

## WEEK 12 MIN VS CAR

The Vikings overcame an 11-point deficit in the fourth quarter by closing the game with a pair of touchdowns that bookended a key defensive stop in a 28-27 victory over the Panthers.

This will be the just the seventh regular-season meeting between the Vikings and Jaguars franchises and first at U.S. Bank Stadium.

Minnesota is seeking its third home victory of 2020 after defeating Carolina 28-27 with a clutch comeback to improve to 5-6 on the season. The Vikings have won four of their past five games.

Jacksonville (1-10) enters the Week 13 contest trying to snap a 10-game losing streak. Five of the Jaguars losses have been by eight or fewer points. Jacksonville's near wins in the past four weeks include a 24-20 loss at Green Bay and a pair of 27-25 defeats at the hands of the Texans and Browns.

#### FIRST GLANCE

Vikings Defense vs. Jaguars Offense:

Minnesota's defense was able to affect Carolina quarterback Teddy Bridgewater early and is now turning its attention toward a Jacksonville team that started Mike Glennon in Week 12 against Cleveland. Glennon completed 20 of 35 passes for 235 yards with two scores and a passer rating of 96.7. Gardner Minshew II has missed the past four games with an injured throwing

hand. In between the second-year pro and Glennon, Jacksonville started rookie Jake Luton. Minnesota ranks second in goal-to-go defense having allowed touchdowns on just 56 percent of possessions. Jacksonville is tied for 12th, having scored touchdowns on 80 percent of its goal-to-go situations.

#### Vikings Offense vs. Jaguars Defense:

The Vikings managed to fill the void of not having Adam Thielen last week by spreading the ball around effectively. Minnesota had four different players catch seven passes and each player total more than 60 yards. Bisi Johnson had 74 yards, and Justin Jefferson added 70 with two scores. Kyle Rudolph totaled 68 yards, and Chad Beebe added 63 that were highlighted by his 10-yard touchdown catch with less than a minute to go. It was the second time in NFL history a team has had four players make at least seven catches and gain more than 60 yards apiece (Saints on Dec. 23, 2012). Jacksonville enters Week 13 ranked last in the NFL with 6.35 yards allowed per play and 8.15 yards allowed per pass play.





Wilson is one of two linebackers in the NFL with three interceptions this season. The other is teammate Eric Kendricks, who just recorded his third on the season last week against Carolina. Wilson's picks — at Indianapolis, at Seattle and against Detroit — are the first three of his career and have been in response to increased playing time on defense. Undrafted out of Cincinnati in 2017, Wilson didn't play a defensive snap in his rookie season, but he was a demon on special teams. After playing roughly a third of Minnesota's snaps on defense in 2018 and 2019, Wilson has been in for 715 (95 percent) of the Vikings plays on defense this season. He's answered the bell in filling in for Anthony Barr, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 2, and worn the communications device normally in Barr's helmet to receive the play calls from the sideline and relay them to the rest of the defense.

#### IN COVERAGE

Through the first 10 games of 2020, Wilson had allowed a combined passer rating of 62.9 by opposing quarterbacks, according to Sportradar. Opponents were a combined 28-of-40 passing for 244 yards with one score and the three interceptions on passes in Wilson's coverage area.

AND 3.0

Wilson is the only player in the NFL in 2020 with three interceptions and 3.0 sacks. He's also recovered two fumbles and forced another fumble through 11 games this season (10 starts).

Robinson enters Week 13 on a roll, having recorded 90 or more scrimmage yards in five consecutive games. His 159 scrimmage yards in Week 12 against Cleveland are the most of his young career. Robinson leads all rookies with 1,170 scrimmage yards and 890 rushing yards. Undrafted out of Illinois State, Robinson has scored six of Jacksonville's eight rushing touchdowns this season and leads the Jaguars with 50 points. The native of Rockford, Illinois, appeared in 46 games for the Redbirds, totaling 46 touchdowns (44 rushing) and 4,444 yards on the ground. Robinson was named a consensus First-Team FCS All-American after leading the Missouri Valley Football Conference with 1,899 rushing yards and 16 touchdowns in 2019. He was invited to the East-West Shrine Bowl where he totaled 136 yards (80 rushing, 56 receiving) in the college all-star game.

