



The Vikings upset the Packers 28-22 in Week 8 on a windy day at Lambeau Field. Minnesota's offense protected the football and sustained scoring drives, ending its first four possessions with touchdowns. A short-handed defense delivered key plays at opportune moments.

Dalvin Cook escapes a tackle attempt by Vernon Scott during a 50-yard TD on a screen pass. It was Cook's fourth total touchdown of the game. He finished with 226 yards from scrimmage and scored three rushing TDs for the first time in his career.



In addition to blocking for Cook, Garrett Bradbury and Dakota Dozier were part of an offensive line's effort that helped Kirk Cousins complete 11 of 14 passes (78.6 percent) on his way to a passer rating of 138.1.

This will be the 118th meeting between the Vikings and Lions franchises and fifth at U.S. Bank Stadium.

Minnesota (2-5) enters the game after upsetting division-leading Green Bay (5-2) at Lambeau Field and is seeking its first home win of 2020 in a contest that again will be played without fans in attendance.

Detroit (3-4) lost to Indianapolis in Week 8 after defeating Jacksonville and Atlanta in the two games after its Week 5 bye.

The Lions added former Vikings Adrian Peterson and Jayron Kearse this offseason and traded to acquire Everson Griffen after his short stint with the Cowboys. Griffen played seven games for Dallas, recording 2.5 sacks. He is expected to make his debut for Detroit against Minnesota, for whom he totaled 74.5 sacks.

FIRST GLANCE

Vikings Defense vs. Lions Offense:

Minnesota's defense found a way to put enough

players on the field and make enough big plays at key moments in the upset win at Green Bay. The unit has allowed an average of 411.7 yards per game (29th in the NFL) but is fifth in the NFL on third downs (allowed success rate of 35.4%) and eighth in the red zone (touchdown rate of 57.7%). In addition to Peterson, it will be important for the Vikings to limit the impact of Matthew Stafford, who ranks 18th all-time in passing yards (42,941) and touchdowns (269).

Vikings Offense vs. Lions Defense:

Dalvin Cook totaled 226 scrimmage yards – the second most by a Viking against the Packers in a game – and became the third Minnesota player to ever score four touchdowns in a game (Chuck Foreman in 1975 and Ahmad Rashad in 1979 were the others). Cook's 10 rushing touchdowns lead the NFL and are a Vikings record through Week 8. He also ranks second in the NFL with 652 rushing yards. Detroit has allowed 130.0 rushing yards per game (which ranks 23rd in the NFL) and ranks 26th in the red zone (has allowed touchdowns on 71.4%).



Kendricks embodies a modern-day NFL linebacker capable of defending multiple types of running backs. A sure-handed tackler who has led the Vikings in tackles in each of his first five seasons, he enters Week 9 ranked third in the NFL and on track to tie the franchise record number of seasons set by Pro Bowlers Scott Studwell (1980-85) and Chad Greenway (2008-13). Kendricks also has shown his versatility in being able to defend running backs, tight ends and receivers on passes. He tied for the NFL lead among linebackers in 2019 with 12 pass breakups en route to his first Pro Bowl and First-Team All-Pro selections. Kendricks' first regular-season home game of his career was against the Lions. He recorded five tackles as a reserve in a 26-16 win by Minnesota. He became a starter two weeks later and has manned the middle ever since, wrapping up runners, covering receivers and blitzing or bluffing quarterbacks.

CRANKING OUT THE HITS

Over his first five seasons, Kendricks has played in eight games against the Lions. He has totaled 51 tackles (36 solo), 3.0 sacks, seven tackles for loss, six quarterback hits and two pass breakups, helping Minnesota go 6-2 against Detroit in those games.

Peterson will be leaving the visitors' locker room at U.S. Bank Stadium for the third time ever and in Honolulu Blue for the first time at the venue. Peterson played for the Saints, opening the 2017 season with six carries for 18 yards against the team that drafted him in 2007. He returned last season with Washington and rushed 14 times for 76 yards while adding 27 yards on two catches. The 35-year-old is sure to bring an intensity against his former squad. Peterson joined the Lions this offseason, continuing his climb up the all-time leading rushers list. He is currently fifth with 14,537 and trails Lions Legend Barry Sanders' 15,269 career yards by 732. The only players with more yards than Sanders or Peterson are Emmitt Smith (18,355), Walter Payton (16,726) and Frank Gore (15,687). As a member of the Vikings, Peterson recorded 1,490 rushing yards in 14 games against the Lions, his third-highest yardage total against any team.

