin G. Hatch and Miriam Adelson also received awards in-person. Rock-and-roll legend Elvis Presley, Baseball Hall of Famer Babe Ruth and late Supreme Court Associate Justice Antonin Scalia were recognized posthumously.

President John F. Kennedy established the Medal of Freedom in 1963.

In true Page fashion, he deflected the honor from himself and credited many others for their roles in his accomplishments, including his late wife, Diane Sims Page, who passed away Sept. 29.

Page wrote in a letter of response to receiving the Medal of Freedom that his reception of the award includes Civil Rights activists who fought for – and even died for – an expansion of racial equality, his family, former teammates, the Vikings organization, the more than 7,000 Page Scholars who have benefited from the Page Education Foundation (established in 1988) and the students of Justice Page Middle School "who give me hope for the future."

He wrote:

Most important, it includes Diane Sims Page, the love of my life and life partner, a woman whose quest for racial, gender, and social justice knew no bounds and who encouraged, lifted, and allowed me to become more than I might otherwise have been.

Page explained that receiving a phone message about the award "was like a bolt of lightning out of nowhere."

"It wouldn't have occurred to me that I would be considered, particularly when you think about the others who have received that recognition." Page said. "Once I got over the surprise, my thought process was, 'Why is this important?' In the end, I concluded that it is important because it's a recognition of the work that Diane and I have done pretty much from the beginning of our adult lives, to try to establish fairness, to create hope and opportunity through education.

It's a recognition of the values that we've tried to represent.

"It's a recognition of those people who went before us, whose shoulders we've had the privilege of standing on to do the things we've done. Opportunity and obligation," Page added. "Certainly the opportunity presents itself, but beyond the opportunity, I have this deep sense of obligation because of all the good things that happened to me."

Page was somber as television cameras showed him receiving the medal. He said his emotions that day "were mixed at best" because he was proud to have three of his four children, all four grandchildren and multiple other family members in Washington, D.C., because "their support on that day was very important."

"Receiving the medal, all I could think about was the fact that Diane wasn't there. She would have loved to have been a part of it," Page said. "She would have loved to have had the opportunity. which I did, to meet seven of the nine members of the Supreme Court, have a picture taken with Justice Ginsburg, which is pretty special. You don't often get the chance to be in the presence of greatness, and Justice Ginsburg, being in her presence is being in the presence of greatness."

The seniors learned on Dec. 4 that they'd be touring Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center.

One fan described Dennis as "excellent"


and added. "He has always extended a warm welcome and has been helpful with our firsttime fans to the stadium. He is a huge asset to our game-day experience!"