#### THIRD AND CLIMBING

In the Common Draft era, only five undrafted rookies have posted 1,000-plus scrimmage yards. Robinson has 1,170 and has passed 1,021 by LeGarrette Blount (2010) and 1,124 by Clark Gaines (1976). He trails Phillip Lindsay (1,278 in 2018) and Dominic Rhodes (1,328 in 2001).

WITH 100+

Robinson has posted four games with 100 or more rushing yards this season, including last week's career-best 128 against the Browns. He also topped the century mark against the Titans in Week 2, the Chargers in Week 7 and the Packers in Week 10.



Some people have used the extra time at home in 2020 to read, watch their favorite show or work on a skill. Jalyn Holmes helped start a trucking company back in his hometown of Norfolk, Virginia.

The Vikings defensive end and his business partner launched Beast Coast Trucking in July as a way to provide trucking services and job opportunities for the region.

"I had some family that was in it at first, so I was interested in the industry for about two years," Holmes said. "My business partner and I put our heads together [in the offseason] and created the company. I learned the industry for two years and finally pulled the trigger on it this past offseason."

"I have an uncle who was it in [on the business side], and I know a couple guys just from family and friends who were truck drivers," Holmes added. "It's whatever our carriers need us to move around. It could be food, furniture, whatever is on the load. We just pick it up and move it."

The business has been in operation for nearly five months, and Holmes said it's a balancing act. Most days he wears a Purple helmet for his job, but he puts on his metaphorical business suit at times to get updates on his trucking business.

"I have a great business partner who handles the day-to-day [operations], but we have weekly meetings," Holmes said. "You'd never think I'm in-season when I'm in those meetings, just asking questions and making sure we're on the up."

Holmes joked that he tossed around the idea of just calling his company East Coast Trucking, but decided to add a little more muscle to the moniker.

"We wanted to do East Coast because it's located in Norfolk, Virginia," Holmes said. "But Beast Coast just sounded cooler. These trucks are beasts, though ... 18-wheelers carrying about 40,000 pounds when we get a full load, so it made sense.

"It's something I can pass down to my son. The industry isn't going anywhere, and we'll always need trucking, so I was trying to find an innovative way to give back to my community. I've hired people from my community," Holmes added. "The NFL is 'Not for Long,' that's one of the things I do know. But we're growing fast, and in about five to 10 years, there's no telling what this

business can potentially be."

We caught up with Jalyn this week
for a Water Break, presented by
Crown Royal.





**1.** You mentioned your son [Jalyn Holmes II is a year-and-a-half old]. How has fatherhood changed you as a person?

A: "For the good. A lot of things mean more. I've thought about life after football more since I had him. He was kind of the inspiration behind my trucking company. Everything I do now, I do it for two people. He's like my best friend, my little shadow. He definitely gave me a different perspective on life in a good way. I learn from him every day."

1. You recently posted on Twitter that you wanted Kyle Rudolph's cleats from Week 11. You later tweeted you were able to snag the Kobe Bryant-inspired cleats with his Mamba logo. How did that transaction work?

A: "I tweeted that I needed them before the game [laughs]. Then I went to him and asked, and Rudy was like 'All right,

cool.' I asked him [a few days later] after practice and got them. Kobe is my favorite player of all-time. The whole mindset Kobe had, I try to emulate that. So seeing [Rudolph] with those cleats was a big deal for me."

Describe the impact and influence that Kobe had on you.

A. "Man, [his death in January] was tough. He was an idol of mine, someone I grew up looking

up to. The Lakers are my favorite basketball team. I didn't want to believe it for a long time. Just seeing how he carried himself on the court, as a father and as an entrepreneur ... he's just somebody to look up to. He even motivated me with the trucking company, because Kobe was doing things on and off the court. I wanted to show people you could be more than an athlete."

1: You were drafted as a defensive end in 2018 out of Ohio State. You spent time as a defensive tackle in 2019 but are now back to defensive end full-time. How has that transition gone?