NO END TO REACHING END ZONE

Peterson ranks fourth in NFL history with 113 rushing touchdowns. Emmitt Smith is the all-time leader with 164, followed by LaDainian Tomlinson with 145 and Marcus Allen at 123. The Vikings are one of five teams that Peterson has not scored a touchdown against, along with the Ravens, Colts, Jets and 49ers.

The breakaway — "He's LOOSE!" — has been an impressive attribute of Peterson's career. He has recorded 25 runs that have gained 50 or more yards, including four against the Lions while a member of the Vikings.

Those runs include an 80-yarder in Week 3 of 2010 and a 78-yard scamper in Week 1 of the 2013 season.



Tributes have rolled in on multiple types of media platforms with condolences expressed from coast-to-coast and memories shared with the lamentation that there will never be another Sid Hartman.

The native of North Minneapolis overcame numerous obstacles during his youth and worked his way up the newspaper industry.

He became an instrumental influencer long before Instagram, helping bring big-league sports to the Twin Cities and earning first-name fame.

It was Hartman in 1947 who hand-delivered a \$15,000 check from Ben Berger and Morris Chalfen to purchase the Detroit Gems franchise from Maurice Winston. The franchise was renamed the Minneapolis Lakers.

Max Winter served as team president, but Hartman was effectively general manager and led the team to sign Minnesota Gophers multisport standout Bud Grant, who is the only man to play in the NBA (1949-51) and NFL (1951-52).

The Lakers won league titles in five of their first six seasons, and Hartman was involved with the team until 1957. The franchise moved to Los Angeles in 1960.

Hartman had been on the Gophers beat when Grant arrived in Dinkytown and quickly built a friendship that spanned parts of nine decades. Winter — one of five original Minnesota Vikings owners — and the team's leadership hired Grant to be the second head coach in team history in 1967.

The relationship between Hartman and Grant reached "best friend" status and included multiple high points.

"There are a lot of stories about Sid, and they're all positive," Grant said during an interview by Dave Lee and Mike Max on WCCO Radio hours after Hartman passed away on Oct. 18. "They're all good.

"I've said it many times, and will repeat it: Of all

the people in this world, Sid had more integrity than anybody I've ever known. He was my very best friend," Grant continued. "He would never betray a confidence, and that's why he had so many friends in the sports world. They all could trust Sid. And he never said anything blind, he never put anybody on the spot. He had a way of writing, you bought it, but he never took anybody to task that I know of. He was my best friend, and I loved him dearly."

Grant respected and loved Hartman so much that the stoic coach asked the journalist to present him for the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.

Hartman was an epic speaker when "Bud Grant Way" was dedicated outside of U.S. Bank Stadium, and Grant returned the favor when the Sid Hartman Media Entrance was unveiled at the venue.

GOODBYE, CLOSE PERSONAL FRIEND

Sunday is just the third in NFL history without Hartman on the planet.

The legendary columnist passed away peacefully while with family on Oct. 18. The news was announced by his son, Chad Hartman, on Twitter while the Vikings were hosting the Falcons.

Congratulatory words poured in for Hartman in March when he turned 100 on the 15th, just as the sports world and American life as most knew it was upended by the COVID-19 pandemic. A scheduled birthday luncheon full of "close personal friends" – Hartman's trademark term – never happened.

Restrictions and guidelines implemented led to a virtual environment for the NFL Draft and limited visits to Twin Cities Orthopedics Performance Center. Otherwise, Hartman would have kept on working the beat with the gusto he had displayed since Minnesota's inaugural 1961 season.

In the column printed on his 100th birthday, Hartman wrote: "I have followed the advice that if you love what you do, you never work a day in your life. Even at 100, I can say I still love what I do."

Even though in-person interactions stopped, Hartman continued his vocation. His final column that featured fellow Minnesota hero, receiver Adam Thielen, was published on Oct. 18, greeting his avid audience of readers one final time in the *Star Tribune*. Vikings Legends

Fran Tarkenton

Fran Tarkenton, who was drafted in the third round of the 1961 NFL Draft in December 1960, recalled meeting Hartman on his first trip to Minnesota in February 1961:

"It's like 10-below-zero, and we come down at Wold-Chamberlain Field (now known as MSP) off a Northwest Airlines flight from Atlanta to here, and down at the bottom of the steps was Sir Sidney Hartman. I had never heard of him, didn't know who he was. He had his trusty microphone and out in the 10-below-zero, he gave my first interview. Sid Hartman is as important to the Minnesota Vikings as anybody from Bud Grant, Fran Tarkenton, Jim Marshall, Alan Page, Carl Eller, Adrian Peterson. He's just as big of a part of it as any of us."