A: "It's going great. Defensive end is what I've always played ... so it's natural. Like learning how to ride a bike again. The main thing is that I feel like I'm more focused than ever. more detailed than ever. I'm back having fun, and when I have fun, I play well."

Q. You've been around Vikings Co-Defensive Coordinator and defensive line coach Andre Patterson for three seasons now. What's the best piece of advice he's given you?

A: "Man, there's so much. But really, just him always saying, 'Do what makes you unique.' Just stick to who you are. I feel like I've done that this season. Part of me being me was playing defensive end, playing my game and just having fun. He always talks about just being yourself and what makes you good. That advice has helped my game tremendously."

Drafted by Minnesota 22nd overall, Jefferson has been a rookie phenom, racking up 52 catches for 918 yards and six touchdowns in his first 11 games. The Vikings have a long-standing partnership with Boys & Girls Clubs Twin Cities, which operates 10

locations in the metro area.

#### JAMES LYNCH+ EZRA CLEVELAND

PAT TILLMAN FOUNDATION

The Vikings grabbed Cleveland (Boise State) and Lynch (Baylor) in the second and fourth rounds of the NFL Draft, respectively. The teammates have contributed early for Minnesota, with Cleveland in Week 6 stepping in to start four games at right guard. He played through an ankle injury at Chicago that sidelined him the next two weeks. Cleveland and Lynch play on opposite sides of the line of scrimmage but live under the same roof.

The roommates each chose to raise awareness for the Pat Tillman Foundation, which gives military servicemembers, veterans and spouses the educational tools and support they need to reach their fullest potential as leaders.

The foundation honors the legacy of former Cardinals safety Pat Tillman, who left his NFL career to enlist in the U.S. Army in 2002 after the previous year's Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Tillman was killed in action on April 22, 2004, in Afghanistan.

# I AM SUPPORTING MENTAL HEALTH

#### The Boise State-Washington State game on Sept. 9, 2017, is a memorable one for Alexander Mattison.

The running back scored in the first quarter of what became a 47-44 win by the Cougars in triple overtime.

Tyler Hilinski, Washington State's backup QB at the time, came in during the third quarter and threw for 240 yards and three touchdowns. Mattison recalled being impressed by the opposing passer's talents.

"After playing a game like that, I think you just kind of leave room for there to be a connection," Mattison said. "Whether that's down the line with them as a teammate in the NFL, or just running into them in life and being able to chop it up about that game, whatever it might be – there's just a connection left in the air when you pour that type of emotion onto the football field."

But Mattison never had the opportunity to rehash the epic contest with Hilinski. Rather, he and his Broncos teammates received the news – along with much of the sports world – on Jan. 16, 2018, that Hilinski had taken his own life.

"That took a toll on our team," Mattison said. "You could just feel it in the room that everyone's hearts were heavy."

Unlike a few of his teammates, Mattison had no personal relationship with Hilinski; nonetheless, he felt connected to the fellow athlete who grew up just 30 miles from Mattison's hometown of San Bernardino, California, and also was an older brother.

The tragedy motivated Mattison to learn more about depression, suicide and mental health in general, both within the athletics community and beyond. In addition to self-educating, he engaged in conversations with health professionals who gave presentations and talks at Boise State.

"I was always the one to kind of push off, fight off [things that are hard] and let it get to a boiling point where you can't handle it anymore," he reflected. "I've



learned a lot about how unhealthy
that is for you, as far as your emotions,
your mind, trying to navigate through day-to-day life – it just
makes things harder. And then you start to get to a place of
negative thoughts and just negative feelings."

Mattison became increasingly passionate about suicide prevention and raising awareness for mental health. When the Vikings drafted him in the third round of the 2019 NFL Draft, he didn't take for granted the incredible platform.

Following his rookie season, Mattison branded and launched I AM GIFTED, a clothing line he's using to be a positive light and share hope.

"Everyone was born with a gift," he said of the message behind I AM GIFTED. "Find it. Embrace it. Use it to shed light into this world! Life is what you make of it – so what are you going to make of it?"

Mattison will don custom-designed I AM GIFTED kicks in Sunday's My Cause My Cleats game. He currently is working on establishing an official foundation and in the future plans to dedicate proceeds of sales to suicide prevention, as well as to support youth causes and military veterans experiencing homelessness.

Especially in a 2020 that's brought hardships such as the COVID-19 pandemic, economic challenges and racial injustices, Mattison hopes to change things for the better.

"It's definitely the year to bring this to the forefront – letting people know that their life is precious and they are worthy," Mattison said. "It's something that's been even heavier on my heart."

### KIRK COUSINS' first choice on last week's game-winning touchdown pass wasn't Chad Beebe, to be perfectly honest. Take their word for it.

"From my perspective, I believe that when we broke the huddle, you were the least likely person to get the ball," Cousins said to Beebe during this week's episode of the *Under Center with Kirk Cousins* podcast presented by Fleet Farm. "You probably know that, knowing how I'm supposed to read that play."

Beebe replied: "It's funny you said that, because I kind of had the same thought, but I knew coming out of the huddle, it was supposed to be a 'clear' route, but you still want to win on this route instead of running aimlessly."

Minnesota moved the ball from its own 25-yard line to the Carolina 10 with five consecutive completions. The Panthers increased their pressure on the first-and-goal play that followed, and Cousins avoided trouble with a purposeful incompletion that left 50 seconds on the clock.

On second down, four Vikings ran underneath routes, and only Beebe headed for the end zone.

Beebe's job on the play from the left slot is to run a "clear" route that draws defenders away from an intended target.

The third-year receiver noticed defensive back Corn Elder was shaded toward Beebe's left. He sold a fake to the outside and smoothly transitioned to a skinny post, getting depth behind safety Juston Burris.

Cousins saw this from the shotgun and fired the ball to Beebe. One of the smallest Vikings (he's listed at 5-foot-10 and 183 pounds) went up, secured the catch, absorbed a hit by Elder and landed in bounds for his first career touchdown.

The six-pointer tied the score at 27, and Dan Bailey's extra point provided the final margin in a game Minnesota (5-6)

needed to move to eighth in the NFC Standings, one back of the seventh playoff spot held by Arizona (6-5).

The play, as well as other catches during the possession, followed an impressive stop by the Vikings defense that limited the Panthers to a short field goal after Carolina recovered a punt that Beebe had muffed at the Minnesota 9-yard line.

The turnaround was befitting a movie script for Beebe, who is possibly a little more Hallmark Channel than HBO.

But just drift for a second and indulge. Hear the Foo Fighters' "There Goes My Hero" in a crescendo as cinematic slow-mo makes its way through close-ups of Beebe and Cousins before the snap.

How about a clip that makes an offensive lineman's block look more dramatic than it seemed in this case? The release of the football from Cousins' hand, the leather spiraling through the air as Beebe goes up to secure it, then a signal by the refs (if a movie, Beebe would have landed closer to the end line than he did) and cheers by thousands.

"It sounds weird and maybe a little clichéd, but it did feel like that movie moment or that video game moment where time slows down and you hear the heart beat," Beebe said. "That's kind of how it was for me. Everything slowed down, and I just tried to win the route, and you put it exactly where it needed to be. Long story short, we made the play happen."

The pair of players who began their NFL careers as longshots – yes, Beebe's father Don played nine NFL seasons, and Cousins succeeded at Michigan State before his selection in the fourth round of the 2012 NFL Draft by Washington – can point to their preparation and work ethic.

"I wasn't quite certain that he was going to come to me, but it's just about always being prepared like he could and would," Beebe added. "So I just ran the route like he was going to throw it to me, and sure enough, he did. It was a great pass. I think the relief came after the dropped punt and trying to make up for what we thought was lost."

#### **CONNECTING WITH TEAMMATES**

Cousins used part of the episode to dig further into Beebe's gridiron journey, from being coached by his father in high school to overcoming injuries at that level, in college at Northern Illinois and being sidelined in his first two pro seasons in Minnesota. The quarterback also shared that he had attended Don Beebe's House of Speed Camp during his youth in Chicagoland.

It's the kind of casual but informative conversation that Cousins has come to enjoy so much with teammates in two seasons of hosting the podcast with KFAN's Mark Rosen and help from Vikings.com's Chris Corso.