Ahmad Rashad

Rashad's first career as an NFL receiver took off when he signed with Minnesota in 1976 and said Hartman made a strong initial impression:

"Sid was as much a part of the Vikings as anybody. He was Minnesota. When I first got to the team, he was one of the first people I met. You read his column every day. There was nothing he didn't miss, and he was one of these guys that knew everybody. I met George Steinbrenner with him. George Steinbrenner would come hang out with Sid. He was kind of a throwback. He carried that little recorder everywhere he went, and no one else was doing that. He was a staunch, real reporter, and there was nobody quite like him in the country."

Rashad said Hartman helped his second career by providing tips and encouragement:

"When I started doing television in Minnesota, he was always a person that would come over and inspire me, you know, ask me what I was trying to do, where I wanted to go with this. 'Maybe you should do a little of this or that.' He was just a wonderful, wonderful man. He was just great. There's so many great things to say about him. After I left Minnesota, I was working for NBC and I was doing Wimbledon. I was there with Johnny Carson. There was one day I wasn't going to go, and Sid called me and told me his son was in town and would like to go to Wimbledon. so I left him tickets. and I

think he ended up sitting with Johnny Carson. Sid never let me forget that. Every time I saw him for a year or 20 years later, he would thank me for that.

"There are certain people in your life that have a certain importance that really leaves a mark on your life, and when you look back at it, you realize how fortunate I was to have had someone like Sid Hartman in my life."

Carl Eller

"The thing that I remember the most about Sid is that he was always around. He was a standard ... it was kind of like if Sid said it, that's the way it was. His word was Gospel. He was definitely the Minnesota sports person. He really had the trust from the public. He was the guy they wanted to hear from.

"Sid was truly dedicated and took all of it seriously. You could always count on him to get something, a scoop. People relied on Sid. Sid could get the story when there was a story to be had."

Jim Marshall

"Sid and I had a lot of fun together. Since I've been here, Sid's been a part of the Minnesota Vikings. He was a lot of fun. You could tease him and see that you were being successful at teasing him.

"I was always the jokester around Sid. I told him one time, 'You're not allowed in our locker room anymore, Sid, because we've heard you've been going out and talking about' – it was just something we made up. Sid would say, 'I never did that. I would never do anything like that.' That would be the impetus that we needed to keep on. It was a lot of fun.

"After a few times of him being around and seeing how he worked with the coaches, we began to notice him and accept him."

"It was always fun seeing Sid around. When I was with the Gophers and Vikings, he would always ask me about my brother and how we were doing before any sports-related questions. Sid was and always will be a legend, and he will be missed greatly."



Austin Cutting has made a career change. Well, he's made a change in one of his two current careers. Yes, Cutting is still the Vikings long snapper, a role he has held since he was a seventh-round pick in 2019 out of the United States Air Force Academy.

But after being an acquisitions officer during his time at the Academy,

Cutting is now focused on a different avenue as an active-duty aircraft maintenance officer.

The 24-year-old spent time at a tech school in Texas from early February to late April, where he received plenty of hands-on training for his new role.

> In May, he reported for fulltime work at the 934th Airlift Wing in Minneapolis for more on-the-job training in a field that is a bit foreign to him.

"The goal of the Air Force is to have planes in the air, so if they're not, you know something isn't working right," Cutting said. "For me. it's more [checking on] the status of planes, 'What can we do to fix them, when can they be fixed?' ... Then you get that

information and report it to someone who's higher up than you.

"The biggest thing for me is getting to know the planes. Whether it's something like an engine and they found something that needed to be fixed, or seeing how they replace parts on an airplane ... it's daunting because these aircraft are huge," Cutting said. "You get out there and it's cool to even see them replace a tire and how much goes into that. I've been going to meetings and just doing a lot of learning. But everyone has been there to help me through the process."


Cutting works at the 934th Airlift Wing each Tuesday during the season, and he will resume his full-time work on the base once the Vikings season is over. Until then, Cutting will remain focused on his special teams role.

November is Salute to Service month, an opportunity throughout the NFL to recognize the sacrifice and dedication of active military members, veterans and their families. The recognition includes nominating a player, coach or staff member for the annual Salute to Service Award.

Cutting, who is this year's nominee by the Vikings, said he always appreciates the league-wide initiative and hears a similar sentiment from those in various military branches.

"I'll go into work on the base and people think it's cool. Where else does that really happen? Sometimes they want to talk about football," Cutting said. "But further outside the base, people reach out to me from the military, or people from the Academy.

"It's pretty cool to be able to represent



the Air Force, and the military as a whole," Cutting added. "Hopefully I'm representing them the way they would anticipate. But I know they appreciate it because it's a whole month dedicated to the military."

We caught up with Austin this week for a Water Break, presented by Crown Royal.

• You've now been in the league for a season-and-a-half; what have you learned since Week 1 of your rookie year?

A. "There's been so much ... a lot of it is making sure you're good in the offseason so that you can just roll right into camp. You want to hit the ground running so you don't step back and then have to go forward later. You also have to find a way to make it fun, and make sure you're not always too hard on yourself.

You need to be that, but at the same time, you have to step back and have fun with it because then you'll realize you're making the most out of it."

Long snapper is a unique position, as there are only 32 of you around the league. What's the bond or fraternity like with that specific group of players?

A. "Yeah, you get to talk during the pregame [in a normal year], and it's like they know what you're going through, and you know what they're going through. You kind of click right away. It's been fun to meet guys I've studied and looked at in the past. It's been cool to talk to them and get advice or get a different perspective. It is like a little fraternity, but it's like that for all of the specialists."

• How does a long snapper work through a virtual offseason and stay sharp?

A: "I was snapping on my own and working out. The nice thing about snapping is that you can snap to honestly anything. You can snap to a pole, net, anything ... because during the game the punter is just standing there. Honestly, it was as simple as that. Snapping into anything I could find ... a bag or a net, and just working out, too. It was a different offseason, but you make the most of it."

Q: You're back together again with veterans
Dan Bailey and Britton Colquitt. Those two
seem to have opposite personalities, with Britton
as the funny one and Dan as the more serious
one. Where do you fit in that trio?

A: "I would favor more on the side of how Dan is, but we all like to have fun. Britton is just the vocal one. I'm quiet. I just hang out, but Britton tries to pull it out of us and makes it fun. That's why with his whole thing with stuffed animals, why he says my animal is a sloth. It fits me and my personality perfectly. Just kind of there and going with the flow."

• You lettered in power lifting in high school.

Does that background still help you as a long snapper?

A. "Well, it wasn't a lot [of weight] when I look back on it now. My squat was like higher 4s [400-plus pounds], and my bench was mid-3s. The most I ever got on deadlift was right at 500 or a little bit over. But it definitely doesn't hurt because you've got people you're going up against sometimes that are freaks. They're super strong and fast, and you have to do what you can do to stop them, so it definitely helps with more lower-body stuff. That's where your power is going to be coming from."

There's no secret about what the Vikings intend for their offensive identity.

Running the football is a mindset that has been preached about and harped on since the early days of offseason meetings, back when Vikings Offensive Coordinator Gary Kubiak was laying the foundation for what he wanted the 2020 Vikings offense to look like.

And with running backs Dalvin Cook and Alexander Mattison at his disposal – along with Vikings Head Coach Mike Zimmer's preference for running the ball – Kubiak has dug into his coaching roots to ensure that the Vikings will rely upon their ground game during the 2020 season.

And at the midway point of this season, it's clear that the Vikings rushing attack is not only the strength of the offense, but perhaps the entire team, too.

"I think it's commitment to running the ball. You can sit there and say, 'This guy was a great player,' or 'That guy was a great player,' and you've got to have them to be successful," Kubiak said this offseason about his offensive philosophy. "But I think anything you do in football, if you're committed to something, then you've probably got a pretty good chance of being successful at it.

"We really start our classroom offensively, we walk into the room and tell our guys, 'We're committed to running the football and being a physical team.' I work for a head coach that talks that same way," Kubiak added. "It's just really a mindset of saying, 'Hey, we're going to be good at doing this and we're not going to find ways not to run the ball. We're going to find ways to run the ball.' I think it just gets back to commitment."

The 2020 season marks Kubiak's 25th season in the league as a coach, with 23 of those spent as either a head coach or offensive coordinator.

In 22 previous seasons in either of those roles, Kubiak's



offenses have ranked first or second in rushing attempts six times and have 11 finishes in the top 10. His offenses were in the top five in rushing yards 10 times and top 10 in rushing yards 14 times in those 22 years.

There's a good chance the 2020 Vikings offense could add to those numbers, as Minnesota ranks sixth in

rushing yards at 144.0 yards per game entering Week 9.

Through the first six games of the season, turnovers and an inability to play with the lead limited Minnesota's overall rushing attempts, but the output on the ground was still productive.

But in windy conditions in Week 8 against the Packers, the Vikings thrived at what they do best. Minnesota put up 173

yards on 34 attempts, with Cook leading the way with 163 yards and three scores on 30 carries [5.43 yards per carry].

"That's Coach Zim' football right there. That's all I can say," Cook said. "That's Coach Zim's identity, and that's the type of football we play in Minnesota."

Cook and Mattison make up a strong 1-2 punch, with ESPN naming them the league's top running back duo back in early October.