"I really enjoy two parts of the podcast:

1) being able to debrief about the previous game, win or loss, after having the time to watch the film, and being able to talk about it with a little more time and detail than what postgame press conference allows; and 2) I really enjoy being able to bring in teammates or people who are notable names around Minnesota to be able to get to know

them better and ask some questions and take some time to have other listeners get to know them better.

"I've learned a lot more about my own teammates just by being able to do this podcast and bring them on," Cousins added.

Depending on the teammate, the talk could cover the previous week's game, the teammate's backstory to becoming a Minnesota Viking and/or off-field interests, ranging from Eric Kendricks' enjoyment of skateboarding to Ezra Cleveland's love of LEGOs.

Alexander Mattison explained the pride he has for family members who have served in the military (his father Darrell and grandfather James served in the Air Force, and his uncle Lawrence served in the Army).

Other guests have included broadcaster Dan Patrick, retired tennis pro and huge Vikings fan Mardy Fish, 2009 MLB MVP Joe Mauer and Gophers Head Coach P.J. Fleck.

Patrick, who grew up a fan of Ohio sports and attending Cincinnati Reds and early Bengals games, explained that he realized during the 1990 World Series (won by Cincy in a sweep of Oakland) that he needed to switch from pulling for specific teams in favor of the most compelling storylines.

"I don't root anymore. It's the hardest thing that ever happened. I miss the high, but I miss the hurt, too," Patrick explained. "When you lose a game, I don't feel anything, but I miss the feeling of watching as a fan.

"I root for a great storyline, no matter what it is. If you say Pittsburgh is going undefeated, I'll say, 'Great storyline,' " he added. "You get a surprise team that makes the playoffs ... that's what I root for because it's easy to tell that story over and over."

Patrick explained how he didn't get a weekend sports job in Dayton but wound up working for CNN for 5.5 years. Unable to get a \$5,000 raise for his next contract, he headed to ESPN, eventually becoming a longstanding anchor on the network's *SportsCenter* flagship program and encouraging the iconic "This is *SportsCenter*" commercials.

He later went independent for *The Dan Patrick Show*, building one of the best fan caves in all of sports that doubles as a studio.

"You've got to be lucky, but you have to be ready when you are lucky," Patrick explained.

Which brings us back to Cousins' preparations. Even in a season with so much uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the quarterback has tried to maintain his weekly in-season process that he's developed over time.

"Whether you're coming off of a win or a loss, you go right back to your routine, and I believe that having that routine that I've continued to sharpen over my years of playing — is something that I lean on so that I can be consistent

week-in and week-out to the best of my ability," Cousins said. "I do think in pro football that consistency is a big part, an underrated part of being in this league."

In five games since Minnesota's bye, Cousins has completed 105 of 145 passes (72.4 percent) for 1,293 yards with 12 touchdowns against one interception (passer rating of 124.3, the NFL's best this November). He's had a passer rating of 100 or higher in each game, helping the Vikings win four of five.

Regardless of how sharp the preparation is, a defense could still do something unexpected. Carolina was quite "multiple" for much of the game but then utilized just a three-man rush on four consecutive defensive snaps during Minnesota's winning drive.

"NFL defenses these days are pretty multiple, so even if you get a certain look on a play or two of a 2-minute drive, if it's a seven-play, eight-play drive, they're going to vary their looks," Cousins said. "They played big zones initially, rushed three guys, but then down in the red zone, they played tight man coverage. ... I thought they had good scheme all game long and kept us off balance. We just had to be ready for whatever they were going to throw at us."

Cousins credited Offensive Coordinator Gary Kubiak's play calls and response as the game situations dictated a change in approach.

"Once we got behind and were running

out of time, we had to be a little bit more of throwing the ball and into drop-back mode, but kind of just play the game that we have to play based on the situation and our plan," Cousins said. "I thought our offensive line did a great job, knowing that we had to drop back and throw late in the game, of being able to protect and slow down their pass rush, which gave us a great chance to hold on to the football a little longer in the pocket and find the open guy down the field."