That distinction has been easy to see on the field, even if the Vikings have struggled to a 2-5 record so far in 2020.

Cook was a 2017 second-round pick who showed flashes of brilliance in his first two seasons before putting together a Pro-Bowl campaign in 2019 with his first 1,000-yard season and 13 rushing touchdowns.

He signed a multiyear contract extension the day before the start of the 2020 season and has promptly played like one of the game's best all-around backs.

Cook has rushed for 652 yards in six games played, which ranks second in the NFL. And his 10 rushing touchdowns rank first and are a franchise record for the most through Week 8 of a season. Cook garnered NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for his stellar performance at Green Bay.

"He's a terrific football player, great person, good leader,"

Zimmer said of his starting running back. "He runs extremely hard. catches the ball well."

Vikings running backs coach Kennedy Polamalu said Cook's evolution as a leader — Cook was named a season-long captain in September — has helped the team on and off the field.

"He has an energy about him. He captures up young men. He lives it," Polamalu said. "He works his tail off, he's a smart football player, he wants [his teammates] to have joy and have fun because he loves the game and he loves being a teammate.


"[Him being named a captain] ... it's well-earned," Polamalu added. "Since he's walked through the doors here, all he's done is work hard and produce. The definition of a leader is to make everybody around him better, and I believe he has."

And in his second season in the NFL, Mattison tries to make sure opposing defenses don't get a break when Cook needs a breather.

Mattison was a 2019 third-round pick who rushed for 462 yards and a score as a rookie. He's been even better in his second season, with 253 rushing yards and a touchdown through seven games.

"I guess the best compliment I can give 'Matt' is that when Dalvin leaves the game, I don't change my mindset at all," Kubiak said. "I mean he's a fine, young player, is playing behind a very established player in this league, so he's got a great example in front of him.

"[Mattison] is a three-down player. He understands pass protections, catches the ball really well ... so we're really proud of [his progression]," Kubiak added. "I would say everybody expects it from him, because of watching

player. [Mattison] has got a very bright future."

Cook said he's enjoyed watching his younger teammate evolve over the past season-and-a-half.

"I try to give him as many tips and everything I can," Cook said. "He sees the field how I see the field, and it's crazy how we see things so similar.

"He's just a bigger version. When he comes in, he's trying to break the home run, too," Cook added. "But he knows what's ahead of him. I do think he is a similar version of me."

It remains to be seen how the final eight games play out for the Vikings as they navigate a unique season.

But with a two-headed monster at running back, plus one of the league's best fullbacks in C.J. Ham, it's clear Minnesota will continue to rely on its successful ground game, both now and in the future.

"I know how we built this roster," said Vikings General Manager Rick Spielman. "We built this roster basically on being able to run the ball, play-action pass ... and that's how we've had the most success."

Dinnertime at the Rudolph household brings the entire family together.


There's Vikings tight end Kyle Rudolph; his wife, Jordan; 4-year-old twin daughters Andersyn and Finley; almost-2-year-old Henry ... and of course Charlie and Bentley, the English bulldogs.


"But Charlie hasn't missed many meals, either," he added with a laugh.

"Dogs are a great way to prepare yourself for kids – especially when you're getting them as 8-week-old puppies," he explained. "You're potty-training, you're getting up in the middle of the night, you're doing the things that you have to do to raise and train puppies. And it does – it prepares you for parenthood.


"I will say it's almost a little unfair to the dogs, but when you do become parents, they immediately become second fiddle to the kids," Kyle continued. "But it's been fun for us over the past four years to see our kids grow up around the dogs and the different personalities between Charlie and Bentley, but just how much the dogs love all three of our kids."

Of the three kids and two dogs, the two youngest boys have formed a special bond.

"Henry and Bentley are best friends. He tends to rough-house with Bentley a little bit, but like most dogs with toddlers, he kind of just lays around and takes it and lets Henry have his way," Kyle said. "Charlie's funny because his whole life, he's kind of had the personality of a grumpy old man. He's that way with the kids, too. He's that grumpy old man that kind of just wants to be left alone. If he's laying and relaxing, the last thing he wants is Henry running over and jumping on him.

"When the kids do come around, [Charlie is] as sweet as can be with them," Kyle added. "But he'd much rather be left alone so he can relax and hang out."

Do Charlie and Bentley's differing personalities remind Kyle of any current teammates?



"Charlie is a lot like Riley Reiff. Kind of that grumpy old man, 'Let me do my thing, leave me alone,' " Kyle said.

Another few seconds to mull over Bentley's demeanor ...

"I would say Bentley's kind of like Adam Thielen, where he's all over the place all the time and never really shuts up," Kyle quipped. "Adam's kind of that way – he's always gotta be talking, always gotta be in on the action. Bentley's very much that way and has been since he was a puppy. He's never really grown out of that puppy energy, whereas Charlie's the exact opposite."

The priority ranking of Charlie and Bentley in the Rudolph home may have changed, but the love from their owners certainly hasn't.

"When we first got them, they were our kids. They slept in our bed, they had free reign of the house, they could get on the couches. Pretty much anything went," Kyle recalled. "Then once we had kids, it was, 'You can't jump up on the couch, definitely not on the bed anymore.' ... [But now] they've kind of become the kings again because the kids are playing with them.

"Both Charlie and Bentley have been best friends of ours since we got them," Kyle added. "And even though they might have slid down the totem pole a little bit farther because we have humans to take care of, every day when we come home from work and want to hang out on the couch, they'll be right there by your feet. You'll always have a best friend in them."






Improving lives through innovation and action

Two families – who have given immensely to protect freedoms through military service – recently received a surprise visit by Pete Bercich and the news they will receive free groceries for a year from Hy-Vee and an ultimate tailgating package from the Vikings.

Bercich, the former Vikings linebacker and coach who is now an analyst, connected with the families via video calls moments before ringing doorbells and expressing appreciation while maintaining social distancing guidelines.

The surprise visits on a chilly Oct. 26 were a way to replace the Hy-Vee Veterans Voyage as the coronavirus pandemic continues.

"Obviously this has required a little bit of thinking of how we can help in different ways, given the environment we're in," said Carl Haidar, Hy-Vee District Vice President, Northern Region. "So, here we are outdoors, social distancing, trying to find a way to help make a difference and thank our veterans."

The tailgating packages include a 55-inch television, infrared grill, patio heater and a Vikings-themed tent, tables and chairs, as well as a custom cornhole set and Vikings swag.

"I want to personally thank the Wilf family and entire Vikings organization for making something like this happen," Bercich said.
"I've been a Viking for 25 years, and this is probably one of the most amazing things I've been able to do."



'FOREVER FOR OUR FAMILY'

Bercich surprised 8-year-old Liam Zeigler in-person under the guise of a video call.

Liam lives in Lakeville with his mom Jessica Hansen-Kriesel and her husband Ryan Kriesel. Liam is a big brother to Henry and infant sister Hattie.

Kriesel is an Army veteran who served two tours of duty in Iraq and a Packers fan along with Henry. Liam and his mom, however, are on the "right side of things" in the Border Battle, Hansen-Kriesel explained.

"It's a lot of fun in our house and something that we all bond over," Hansen-Kriesel said.

Liam's biological father is Patrick Zeigler, an Army Staff Sgt. who served two combat tours as a cavalry scout with the 1st Cavalry Division during the 2007 surge of American forces in Iraq.

Zeigler returned to Fort Hood, Texas, and was taking care of affairs on Nov. 5, 2009, not knowing the afternoon would permanently alter his life.

A soldier committed a terrorist attack, slaying 12 soldiers and a civilian employee.

Shots fired wounded more than 30 others.

Zeigler was struck in his head, causing a wound to his right temporal lobe. He also was struck in his shoulder, arm and hip. Army Times reported that doctors gave Zeigler a 1-in-10 chance of surviving. A black tag had even been placed on his toe before he started screaming and received medical care.

Grim would be an understatement, but Zeigler showed amazing grit through nine brain surgeries and re-learning to walk three times. Zeigler lives near Daytona Beach, Florida, and continues his rehab.

Liam has never known his father any other way. He grew up around hospitals and rehab facilities.

"It's really consumed his life and defined his life, taking care of his dad and knowing that sacrifice, so he's a very mature kid, super compassionate," Hansen-Kriesel said. "He's really been struggling lately with what his dad's injuries mean and that it's something that's forever for our family." Hansen-Kriesel and Liam have recently discussed how the sacrifices of children in

"Liam said something that really struck me: 'A lot of people make sacrifices, but I'll have to make sacrifices every day for the rest of my life,' " Hansen-Kriesel said. "That's what's so cool about [this surprise], that, 'People see me, they see my loss and respect me and appreciate me.' I know he's really going to take that to heart. Truthfully, it's going to change his life and his outlook on life."

Bercich told Liam that spending time with him – they discussed the Minneapolis Miracle and other topics – is "one of the most memorable days I've ever had."

"[This] family, you talk about the Red, White and Blue and sacrifices for this country, they've done that," Bercich said.

'AT PEACE WITH IT'

The surprise for Army National Guard Staff Sgt. Erik Mossberg, who medically retired in May 2019, occurred at his home in Wyoming, Minnesota, two weeks after having his leg amputated at Mayo Clinic.