#### MY CAUSE MY CLEATS

For the second consecutive My Cause My Cleats game, Cousins is supporting Boys & Girls Clubs. The youth mentorship program is one that the Julie and Kirk Cousins Foundation has strongly supported since launching in October 2018.

Cousins visited the Mt. Airy Boys & Girls Club in St. Paul in-person last year and did so again last month virtually with help from a robot and rookie Justin Jefferson (recap on page 45).

"I do believe young people are our future and are very impressionable. You want to provide a positive example and provide a voice of encouragement," Cousins said. "I think there's a lot of voices speaking to young people today that are telling them lies and sending the wrong messages. I want to come against that and be a voice to young people that speaks truth to them and encourages them

and challenges them to set their sights high and be goal-oriented and really try to have a positive impact on others."



"I've been having my fair share of cereal bowls because I have a few boxes at my house, too. I say the flavor is a cross between Cinnamon Toast Crunch and Golden Grahams. I like those two cereals, so it's good by me."

Even before increasing his support of Boys & Girls Clubs, Cousins has focused on youth mentorship with football camps geared toward middle school boys.

"We chose middle school because we do feel it's an important age, an often overlooked age," Cousins said. "We really feel good about doing the camp for seven years, seeing the fruits of working with that age and hoping to speak truth and encouragement into their lives at a time when they're very impressionable."



# PORPLE WAS

Prince didn't start out as Troy Dye's dog, but the pit bull-Lab mix and Vikings linebacker are practically inspeparable.

In college at Oregon, Dye roomed with Ducks teammate and former Vikings receiver Dillon Mitchell, who owned Prince. Minnesota drafted Mitchell in the seventh round of the 2019 NFL Draft, and he asked Dye to watch Prince while he settled in a new home.

"So Prince stayed with me in the apartment, and we just grew a bond over the next couple of months," Dye said.

" 'Sorry, there's no way you're about to get this dog back. He's mine for good now,' " Dye told his friend. 'Dillon was OK with it because he knew Prince was in a great home, great spot, and he gets all the love and attention."

Prince certainly gets plenty of affection from Dye, his girlfriend Makenzie and the couple's son, Ty, who was born on April 7.

An expanding family initially threw Prince for a loop, but he quickly warmed to the infant and assumed the protective "big brother" role.

"When Ty first came home ... any little movement or sound that Ty would make, [Prince's] ears popped up, on-guard, ready to go, wasn't really sure what this little human was," Dye recalled earlier this year. "When the baby would cry, Prince would look at you like, 'What's going on? Are you going to do something?'

"Now he kind of gets the feel of the baby and understands certain cries. It'll



be like 3 in the morning, and the baby will be crying, and here comes Prince to just sit next to you, give you some comfort and let you know it's all good," Dye continued.

Ty and Prince have been known to nap together, and Dye looks forward to the two becoming best friends.

The growing relationship isn't surprising to Dye, who described Prince as an incredibly loving dog.



## Back when he was a senior in high school, Greg Coleman penned some lofty expectations for himself.

"You know in your high school yearbook when you put your name, your hobbies, your ambitions ... I wrote years and years ago that I wanted to be a punter in the National Football League," Coleman said. "My teammates and classmates laughed and said, 'Man, you're out of your mind. There's no Black punters in the NFL.' And I said, 'That ain't my problem.'"

Coleman accomplished that dream during a 12-year professional career, spending 10 of those seasons in Purple with the Vikings, and recently was announced as a member of the 2021 Class of the Black College Football Hall of Fame.

The moment was one to savor, reminding Coleman of entries to the Pro Football Hall of Fame by Vikings connections.

"I'm going to try and hold it together here," Coleman said. "I'm reminded of what [Pro Football Hall of Fame President] David Baker does when he knocks on the door [to inform players of their selection] ... when Randy Moss went in, John Randle went in, Randall McDaniel, Cris Carter ... a few great Vikings.

"When they called me, it was emotional," Coleman added. "A range of emotions from left to right thinking back to the struggles of African-American men."