The 29-year-old had committed to the Army National Guard in 2008 as a junior in high school. He considered active duty "right away," but his parents hoped he would have the opportunity to attend college.

Mossberg, an infantryman working as a gunner during a deployment to Iraq, intended to serve for 20 years but suffered his life-changing injury when he fell from a military truck.

"I split open my knee and had a bunch of issues, but then six months after coming back from Iraq, I started to develop a lot of pain and having my calf swell up, so I experienced my first blood clot of many to come," Mossberg explained. "Over the last five years I've had over 20 blood clots in my left calf and two in my lung. They could have killed me at any time."

Mossberg began making frequent trips to Mayo Clinic, trying to find a solution about a year-and-a-half ago.

"My leg was going dead at least twice a day," Mossberg said. "Just from standing at work, I'd come home and have to go straight to the bedroom, put a heating pack on and go to sleep. It just wasn't a life to live."

Mossberg and his wife, Zanetah, have a daughter and son. Viviana loves basketball, and Mossberg is hoping that young son Ragnar will be drawn to hockey.

Mossberg will have to re-learn to walk with use of a prosthetic leg, making physical and mental strides along his journey.

"I have a lot of other friends that are amputees, too, that have really pushed me mentally to be in a better place and prepared me for this," Mossberg said. "Fortunately it wasn't directly combat related where I woke up without a leg. It was kind of a long decision of health and future, so it gave me some time to really be at peace with it."

The surprise visit "humbled" Mossberg. "It's awesome to see that other people outside of my friends care. The gifts are





awesome. The groceries, that's huge," Mossberg said. "There's been so many unexpected costs with this surgery and life that I never thought would be there, so being able to alleviate two hungry kids and everything else brought me to tears."

Mossberg's family has a gofundme page to help with medical bills.

6 SEASONS

OF MEETING AT THE QUARTERBACK

The Vikings have a rich history of "meeting at the quarterback," particularly when the player is wearing a Lions jersey.

The phrase was coined and embodied by Carl Eller and Jim Marshall. The defensive ends rank No. 1 and 2, respectively, in team history with 130 and 127 career sacks.

The Vikings recorded 6.0 sacks (2.5 by Eller, 1.5 by Marshall, 1.0 by Alan Page and 1.0 by Gary Larsen) of Greg Landry at Metropolitan Stadium in a 24-10 win on Oct. 26, 1969 (pictured above). Minnesota followed with 7.0 sacks of Landry on Thanksgiving in a 27-0 win in Detroit a month later (one sack was not specified in the official play-by-play, but Eller was credited with 2.5, and Larsen totaled 2.0).

According to Sportradar, the Vikings have recorded more sacks of Lions quarterbacks than against any other team in data that goes back to 1963,

which was Minnesota's third season,

and since 1982 when the NFL began considering sacks as official

stats

Minnesota has recorded 360 sacks in 117 games against Detroit since 1963, which includes 29 games with 5.0 or more sacks. The Vikings are 25-4 in such contests, including 3-1 under Head Coach Mike Zimmer. Since 1982, the total is 247 sacks in 75 games.

The Packers have given up the next-most sacks to the Vikings (290 in 119 games since 1963 and 200 in 77 games since 1982). The Bears are third, having allowed 253 sacks in 117 games since 1963 and 162 in 75 games since 1982.

The 1989 Vikings recorded 8.0 sacks in each of their games – played in a three-week span – against the Lions on the way to finishing with a franchise-best 71 sacks that rank second all-time in an NFL season.

Lions quarterback Matthew Stafford has been sacked 366 times in his 156 career starts, including 65 by Minnesota in 19 games and a Vikings singlegame-record 10 on Nov. 4, 2018.

No other team has dropped Stafford more than 47 times in his career (Da Bears).

The Vikings, however, won't have a single player involved in any of those 10 sacks available in Week 9. Danielle Hunter recorded a career-high 3.5 sacks that day but is on Injured Reserve. Tom Johnson also reached peak status that day with 2.5 of his 25.5 career sacks in his final pro season.

Everson Griffen (1.5) just joined Detroit after a seven-game stint in Dallas, Mackensie Alexander (1.0) moved on to Cincinnati, Stephen Weatherly (1.0) headed for Carolina, and Sheldon Richardson (0.5) parlayed his lone season in Minnesota into a lucrative deal with Cleveland.

But Shallenberger's stakes are higher.
Shallenberger is a drill sergeant
stationed at Fort Jackson in South
Carolina. A steadfast supporter of the
Purple, Shallenberger molds green
newcomers to the U.S. Army into
soldiers.