Coleman lived through multiple types of discrimination during his youth in Jacksonville, Florida. His all-Black PeeWee football team won the city championship in its division, earning the right to play in the Gator Bowl, but the young men were denied the opportunity.

He bounced back from that pain and punted at Florida A&M University from 1972-75, before becoming the first Black punter selected in an NFL Draft (Cincinnati tabbed him in the 14th round in 1976).

Coleman said the skill he became known for — pinning opponents deep in their territory with precision kicks — was developed in college where special teams coach Costa "Pop" Kittles suggested to "kick 'em where they ain't."

"I started crafting the skill of kicking it to the corners," said Coleman, who was enshrined

in the FAMU Sports Hall of Fame in 1985. "I'll never forget one of my first *Monday Night Football* games when Howard Cosell coined me, 'Coffin Corner Coleman.'"

Although he was drafted by Cincinnati, Coleman didn't play a down for the Bengals. Also a track star in the hurdles with strong speed, coaches kept suggesting he try positions other than punter.

But Coleman was insistent. He punted in 14 games for Cleveland in 1977 but was released after the preseason in 1978.

He had a few tryouts, hoping to land with a team when he turned on a Vikings-Rams game on Oct. 15, 1978. The man of faith prayed that he'd eventually play for the Vikings.

Minnesota called the next day, and Coleman punted in 138 regular-season games in Purple.

"Never give up and don't lose hope,"
Coleman said. "No matter how many doors
get closed in your face ... I believe that when a
door is closed, God will open a window."

Coleman and fellow class members are scheduled to be inducted in June at the College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.



Justin Jefferson has shown the NFL he's a star since the rookie wide receiver was taken with the 22nd overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft. But the former LSU standout isn't the first Minnesota player to take the league by storm in his first pro season. Jefferson is following in the footsteps of a handful of Vikings Legends, too, whether it be Randy Moss, Sammy White, Anthony Carter or Paul Flatley.



Jefferson was able to pass the receiving totals by Flatley, the 1963 NFL Rookie of the Year, in just his 11th pro game. Flatley caught 51 passes for 867 yards and four touchdowns over the course of 14 games in Minnesota's third season.

Even though Carter had played three seasons in the USFL (1983-85) before joining Minnesota in 1985, we also took a look at Carter's first season in the NFL. He recorded 43 catches for 821 yards and eight scores.

White (1976) and Moss (1998) each claimed NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, and Jefferson has placed himself in the running for that award. Here's how he stacks up against those two Vikings Legends.

### **SAMMY WHITE, 1976**

White's rookie season included 51 catches for 906 yards and 10 scores to help the Vikings win the NFC Central. The second-round pick out of Grambling made a big initial splash with a 210-yard performance against the Lions, which still stands as the single-game record in Minnesota. White also had a pair of scores in that game, which was one of two multi-score games for him as a rookie. He also hauled in three touchdown catches in the regular-season finale against the Dolphins.

## RANDY MOSS, 1998

The 21st overall pick in 1998 seemingly couldn't be stopped. Moss tied a franchise single-season record with 17 touchdown catches, which is also an NFL rookie record. The former Marshall standout scored twice in his first NFL game and took off from there.

The Hall of Famer's biggest performances occurred in Green Bay (five catches for 190 yards and two scores) and in Dallas on Thanksgiving (three catches for 163 yards and three scores) on national broadcasts. He had four total multi-score games, and set a franchise record with four 100-yard performances as a rookie. Moss ended his rookie season with 69 catches for 1,313 yards as the Vikings went 15-1 and reached the NFC title game.

### **JUSTIN JEFFERSON, 2020**

The Vikings tabbed Jefferson with the first of two first-round picks, taking the LSU star who had 111 catches for 1,540 yards and 18 scores in his final college season. And although the Vikings had a virtual offseason, Jefferson has made quite the splash in 2020. He leads the team in receptions (52) and yards (918). His six touchdowns include two in Week 12 against Carolina for the second multi-score game of his career. The 21-yearold has also tied Moss' rookie record with a quartet of 100-yard games so far this season. Jefferson's blend of speed, athleticism and big-play ability (he averages 17.7 yards per catch) should be a focal point for Minnesota's offense for years to come. And Jefferson's rookie season could potentially be capped off with the same hardware White and Moss earned as the league's best offensive rookie. Jefferson is trying to become the first Vikings receiver to win NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year since Percy Harvin (60 catches, 790 yards, six touchdowns and two kickoff return touchdowns) in 2009.