"It's definitely a whole different task [than previous assignments in the Army]," Shallenberger said. "I came into it knowing what I was here to do and everything, but once you start to get new trainees and you mold them into actual soldiers from civilians, it's very gratifying.

"When you actually notice, finally, the difference from when they first got to you and once they're there, it's a good feeling," he added. "The hours are very rough, because we've got to be with them from the time they wake up to the time we tell them to go to sleep, and it makes it worth it, though, because you don't even realize

how long you're there because you're constantly instilling new knowledge and things they've never heard before or done before."

Shallenberger has been named one of the 60 Greatest Fans in honor of the 60th Minnesota Vikings season, a recognition that included a surprise video call from Vikings tight end Kyle Rudolph.

"Thank you for your service," Rudolph said. "I greatly appreciate you and all of our men and women in the Armed Services. I have two cousins that recently served in the Marines, so military history runs deep in our family. I understand that I get to play a game on Sundays because you provide us the freedom to do that."

A native of Beloit, Wisconsin,
Shallenberger grew up a Vikings fan,
forming a connection he enjoyed
with his father (Frederic, who passed
away at age 59 in February 2018). He
has carried his commitment to the
team across the country and globe at
multiple stops during his nine years of
service and is passing his passion to his
two young children.

Shallenberger's assignments include Fort Campbell, Kentucky, a deployment to Afghanistan, followed by Fort Hood, Texas, and then Rose Barracks in Vilseck, Germany.

Rudolph discussed Shallenberger's time in Germany, as well as a visit that the tight end made to Ramstein Air Base in 2018.

Shallenberger didn't let living several time zones ahead keep him from watching Vikings games, waking up at 3 a.m. Monday to enjoy *Sunday Night Football* appearances. Now, he's in the Eastern time zone, able to capitalize on his only off day of the week.

"Our trainees get Sundays to rest and recuperate, so therefore, the drill sergeants do too, so I get to watch the games on Sundays," Shallenberger said. Shallenberger won a Polaris off-road

AN ACT OF VALIANCE INTERSECTED WITH IRREVERSIBLE TRAGEDY.

Timothy K. Ebert, Jr., and a co-worker were driving to work at Savannah/Hilton Head International Airport on Aug. 9 when an erratic motorist wrecked on the interstate, her car coming to a rest in the roadway.

Ebert stopped on the side of the road and checked on the motorist.

"He has such a big heart, I can see him stopping – I can see him doing it right now in my head, he would have beaten himself up all day if he had known he hadn't stopped for that pregnant lady who had wrecked," Lindsay Ebert said.

Everything was going to be OK until another motorist fatally struck her husband of seven years as he was returning to his vehicle.

When police knocked on her door that Sunday morning, she "just kept thinking, 'You don't have the right person.' "

Lindsay said the blood results of the driver who struck her husband came back positive for alcohol, but the incident remains under investigation; proceedings have been slowed by the coronavirus pandemic.

Timothy was just 34 years old. He leaves behind 6-year-old daughter Tinley and stepsons Bryce and Brayden that he loved

as his biological children. Bryce has become a huge Vikings fan – his favorite player is Adam Thielen - from Timothy's influence, an unrelenting love for the Vikings passed to Timothy by his father and grandfather, who both grew up in Minnesota.

OF VALOR

Timothy served more than 13 years in the Marine Corps, including on tours of duty in Iraq (August 2008 to March 2009) and Kuwait (March 2016 to October 2016). Honorably discharged in 2017, he went to work as a civilian air traffic controller, continuing to enjoy when military aircraft landed during his shifts.

Timothy was working in a Marine Corps recruiting office near Indianapolis when "kind of a blind date" set up by a mutual acquaintance led to so much more.

When the moment was right, Timothy worked with Bryce and Brayden's father to surprise Lindsay. She came home from a

her sons, who were holding a "Will you marry me?" sign.

"They're like, 'Turn around! Turn around!' There he is on his knee with a ring," Lindsay recalled. "It was great he involved the kids like that. He was like a father to them. I'm so lucky that he was in their lives because he shaped a lot of who they are now. His values, he's just a humble person, very kind and wished to help everyone, as you can see. My boys are very much like that because of him. Not because of me. Because of him. He instilled that in them."

The shock lingers, and the heartache is permanent. Timothy's memory is everlasting to family, friends and co-workers who are trying to move forward from the tragedy.

"My sister would always say how she loved being around us because she could see the love we have for each other," Lindsay said. "I would have been married to him until the day I died. Unfortunately, I was only married to him until the day he died. Sometimes I don't know what's worse, dying first or living alone."