## FEATURED FAN NATHA

NATHAN NJOROGE SHOWED HIS LOVE FOR THE VIKINGS EVERYWHERE.

Diagnosed with neuroblastoma at age 12 in March 2017, Nathan underwent two bone marrow transplants at the University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital, along with chemotherapy and radiation treatments.

Nathan's hospital room had a view of U.S. Bank Stadium, and he was visited there by Kyle Rudolph. Nathan created a handmade newsletter to express his appreciation to Kyle, whose younger brother, Casey, battled pediatric cancer during Kyle's youth.

Nathan's newsletter was featured in the "Dear Kyle" series of letters written on behalf of the three-time Vikings Community Man of the Year honoree when he was nominated in 2018 for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

Nathan and his family were among honorees at Minnesota's Crucial Catch game in 2019 where cancer patients, survivors, caregivers and those who had died from the disease were recognized and remembered during halftime.

Despite the challenges Nathan faced, he never wavered in his support for the Vikings or his Christian faith. He attended Des Moines Christian School in Iowa, where he inspired classmates, teachers and staff, hanging tight to his favorite Bible verse, Joshua 1:9: "Have I not commanded you to be strong and courageous? Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

Nathan's courageous battle ended with his passing on July 4, 2020.

The Des Moines Christian School Student Council dedicated a Friday in October to Nathan, with everyone wearing purple — his favorite color — and raising funds for a donation in his honor to Ronald McDonald House Charities.

Jefferson did that, but the fun-loving Vikings rookie also turned the afternoon into a virtual dance party.

The first-round pick put smiles on dozens of kids' faces on a recent Tuesday afternoon when he and Vikings quarterback Kirk Cousins took part in the event.

Jefferson taught the young people his signature "Griddy" dance and then was eager to learn some dance moves from the kids, too.

"It was a lot of fun. I've always seen the Boys & Girls Clubs over commercials and everything, but to actually be a part of it and see the smiling faces on kids, it's a great feeling to have," Jefferson said. "Them doing the dance and being that figure in their eyes and the person that they look up to, the person that they see on a high level, that's a good feeling to have.

"I remember when I was like that, looking up to the players that were in the NFL when I was younger," Jefferson added. "It's definitely a long time for me to see this moment, and I'm grateful to be where I am."

Cousins – who visited the club in 2019 – directed his robot by a handful of classrooms to check on schoolwork. As Cousins and Jefferson weaved in and out of rooms, kids ranging from kindergarteners to teenagers were buzzing that a pair of Vikings were saying hello.

"It's something different from their normal routine," said Boys & Girls Clubs Twin Cities Senior Director of Corporate and Public Relations Tim Schober. "It's been challenging times for our young folks with distance learning.

"We're able to take some kids here at the club on a daily basis, but it's far fewer kids than we normally serve so we can make sure we're safe," Schober added. "They're working hard, so having the Vikings here to recognize that is really special. We're here to make sure the kids are able to log in for classes with their schools and assist teachers."

Schober said in normal times, the club would have upwards of 150 kids on an average afternoon. On this day, there were 30.

They were treated to a tasty, healthy lunch that was provided by Vikings Table – the Minnesota Vikings Foundation's charity food truck – as cups of chili provided warmth on a brisk day.

Representatives from Xcel Energy, which presents Vikings Table, were on hand to pass along energy efficiency tips and set up free in-home visits to help families reduce energy costs.

"We live and work in the communities that we serve," said Xcel Energy Senior Director of Customer Experience and Brand Strategy Megan Scheller. "For us, it's so important to give back to those communities so everyone has an opportunity to succeed.

"We know that saving energy and money is important to our customers, and now more than ever," Scheller added. "We're offering tips and tools, but also free services with our home energy squad."

A warm meal, an educational experience and an awesome dance party with one of the league's top rookies made for a day the kids won't soon forget.






